When I was a child, I enjoyed the stories about Winnie the Pooh and the other characters. I wore "Winnie the Pooh" children's clothing from Sears and Roebuck and had an Eeyore stuffed donkey. Most of us remember who Winnie the Pooh is, but do you remember anything about Eeyore? Eeyore is a pessimistic, gloomy, depressed, old grey stuffed donkey who often loses his detachable tail that has a pink bow on the end and is attached with a nail. He is a friend of Pooh. He always expects misfortune to happen to him, accepts it when it does, and rarely even tries to prevent

it. Eeyore is capable of compassion for others even though he often looks on the dismal side of everything.

Do you know any persons who have Eeyore's characteristics? You may not have to look very hard. I have sadly discovered that there are persons like Eeyore everywhere. When I am with persons like this, I become aware of how the Eeyore mentality can affect my mentality. So, I guard my heart and my mind so that I do not let a negative attitude corrupt my way of thinking and acting. In James 1:2-5 we read, "Consider it pure joy, my brothers whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." No one likes hard times or difficult choices. Rarely, do I meet someone who wants to face the unwanted times of perseverance. I realize we cannot always control the negative situations of life, but we can control our "Eeyore"-like attitudes at all times of life. Eeyore attitudes and the virtues of the Christian faith are not compatible. As followers of Christ, we daily strive to develop His mind and His heart. It is a constant daily discipline and exercise. In 2 Timothy 1:7 we are reminded that "God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but of a spirit of power, of love, and of self discipline". So have an attitude of joy, peace, trust, and openness to God's faithfulness. Prayerfully ask God to develop within you the heart and mind of His Son! Don't be an Eeyore, be a Beacon of Joy filled with Christ's love!



EDUCATION



Disciple Bible Study classes will continue in the 2013-2014 year, with the following classes scheduled for those who qualify: Disciple 2 will be offered on Wednesday mornings from September 18 through the middle of May. In order to enroll for this class, you must have completed Disciple 1 and be prepared for the 32 weeks of study. Disciple 2 deals with Genesis and Exodus from the Old Testament, and Luke and Acts from the New Testament. The class focuses on the beginnings of the Hebrew faith and the beginnings of our Christian faith, and expands our knowledge of the Bible and how to put it to use in our daily lives.

Disciple 4 will be offered on Friday mornings from September 20 through the middle of May. In order to enroll for Disciple 4, you must have completed Disciple 1, 2 and 3. Disciple 4 deals with the church in distress - dealing with the writings in the Old Testament that come after the Prophets, but before the coming of Jesus, and in the New Testament those that come after Paul's letters and closes with Revelation. Disciple 4 closes the Disciple Bible Study program, but leaves us with the insights into Bible that will provide us with the strength and courage to face our lives' challenges for years to come.

Disciple 1- Introduction to the Bible - an overview of what we can find in the Bible may be offered if there is enough interest. For a quality program, we need at least eight people who will commit to the study. There are a couple of options for Disciple 1. First, a 34 week evening option is possible. This

could be scheduled at the most convenient time for the interested students, but it would be from 6:30 to 9:00 or 7:00 to 9:30 what ever evening was chosen. A second option is possible that would shorten the class to 17 weeks, but extend it over two years. This option would involve meeting Monday or Tuesday mornings from the first week in November to the last week in March. This way, we would study the Old Testament portion of the study in one year, and the New Testament portion the following year. This option is quite viable and would shorten the commitment each year.

WHY IS UNDERSTANDING THE BIBLE IMPORTANT? A MESSAGE FROM Pastor Albert Fisher

Understanding the Bible is important because the Bible is God's Word. When we open the Bible, we read God's message to us. What could be more important than understanding what the Creator of the universe has to say?

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason a man seeks to understand a love letter from his sweetheart. God loves us and desires to restore our relationship with Him (<u>Matthew 23:37</u>). God communicates His love to us in the Bible (<u>John 3:16; 1 John 3:1; 4:10</u>).

