"Merry Christmas", "Jesus is the Reason for the Season", "Happy Holidays", "Ho! Ho!", "I'm dreaming of a White Christmas", "Let's go see the Christmas Lights", "I have got to mail my Christmas Cards", "The tree is beautiful", and so many other statements combine to make the sounds we hear during the Advent and Christmas Season. There is another familiar sound you hear often. "What do you want for Christmas?". People

ask us this question, we also ask ourselves this question, but have you stopped to hear God ask this question through the murmurs of His Holy Spirit speaking to your heart? When we silence the outside sounds of the secular Christmas culture and listen intently to God speaking to us, then we can hear this question personally directed to each of us. You can read about many of these offerings in the newsletter. I especially hope you will attend one of the 3 different Christmas Eve Services at noon, 5:00pm, and 7:30pm on Dec. 24th. Sunday morning, December 14, I hope you will hear the Chancel Choir performing the Christmas Cantata "We Have Seen Him" with the composer, Dan Knight and his band *The Usual Suspects* during the two traditional services, or experience the Praise Team leading us in celebration of Christ's coming in *The Well* Service, and attend the Vista Kids and Youth Life performance of the Christmas play "Christmas from A to Z", combined with a church-wide noon potluck following all the worship services.



Thank you for your faithfulness in tithing and giving to underwrite the 2015 Stewardship Journey of FUMCBV.



EPISTILES WITH PASTOR ZACH

I was given a book (although since the move, I can't seem to find it) entitled "Stories Behind the Great Traditions of Christmas" It is an extremely interesting book and I would like to share with you one of the stories on why we celebrate advent. In case you didn't know or had forgotten.



Advent is a Latin word meaning "the coming." Officially established by church leaders in the sixth century, Advent was originally meant to be a time when Christians reflected on the meaning of Christmas. Beginning on the Sunday nearest Nov. 30th and running until Christmas Eve, Advent was essentially four weeks set aside to contemplate what the coming of Jesus meant not only to the world but to every individual's soul. Hence, while recognized and organized by the church, Advent was also supposed to be a time for personal retrospection and growth. Today, fourteen hundred years after the first Advent season, many families use the symbols of Advent—wreaths, candles, and calendars—to bring the spiritual meaning of Christmas alive in a way that teaches minds, touches hearts and reflects the original purpose of the tradition.

To the early Christians, three different meanings were to be found in the days of Advent, or the days of the coming. The first was the coming of the Son of God to earth in human form as the babe in the manger. The second was the coming of Jesus into our lives, hearts, and actions of those who accepted him as their Savior. The third was the future coming when Jesus will return to the earth as a King. As times changed and the world came to view Christmas in terms of the baby Jesus and not the role he played on earth and the role he will play in his future kingdom, the meaning of Advent changed as well.


Until WWII, most of the people who celebrated Advent dwelled more on the final coming, the time when Jesus would return, than on the first coming, the birth of the child. But as Christmas evolved into a holiday for children, Advent also evolved into a time to remember the child in a manger. A part of the missionary zeal of the holiday may have been lost, but for most people who celebrate Advent, the tenderness and love that was presented in the story of the first Christmas has come to mean even more during the season of Advent.



In worship services, wreaths, candles, or calendars, Advent is much like a movie preview. Each of its forms and symbols marks the time leading to the special event that is about to take place. Advent heightens the senses and emotions and sets the stage for the wonder of Christmas. When presented in the proper way, the way in which the early church intended, Advent also plants the spiritual seeds that grow into an understanding of the reason for this special season. Christmas is still Christmas without Advent, but the festive four-week countdown puts the holiday into the proper perspective.

"And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light".

(Genesis 1:3)

I have always loved the lights of Christmas. As a child, my family spent Thanksgiving and Christmas meals together with grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. There

was a farm on the way to my grandparents that always put a star on top of their barn at Christmas, just a single blue star, shining brightly way up high. I remember peering anxiously out the car window for that star to appear. I wondered if the star that guided the wise men looked anything like that. The country road that went to my grandparent's home was dark with lots of twists and turns that were hard to see. The star shining in the night was like a guiding light as we drove through the darkness.

