In the Bleak Mid-Winter: A Service to find Hope, Healing, & Comfort



Listening with Ears of the Heart

During Advent, I had the privilege of leading a study by Matt Rawle entitled, The *Redemption of Scrooge*. It was an enlightening and thought-provoking study about Mr. Scrooge's invitation to look at himself, including his behavior and attitudes,

through the eyes of Christmas past, Christmas present and Christmas future. Mr. Scrooge's willingness to acknowledge the person he had become because of the hardships of the past, enabled him to make radical changes in his generosity toward and treatment of his fellow human beings. In theological or church terms, Mr. Scrooge was redeemed.

On the last evening of our study, we were given the opportunity to write down three fears for the future and three hopes for the future. In discussing our lists, several interesting things were revealed. First, most of the hopes that people listed were also their fears. The hope or fear depended on the situation. Several fears and hopes were common among the participants: state of civil order, family, health and financial security. As I listened to the discussion, I imagined that many of us hold these same fears and hopes which are categorized as either fears or hopes based on the outcome of circumstances.

We were invited to reflect on how our faith figures into our hope for the future. As I continued to reflect on how my faith frames and contributes to my hope for the future, I was reminded of one of God's promises from Jeremiah.

"The days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them," declares the LORD. "This is the covenant I will make with the people of Israel after that time," declares the LORD. "I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people." Jeremiah 31:31-34

This Scripture reminds us that not only are we blessed and covered by God's grace, but that all people may receive the unconditional covenant of love from God through Jesus Christ. God's covenantal love and redeeming grace is placed in our hearts and minds by the Creator of the heavens and earth. Because God offers this new covenant of inclusive redemption without price, we can neither earn it nor pay for it. All we can do is say "yes," believe that we have received this new covenant through the life-saving sacrifice and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and live a life that reveals our redemption.

Scrooge's redemption was made known through his generosity to others, by the mending of his relationships and through the transformation of his heart and mind. He was truly a transformed man.

As we enter 2017, a year of promise through the new covenant of Christ's redeeming love, how will your life reflect your "yes"? How will others know that you are a Christian by your love? With God's law of love written in your mind and on your heart, how will your thoughts, words, and actions toward others reflect your redemption? How will those you encounter know that God is *your* God and that you are one of God's beloved children?

2017, the Year to "Put a Little Love in Your Heart"

"I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you also must love each other. This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other." John 13:34-35 (CEB)

Have you seen the TV commercials urging "Put a little love in your heart."? Folks for childhood cancer, meals on wheels, national parks, etc, encourage us to become a part of this love for others. What are they selling? — oh, now I remember - it's a Subaru commercial. Interestingly, what sticks with many of us, is not Subaru, but that they are about caring, about love. My official title is Associate Pastor of Congregational Care and Grief Support. I have been in ministry providing grief support since I came to FUMCBV as an intern. Many of you have been in our grief support groups or have come to me in need of comfort in grief. But, the rest of my title is about congregational care - also called pastoral care.

But what is pastoral care? The textbook answer is that pastoral care is "an ancient model of emotional and spiritual support that can be found in all cultures and traditions. It has been described in our modern context as individual and group caring which supports people in their pain, loss and anxiety, and their triumphs, joys and victories." The Biblical answer comes from Jesus. Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you also must love each other. This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other." Listen to verse 35, "This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other." As followers of Christ, it is obvious we are followers when we love others as Christ loved us. Just a few chapters later, Jesus tells Simon Peter, "Tend my sheep." (John 12:16) I like the use of the word "tend", it is to take care of in whatever way is needed. Listen to what Jesus meant by this tending... Jesus asked, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" and Simon Peter replied, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Then Jesus lovingly instructed him, "Tend my sheep." Pastoral care, congregational care, is the loving care of the children of God. It is an act of compassion; it is outreach; it is walking alongside.

Congregational care is not confined to the pastor. It is a commandment for all of us. So how can you reach out in this way?? Congregational care ministries include things like: giving someone a ride to the doctor, visiting someone who is homebound, taking someone a meal who cannot cook for themselves, providing communion to someone who cannot come to worship, celebrating the joy of a milestone with someone. I invite you to be in the ministry of congregational care in 2017. Offer to help with Auto Angels, Grief Support, Church Bus Driver, Communion at Home, Convalescing and Homebound Visitation, OR be in congregational care in a new way not even yet tried. Tend the Lord's sheep. If you would like to be in the ministry of "tending" or if you find yourself in need of being "tended", call or drop by to talk with me. The Lord has invited us to Join in the Journey together by loving one another. Make it your New Year's resolution to find new ways to tend God's sheep. Go ahead, put the Love of Christ in your heart.

The composer of the month is Johann

Pachelbel, and the works you will hear are taken largely from a recently purchased compilation of his works by Dover Publishing. .

Pachelbel was a contemporary to Buxtehude, who both precede J.S. Bach by one generation. They both composed in many forms, such as preludes and fugues, toccatas, fantasies, chorale preludes, and theme and variations. Pachelbel is best known in popular culture for the Canon in D, which is an example of a theme and variations. The fame of this particular piece is recent, starting from a recording in 1968 that prompted other recordings, which then was used by a 1980 movie and many commercials. It also became a model used by popular, jazz, and rock musicians, who were attracted by its simple chord progressions. There is a visceral optimism in much, but not all of Pachelbel's music. It's for this reason that I've chosen to start the new calendar year with this composer. Further, you will hear one of the first chorale preludes I ever played: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow". May you find many blessings in the new vear.
