Glimpses of Grace



Empathy: the ability to understand and share the feelings of others. Compassion: sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others. Luke 6:31: *Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.*

A few days ago, we learned that Eli could climb the step-stool ladder to get onto our big, backyard trampoline. Marcus has always been able to climb it, so we usually fold it and put it away when we aren't right there with them. However, we were playing in the yard and it was out. I happened to go to the other side of the yard and turned when I heard Eli crying. He had climbed up it, and was now sitting on the edge of the trampoline about 6 feet from the ladder. He had crawled around the outside of the trampoline trying to find the ladder to get down. Marcus had already climbed down and run to me. I yelled at Eli to "SIT and STAY STILL!" Marcus took off running, climbed the ladder, crawled the edge, and sat down next to Eli and grabbed his hand. All while I was running to Eli, too. When I got there, Eli wasn't crying, and Marcus was telling him, "It okay, Eli. I here." My heart stopped about 3 different times in that 30 seconds for 3 different reasons. The last time, though, was when I saw the empathy Marcus had for his brother. The same brother that minutes before he was wrestling mercilessly!

How often do we approach someone else's situation with empathy or even compassion? How often do we hear the words of Jesus telling us, "Be kind. You may need their kindness someday,"? I think one of the things I've learned this year is to slow down and truly hear people and their story. It may not be a story I can empathize with, but I certainly can show compassion and kindness to them. Even if I don't think their story is all that true, or I don't agree with their viewpoint, I can still show kindness.

I think the world could use a little more empathy, compassion, and kindness these days, don't you? Blessings, *Rev. Jeanne*

There have been many truths of God that have become clearer to me as we have had to endure our months of isolation. The classic Bible story of Joseph and his brothers, his brothers being jealous of him, sold him into slavery. Speaking Out . . . Rev. Catherine Luck

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength and love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus told us these 19 words summarize the whole of



our faith-life. Most Christians <u>know</u> that "love" is our commandment and make ourselves busy <u>doing</u> "love" in every way we can. But is that all there is to "loving God and neighbor" with every fiber of our being? Do you ever feel like there must be more? Are you ready to find out?

First: By late August/early September, a pilot group of 6 to 12 will begin exploring deeper dimensions of "love" on the path of spiritual formation. We will learn what spiritual formation is, examine our own spiritual paths, identify obstacles and next steps. The examination and identification will be done on your own with my guidance and support for your individual reflection. You will have my pledge to follow-up with one-to-one "spiritual companionship" throughout the year if desired.

Second: In mid-September, the spiritual formation group using "The Way of Forgiveness" resource will be offered. You are encouraged but not required to follow-up by being in this group. Forgiveness as a way of being in relationship is a critical aspect of loving God, self and neighbor. We will learn how to practice forgiveness in many dimensions of life.

The exacts dates and times of these offerings are still to be determined according to the availability of interested participants. Most likely they will incorporate both internet zooming and in-person opportunities (depending on virus restrictions). If you do not have a computer/zooming capability, we can arrange for your participation through facilities at the church.

Your participation in these offerings will constitute the setting for a "Practicum in Spiritual Formation" through the *Institute for Discipleship at Southwestern University* in Kansas, a United Methodist institution. and on August 29, he went home, and attended a baseball game with us at Arvest Park. Bill and I then began setting dates that he was going to live till. First it was Thanksgiving, then Christmas, then Valentine's Day, then June 6, and then September 28. In between those dates he had to go back to Circle of Life, given days to live but wasn't ready. On July 11, last Saturday morning, Bill called me and said he wasn't going to make September 28. He said he had twenty four hours. Judy and I went over and said our farewells, hugged and cried. They came and took bill back to Hospice and the doctors gave him a couple of days. Thirteen days later, Bill is still with us. They have him sleeping all the time now but his determination is strong, his faith is strong and he has always been one of the most positive men I have known in our 52 years of friendship.

(After I had written this, sadly, Bill passed away on Saturday, July 25).

The greatest power that God has given us is our Power of Choice. You choose your attitude and it can be negative or positive like Bill. Your attitude is influenced by your input and there are so many factors out there today such as TV, newspapers, riots, politics that affect how we think. It is said that "You are what think about all day". "You are the sum total of all your thoughts", and "As a man thinketh in his heart (brain) so is he". So how do you think? We are living in difficult times right now but if you do the right thing, you will feel the right thing. Your attitude determines your altitude and your attitude determines how long you will live, like my friend Bill. So if we change our attitude we can change our life.

A Time To Start Something New – No, I'm Not Leaving The Church

I've been reflecting recently on the beginning verses of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, CSB

There is occasion for everything. And a time for every activity under heaven.

A time to give birth and a time to die; A time to plant and a time to uproot;

A time to kill and a time to heal; A time to tear down and a time to build;

A time to weep and a time to laugh; A time to mourn and a time to laugh;

A time to mourn and a time to dance; A time to throw stone s and a time to gather stones;

A time to embrace and a time to avoid embracing; A time to search and a time to count as lost;

A time to keep and a time to throw away; A time to tear and a time to sew;

A time to be silent and a time to speak; A time to love and a time to hate; A time for war and a time for peace.

If I had been advising Solomon/the author of Ecclesiastes, I would have advised him to include "A time to mope and a time to pick yourself up by your boots / A time to rest and a time to begin something new."

For a while, I've been sitting on my hands, wondering and praying what I should do next as far as continuing my education. No one in my family has ever gone to graduate school (except my husband). Should I go? Can I handle graduate school and a full-time job? What if I don't like it? What if I'm the class idiot? What if everyone is so super prepared and composed and I'm a hot mess?

