



Hammonds Convention Center in Rogers. The Bishop presented four themes in his address: GET REAL, BE DIFFERENT, MOVE INTO THE COMMUNITY, EXPEREINCE REVIVAL NOW! EXPEREINCE REVIVAL NOW!

When you get back home, it's time to experience revival now.

Bet you didn't see that coming – it's a brand new thought for me, I know.

I recently was meeting with Launch Team #1 - the group working on Step #1: experiencing spiritual



revival. Someone commented, "Church is the last

place that you feel comfortable talking about your relationship with God and what God is doing in your life!" Everyone in that room — including me — said, "My gosh. That's true. It's sad, it's heartbreaking, but it's true."

Well, that's why we need revival!

Revival is not a three-night hellfire and brimstone preaching event every summer where you go, you get religion, and you go home and do whatever you want. Revival is not about someone having an emotional experience that mirrors your experience so you can feel good about yourself. Revival is certainly not about hiding in some spiritual 'la-la' land so you don't have to deal with real life pain and social justice.

Revival is about us getting ourselves out of the way and allowing the Holy Spirit to re-awaken us, re-new us, re-fill us, re-form us, re-direct us and re-energize us for what ultimately matters: the love of God in Jesus Christ. It's what happened to those disciples who were hiding in that upper room in Jerusalem after Jesus' ascension. They were trying to figure out 'What do we do next?' They were trying to figure out how not to be in trouble with the authorities. They were trying to figure out what they were going to do. And suddenly, suddenly, the Holy Spirit came, And with the sound of a rushing wind and tongues like fire, they were filled, and they proclaimed the Gospel so it was understandable to all of those around them. They were able to go proclaim the good news of the Gospel and thousands were converted. They were able to create a church that grew and changed the world.

You need revival – we need revival. You need it now – we need it now. And you need a lot of it – we need a lot of it.

In a couple of days, you're going back home. When you get there, you have to make a choice.

You can choose to gripe about how bad things are. You can continue to be who you've always been. You can make it all about you and your church. And you can watch the people for whom Jesus died continue to struggle from a distance.

PRAYER SHAWLS For WHO?

There aren't enough good things to be said about the Prayer Shawl ministry. A group of committed people who knit or crochet prayer shawls to be given to anyone who suffers a major (life threatening) illness, injury or loss. Our knitters/crocheters meet at the church on Tuesday mornings at 10am, except for about 8 weeks during the summer. Some knit at home year around and bring completed prayer shawls to the church. When several prayer shawls are completed, one of the pastors prays with the women and blesses the shawls before they are given to those suffering an illness or other loss. A record is kept of anyone who receives a prayer shawl, with no more than one prayer shawl given to an individual.

Our pastor, Bro. Jaimie is honored to deliver prayer shawls whenever he can, and he never misses an opportunity to remind the recipient that our church, through this ministry is literally wrapping them in prayer at a time in their life when prayer is critical.

We hope you will call the church to ask if someone has received a prayer shawl, or recommend someone to receive one.

Prayer Shawls are not for sale, but you can make a donation to this ministry to help defray the cost of materials. Make checks payable to the church. In the Memo section, write *Prayer Shawl Ministry*.

ARKANSAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I was very fortunate to attend this year's annual conference from June 19—22, as a lay representative for our district. There is not enough room to tell you all the things I loved about this year's conference, but I will tell you what spoke to my heart.

Adam Hamilton, senior pastor at Church of the Resurrection in Kansas City, KS, spoke for about four hours over two days on the subject of leadership in the church. Leadership has more to do with your behavior than with your title. And, you can't be a true leader unless you are first a true servant. Adam, without sounding braggadocios, gave one example after another of how he does menial tasks in the church, not only to keep himself humble, but he hopes that others who see him will want to follow their leader in the example he sets.

Adam referenced his book, "Leading Beyond the Walls, Developing Congregations with a Heart for the Unchurched," when he talked about the need for our churches to truly reach beyond the walls of the church, and go into the community we live in to begin meeting basic needs of people for food, safety, and health. He believes that churches may have a hard time surviving in the future if serving in the community is not a leading commitment of our church.

I'm reading Adam's book now. I'd like to challenge each person to join me and then come together afterward to discuss this question: "How can our church reach beyond the walls of our building, and make disciples of Jesus Christ in our community?" Watch the newsletter for discussion dates and times.



July MISSION of the MONTH OASIS OF NORTHWEST ARKANSAS



...is a volunteer faith-based group committed to providing transitional housing for homeless families (especially single-parent families) on their way to self-sufficiency.

...is a subsidy for housing expense on a sliding but disappearing scale according to need.

...is townhomes or apartments either fully furnished with housing expenses included or unfurnished except for appliances, separate utilities

...is volunteers mentoring family units in everyday life skills, providing an extended family network which can make the difference in achieving success.

...is short-term supportive, mutually accountable covenant communities of 2-4 single parent families, sharing homes or multi-family dwellings.

...is a safe, sober, healthy environment in which young children can prosper.

OASIS of Northwest Arkansas is modeled after the successful Magdalene, Inc and Thistle Farms of Nashville Tennessee. Our program includes 24 Spiritual Principles and 4 Phases:

Welcome to the Community

During the first six weeks women focus on their physical and emotional health, getting a sponsor and attending recovery meetings, taking care of business needs, becoming acquainted with the OASIS community and beginning to work in our job training program.

By six weeks, women have established a daily and weekly schedule that supports all accountability issues. They continue to work in our job training program but may also start school enrollment or outside job seeking efforts. Obtaining transportation can be a challenge.

Restore Your Soul

Phase two women (after 4-6 months) are employed full-time, continue being held accountable to the same standards as phase one women but have increased privileges.

Find Your Way Home

Phase three women continue accountability, offer leadership in the OASIS of NWA community, and begin to plan for a more permanent residence.

Sisters for Life

Phase Four women implement their plans for leaving OASIS of NWA yet remain spiritually connected to those who walk behind.

Caregivers Support Group

You are going to choose to move full speed ahead. God bless you, and Amen.


