## FAITH WALK

Recently, I entered the narthex from the sanctuary and was greeted by a person who had tears in their eyes. Our eyes locked and I felt an awkward pause from us both as the tear stained face of the other person broke into a smile. I reached out to give the person a hug

waiting to be given a reason for the tears. This person simply said" I just love this church!". The reason for the tears was based out of the value that was experienced through the love of other believers.

Also, recently I was a guest in a new church member's home. Fun conversation took place and then the statement was made by the host, "Where did you all find all those young people at the church?". The person went on then to explain the blessing of being with persons of all ages in worship and in the life of the ministry of the church.

In the current days, we as the Church find ourselves having to change. "Doing" Church today is not like it was just a few years ago. Our culture has changed and it begs the Church to change with it, whether we like it or not. FUMC Bella Vista made a decision several years ago to change from its concept of ministry to just a certain age group, to ministry of all ages in order to be at its best. I am so thankful for these persons who heard the call of Jesus to make disciples of all persons. In Matthew 28:19 we read "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit". God's Spirit is still inviting us to experience change, not just for the sake of change but for the sake of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I want to share with you an article by Carey Nieuwhof I have read that might explain the current trends better.

#### Ch-ch-changes All Around You

Think about what's changed in the last 20 years. Back in the early 90s: Less than .5% of the world's population was on the internet. Wifi and broadband didn't exist. We watched movies at home on a VHS and went to a store to rent them. 95% of the music sold was on CD. If you wanted to go somewhere, you used a paper map to plot your route. Google's founders were in college. There was no such thing as text messaging. Remember the world most of us were born into? It doesn't exist anymore. So no one should be surprised that the church is changing, rapidly.

How you and I respond to it will determine our ability to effectively lead the mission of the church into the next 20 years. Here are 5 Things That Will Never Be the Same Again in the Church:

#### 1. Revivals will become a thing of the past.

Don't get angry. Yet.

Think this through. A revival assumes *there is something to revive*. As fewer and fewer people attend church or decide to follow Jesus, there is less and less to revive. Future churches will *make* disciples, not just revive the few remaining ones who have drifted away. We will see great moves of God, but they will not primarily be based on calling people back to what they have left, but instead be based on calling people *into* something they have never experienced. This has radical implications for how we communicate, think, structure and function as a ministry.

#### 2. The church won't be able to chart its future based on current member's preferences.

An unstated assumption in previous generations was that the future would look like the past with a few modifications. As a result, members fought for the kind of music, architecture, staff and culture they wanted, assuming it would 'work' moving forward. The church of today and tomorrow is so *not* about the current preferences of existing members. Instead, the future church will be about existing members rallying around a mission that is not fundamentally about them, but about Christ and the world he loves.


#### 3. The church's best staff will not come from seminary.


This breaks my heart, but the most gifted leaders are not flocking toward ministry or seminary anymore (I wish they were). They are heading into the marketplace. The best church staff moving forward will not be products of traditional seminaries. Sure, there will be exceptions, but for the most part, you will assemble your team from gifted and passionate people who already attend your church and have never thought about ministry as a vocation. (You might end up sending some of them to seminary after.) I realize this trend has been happening for several decades now in growing churches.




# Epistles from Pastor Zach with Associate Pastor, Zach Underwood

But I think in the next decade this will hit the **senior pastor** position harder than ever. Maybe the senior pastors who will lead the best churches of the next 20 years won't come from seminary. How we will get them educated in scripture and theology remains open. But rethinking theological education is critical.

#### 4. Young adults will not flock back to church when they have kids.

If you believe that young adults who leave the church will flock back the moment they have kids, you're probably already disappointed with what you're seeing. A few years ago, David Kinnaman and I wrote a report for Orange Research which, among other things, pointed out how false this assumption is. If you're waiting for young families to come to you, you'll be waiting forever. It will take a strategy to reach young families these days.

#### 5. Loyalty to the institution will no longer motivate people.

You can still find the last vestiges of this in dying small or mid-sized churches: people who will stick around because they can't imagine X congregation not being there anymore. Often if you poke a little deeper, you will discover that some people's loyalty to their particular organization is stronger than their loyalty to the kingdom itself. This attitude will disappear. In the future, loyalty to the institution will no longer motivate people.

The good news is loyalty to the *mission* will. Congregations come and go. The mission is bigger than all of us. And future Christians will be far more loyal to the mission than we've seen. Smart leaders are already pointing people back to the mission again and again. In the end, none of these changes are bad for the church. In fact, you could argue each will make us stronger. That's what I'm hoping for. And if all these changes continue to progress as they are now, Jesus will be more central to the church of the future. Our insular, unquestioned church culture will not be."

As we begin a new year that will bring change in our lives, we also begin a new year that will bring change to our ministry of the church, while the Christian message remains the same that Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Please be in prayer for the ministry of FUMC Bella Vista to be more effective in these days of change. Pray also that leadership of the Holy Spirit will influence each pastor, staff member, and person in the church family. Remember to also include in your prayers the people who have not been reached with the love of Jesus Christ. Those persons remain nameless to you now but by the end of 2015, hopefully you will know new persons in faith through the ministry of FUMC Bella Vista.

"Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10a

January is not my favorite month. Oh, I know it is the start of a new year and we celebrate with fireworks and noise-makers and ringing out the old and ringing in the new. But here in the Northern Hemisphere, it is cold and dark and blustery. It feels especially

colder and darker and blusterier because of coming off of Christmas, the celebration of Light and Love coming to Earth. Then Christmas is over, the family heads home, the presents and decorations are put away, the tree is dismantled, the lights are turned off, and we settle in for a "long winter's nap."

That's what January feels like to me, time for a "long winter's nap." If we were from another universe and plopped down in time in January, we would think from looking outside at nature that everything is dead and there is no hope for revival. But because you and I know that God is faithful, we know that January and winter in general are a time to just slow down, be still, and wait. Be still and watch the birds; be still and watch the snow fall; be still and wait for the ice to melt; be still and know that He is God. Humanity needs this, this time to be still; this time to let God be God while we wait and watch. We need to stop running and rushing; we need to stop doing and just be. In the waiting, God works within us. If we spend the time in scriptural and spiritual reflection, this can prepare us for a time of new growth. The winters in our lives can be long and dark and cold and hard; but God is preparing us to receive the Hope of new life that will arrive in spring. That is, God is preparing us if we don't move too fast.

There is a relatively new hymn in our United Methodist hymnal, "Hymn of Promise", #707, written in 1986. The words are beautiful. Here is the first verse:

In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree;

In cocoons a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free!

In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be,

Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

Don't move ahead to spring too quickly; winter takes time to work. Just wait and rest in God and in God's promise that spring will be revealed in due time.


To those who signed up to volunteer for 2015, thank you. Our first monthly work meeting will be this month.