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason a soldier seeks to understand a dispatch from his commander. Obeying God's commands brings honor to Him and guides us in the way of life (Psalm 119). Those commands are found in the Bible (John 14:15).

Why is understanding the Bible important?

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason a mechanic seeks to understand a repair manual. Things go wrong in this world, and the Bible not only diagnoses the problem (sin) but also points out the solution (faith in Christ). "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason a driver seeks to understand traffic signals. The Bible gives us guidance through life, showing us the road of safety and wisdom (Psalm 119:11, 105).

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason someone in the path of a storm seeks to understand the weather report. The Bible predicts what the end times will be like, sounding a clear warning of impending judgment (Matthew 24-25) and how to avoid it (Romans 8:1).

We seek understanding of the Bible for the same reason an avid reader seeks to understand his favorite author's books. The Bible reveals to us the person and glory of God, as expressed in His Son, Jesus Christ (John 1:1-18). The more we read and

Are you seeking to understand the Bible? Understanding the Bible is important because the Bible is God's Word. When we open the Bible, we read God's message to us. What could be more important than understanding what the Creator of the universe has to say? In 2 Timothy 3:16-17 Paul tells us: "Every part of Scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or another—showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the Word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us," (MSG).

As Philip was traveling to Gaza, the Holy Spirit led him to a man who was reading a portion of Isaiah. Philip approached the man, saw what he was reading, and asked this very important question: "Do you understand what you are reading?" (Acts 8:30). Philip knew that *understanding* was the starting point for faith. Without understanding the Bible, we cannot apply it, obey it, or believe it.

REPORT FROM ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Bishop Gary Mueller and Lay Leader Karen Mann jointly addressed the Arkansas Conference as part of the Monday morning worship. Bishop Mueller stressed that we must move from imagining a ministry to doing ministry to being the church. God wants us to do it by discerning, discipling, daring and dogged determination.

Church members need to experience a spiritual revival since we can only share what we have experienced. There is a need for us to let our light shine forth in our day to day activities so those we meet see a difference in us. Then we may really be able to make disciples for Christ.

The pastors and representatives from FUMCBV attended the general worship sessions sitting as a united group. Each represented our church family in individual small group sessions on various topics.

Bishop Thomas Bickerton is often called Dr. Malaria. That normally wouldn't be a compliment, but since he speaks around the world to spread the news about our mission Imagine No Malaria he has come to accept the name as a positive reflection of his efforts. In 2008 the United Methodist Church established a goal to raise \$75 million dollars to stop Malaria by 2015. By this month the campaign will have raised over \$50 Million dollars.

At the beginning of the Imagine No Malaria campaign, a child was dying somewhere in the world every 30 seconds! The campaign is making a difference which is being documented. There is still much to be done and funds to be raised and we can help!

We were surprised and very pleased to learn the Bella Vista First United Methodist Church was recognized for churches with an average attendance over 300 in the NW District. Churches from each district were recognized based on how they performed on the current measures of Congregational Vitality.

A significant event was held Tuesday evening. Bishop Gary Mueller emphasized that we are in the Kingdom of God business. We must



count on Jesus' transforming love and get personal with Jesus. Following the message we were privileged to see Pastor Lee and six others be ordained. Brother Jaimie shared in the laying on of hands as Pastor Lee was ordained. The service was extremely meaningful for everyone, but for Pastor Lee it must have been a bit overwhelming with so many of his family, friends and church family members present! Pastor Lee did seem much more relaxed at the reception following the ordination as he was greeted with handshakes, hugs and so many words of congratulations.

This was my first opportunity to attend and participate in an annual conference for the UMC. It was certainly my privilege and honor to represent my church family at the 2013 Arkansas Conference held in Little Rock. I have been touched by our mission Imagine No Malaria and will contribute at least \$20.00 every month to help erase this deadly disease. 236 shoe boxes were delivered last month.


July Vacation