This pandemic has made me realize that my internal monologue runs on fear and comparison. The only way to silence that voice is to prove to myself that I can do it. It's in this time of social distancing and isolation that I've had time to reflect on what kind of person God has called me to be, and God has always called me to be a person that loves and serves other people. I've known that since I was in kindergarten and wanted to be a teacher and when I was in middle school and wanted to be a pediatrician and when I was in high school and wanted to be run a non-profit theatre for youth. God knows those desires of my heart!

That is why I've decided to enroll in graduate school for this fall semester. If I want to continue loving and serving, I need to be open to changing how I love and serve.

I've enrolled in Emporia State University's Masters of Library Science program in hopes of one day becoming a librarian! Some Frequently-Asked Questions:

Q: Is your graduate schooling online?

A: Yes, somewhat. It's a hybrid program that requires two in-person weekend intensives twice a semester in Conway, and the rest of the schoolwork is online.

Fun fact: This is the only Masters of Library Science program that meets in Arkansas, and I stumbled across it on accident (or a Holy Spirit moment)!

Q: What does this mean for your job at the church?!

A: I will still serve First UMC Bella Vista as your Communications Director as long as you will have me! You can't get rid of me that easily! I enjoy the work I do, and I look forward to the opportunity to learn more in a slightly different field simultaneously.

Q: Why library science?

A: Great question! My husband is a children's librarian, and I'll occasionally tag along with him to work. Watching him serve the public, represent his library, and coordinate events for the library feels like the puzzles pieces of my career so far coming together to form one cohesive and beautiful puzzle! Small town libraries often struggle to get the word out about new book clubs and upcoming events. My marketing and communications background would shine there! Libraries require knowledge of how to organize information and create the best possible method of sharing that database of information to those that need it. I've been doing that level of database design since high school. Librarians should build and maintain relationships with patrons, and I love people! Libraries are safe havens for some, a vault of knowledge for others, and always a cozy place to foster learning and a love of reading. Being an enneagram 2 (the helper), I know my purpose is to serve others however I can and being a librarian would mean getting to help the public every day I step into work. Libraries are a mission field of their own by nature.

- Q: When will you graduate?
- A: August 2022

The programs are typically 5 to 10 minutes long and are archived on Facebook for listening whenever you want. You can like my professional Facebook page or find the performances listed on my Website.

Starting in late July, I added a new feature called Music Monday Mishmosh. It includes short collaborative performances, blog postings, conversations about music, and who knows what else?! I'll release these on my professional Facebook and Instagram channels each Monday at 8 am.

Stewardship Corner

Four Principles of Biblical Stewards

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. C. S. Lewis, Mere Christianity

In a recent blog on stewardship, we asked the question, "What does stewardship look like in our lives today?" Unfortunately, many Christians today only associate the idea of stewardship with sermons they have heard about church budgets and building programs.

But for us at the Institute for Faith, Work & Economics, the idea of biblical stewardship is about something much more expansive. We believe it is where the concepts of faith, work, and economics intersect.

Bill Peel over at The High Calling recently wrote an excellent essay entitled <u>Leadership</u> is <u>Stewardship</u>. His essay can help us build a framework to begin unpacking this biblical idea of stewardship.

Peel suggests that there are four important principles about biblical stewardship we must understand:

The principle of ownership.

The psalmist begins the 24th Psalm with, *The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.* 1n the beginning of Genesis, God creates everything and puts Adam in the Garden to work it and to take care of it. It is clear that man was created to work and that *work is the stewardship of all of the creation that God has given him.*

This is the fundamental principle of biblical stewardship. God owns everything; we are simply managers or administrators acting on his behalf.

Therefore, stewardship expresses our obedience regarding the administration of everything God has placed under our control, which is all-encompassing. Stewardship is the commitment of one's self and possessions to God's service, recognizing that we do not have the right to control our property or ourselves.

Echoing Deuteronomy 8:17, we might say: "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me." But Deuteronomy 8:18 counsels us to think otherwise:

Remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth.

The principle of responsibility.

In explaining responsibility, Peel writes,

Although God gives us "all things richly to enjoy," nothing is ours. Nothing really belongs to us. God owns everything; we're responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it. While we complain about our rights here on earth, the Bible constantly asks, What about your responsibilities? Owners have rights; stewards have responsibilities.

We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. While God has graciously entrusted us with the care, development, and enjoyment of everything he owns as his stewards, we are responsible to manage his holdings well and according to his desires and purposes.

The principle of accountability.

A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities, and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care, and one day each one of us will be called to give an account for how we have managed what the Master has given us.

This is the maxim taught by the Parable of the Talents. God has entrusted authority over the creation to us, and we are not allowed to rule over it as we see fit. We are called to exercise our dominion under the watchful eye of the Creator, managing his creation in accord with the principles he has established.

Like the servants in the Parable of the Talents, we will be called to give an account of how we have administered everything we have been given, including our time, money, abilities, information, wisdom, relationships, and authority. We will all give account to the rightful owner as to how well we managed the things he has entrusted to us.

The principle of reward.

In Colossians 3:23 -24, Paul writes: Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving. The Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the Master's will with the Master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life, but fully in the next.

We all should long to hear the Master say what he exclaims in Matthew 25:21 :Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your Master's happiness! As Christians in the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important; it connects everything we do with what God is doing in the world.

We need to be faithful stewards of all God has given us within the opportunities presented through his providence to glorify him, serve the common good, and further his Kingdom.
