

Can There Ever be Light Again?

The people who walk in darkness will see a great light. For those who live in a land of deep darkness, on them a light will shine. (Isaiah 9:2 NLT)

There are times in our lives when the light does not seem to shine in our souls. Those times are typically caused by struggles in our lives and in the world around us. The struggles might be because we lost our job, or because of loneliness caused by our children (grandchildren/great-grandchildren/ best friends) living too far away to get together as often as we would prefer. These struggles might be because of a recent diagnosis of a life-threatening disease, or because of the death of one who was dear to us. The struggles may be because each day is lived in pain of some type, physical pain which doctors cannot cure, or emotional and spiritual pain from lost hope. In the season of Fall, when the beauty of the Fall colors fades into bare trees, grey clouds, and increased darkness in the shortened days, the light may fade from our souls as well. All the Christmas lights, eggnog and shopping just do not bring it back. All the strains of "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year" and "Have a Holly, Jolly Christmas" don't bring it back. It doesn't feel like a "White Christmas", it feels more like a blue Christmas.

It is in those times, most especially, that we need first of all to name our feelings. The anger, the loneliness, the grief are all real feelings and they are who we are at this moment. Then after acknowledging our personal blue-ness, we must begin our journey to Expect that the Light <u>will</u> shine again. Advent is a time when Christians journey toward the Light, the Light of Hope that comes in Emmanuel, God with Us, our Lord, Jesus Christ being born in our hearts once again.

The prophets of old also lived in a dark land and even in acknowledging that darkness, they predicted the Light **would** shine. I invite you to join in the journey with others whose souls have also lost the light.

Share Your Light of Peace, Stability and Hope! For the last two months of the year, our mission focus will be on Methodist Family Health and their Share the Light Christmas campaign. You may remember Methodist Family Health from earlier this year where we collected toiletries, paper goods, and clothing items for the tenants of their facilities. In November and December, we are collecting monetary donations.

Methodist Family Health offers programs and services such as inpatient psychiatric hospitalization, outpatient counseling clinics, grief counseling services, group homes, an emergency shelter for children, and more. 

The class in Sacred Music wrapped up in Midweek Manna, and no surprise, there weren't a plethora of people eager to study the music of the Middle Ages. However, those few who did really appreciated seeing the roots of music in the church and its evolution over the 15 centuries between the early followers of Christ to the origins of the Reformation in 1517. How we complete that class in early 2020 is really up to you. If no one else wants to join us as we finish up the work to the modern-day, we may meet as a private group and take turns leading the discussion. However, if a number of newcomers buy the book and pledge to attend, we can do a more organized class in the spring. Please let me know!

I closed my two-year cycle of playing Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier Preludes and Fugues in late November with the 24th and final Prelude and Fugue. To celebrate, I enlisted Kacy Spears's help to broadcast it via Facebook Live. You can find it via my FB link below. This piece is unlike the previous 23 preludes and fugues in that it shares the pathos of Bach's other famous compositions in B minor, including the final chorus of the St. Matthew's passion and the B minor mass. The complete Chopin Waltzes will be featured on next year's Piano Postludes.

This month, I am presenting an organ recital on Sunday, December 15th, at 12:10 pm. It is the first recital given under the banner of the Curious Squirrel, which I'll explain elsewhere. It has an Advent/Christmas theme and is played in reverse order of composition. I begin in the 20th century with a short selection from Dupre's Magnificat and finish in the 17th century with a fantasy of Nicolaus Bruhns based on the choral prelude *Now, Savior of the World, Come*. If you can't make it on the 15th, I'm playing the recital again on Christmas Eve at 6:25 pm, preceding the traditional worship at 7 pm.

I also present a piano recital at 2 pm on Sunday, December 22nd, featuring the entire cycle of 12 pieces in Liszt's Weihnachtsbaum (Christmas Tree). I played a few of these pieces two years ago on one of my first Sunday at Noon(ish) recitals. This will be Curious Squirrel recital number two!