Since my husband and I moved with our three children to Fayetteville, we have had a tradition to take a drive one night in search of the "best" Christmas lights. Fayetteville started their "Lights of the Ozarks" celebration just about the time we moved to northwest Arkansas. The town square looks like a new galaxy of stars as everything appears to be twinkling. You can hear the "oohs" and the "aahs" as people shiver while gripping their hot chocolate as they walk from one side of the square to the other. Lots of neighborhoods take up the challenge as residents try to outdo their friends and have the "best" lights. Blowup Santas, reindeer, movement and music are all added. Prizes are awarded; and some of those voted best are featured on the evening news. Lights are a lot more lavish these days than that single blue star of my childhood.

And yet, for all the grand displays of today, that one simple star from long ago shines brightly in my memory. It just stood out above the rest with its purity and the way it broke through the darkness guiding my family as we struggled on the long ride home. Jesus is like that. He did not come in an elaborate display of grandeur, with technology controlling the swaying and blinking in perfect rhythm to the music. Instead he came in a simple manger, under the light of a single guiding star. His light stood out above the rest; it broke through the darkness of life with a purity that guides us like no other light ever will. "Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."" (John 8:12) My prayer for you this Christmas is that you find this light, this guiding light of Jesus, a light that shines like no other, a light that continues to break through our struggles and our darkness and gives us life.



MEDIA MINISTRY

The members of the Media Ministry Team's continued help is appreciated immensely. It's more than pointing a camera or adjusting sound levels. As a team, there is much more going on than what we physically see on Sundays. Since we began posting videos on YouTube on Dec 20, 2010, there have been 50,998 views. This year alone, there have been 10,957 views. In terms of YouTube views, those numbers don't necessarily mean we've gone "viral" but those numbers are still HUGE. Below is a graphic with a few highlighted areas. Note that each geographical area on this map, even the ones not showing a number, do have a number. I've only highlighted a few to give some examples.



What's amazing to me is that our ministry of 8 people have communicated His word, or in the very least, introduced Jesus Christ nearly 51,000 times since Dec 2010.

- ➤ We need at least 1 more person to help record the 2nd service on a rotating schedule. More than 1 would be ideal but at least 1 is needed.
- > James Forest will be unable to help for several weeks after January 4th. He's having knee replacement surgery. Please keep James in your prayers.
- ➤ 1st service is now recorded to VHS & DVD. The VHS tape still goes to BV Community Television. The DVD will be converted and uploaded to YouTube.



Souls Harbor is a transitional living facility for men. We provide food, clothing, shelter, and job opportunities free of charge, while walking alongside men who are ready to RECONSTRUCT their lives. We only serve men who are willing to seek and gain full-time employment and/or continue their education through community programs. Instead of charging rent, we developed a work program we call "Sweat Equity." In addition to household chores, preparing meals, and maintaining the grounds, we require each resident to volunteer in our work program.

A Kingdom Vision

Many motivations and strategies are behind various attempts to help the materially poor, but we hope to alleviate the spiritual poverty that lies just below the surface in every one of us, regardless of our achievements or possessions. The power of the program is its focus on restoring four broken relationships: with self, with God, with others and with the community. Our leadership and volunteers have transformed the ways we walk alongside dozens of men at a time who, in a material sense, have found themselves temporarily or chronically homeless. We know that people don't need a hand out, but rather a dignifying hand up to a brighter future. We are committed to being that helping hand. We are also striving to become a model organization that blazes the trail for a new standard of care for the homeless.

Souls Harbor has undergone radical a transformation both physically and philosophically. Our mission to help homeless men make connections has been merged with a passion to facilitate community development. Souls Harbor continually looks for new ways to lead individuals toward self-sufficiency, but also to re-integrate them into our community. Programs like Hire at the Harbor are providing real world work for residents. The Urban Farm provides not only fresh produce for residents but also income for improvements to the facility.
