Glimpses of Grace

On New Year's Eve 2019, my family and I rang in the new year with some extended family. I was so excited to see 2019 go and was filled with lofty expectations that 2020 would surely prove to be so much better than 2019. I even took a selfie wearing my snazzy New Year's 2020 glasses.



I don't think that I could have correctly predicted anything that we have experienced to-date this year. This has turned into a tragic and trying year that I will tell my grandkids about. Between the many challenges from living in a COVID19 world to hearing the loud calls for social justice that are sweeping the globe in response to the killing of George Floyd, this year has been tougher than I ever imagined. I suspect many of you are feeling some of the same feelings I am. I am an inherently extroverted person, and my faith is fed through how I experience Jesus in community, so I know this has been hard for all of us.

Though I didn't hesitate when I had to make that difficult decision to cancel in-person worship back in mid-March, I never expected that we would still be separated now. I want you to know that I truly miss each and every one of you, and I am so excited for the day when we can safely worship in person together again! I love you all, and it's that motivation of love guiding our decisions to hold off restarting in-person worship for the time being.

We continue to monitor the evolving CDC recommendations and the trends of COVID19 cases in Arkansas and around Benton County. As most of you know, cases in Arkansas are growing at a faster rate than they ever have, and Benton County cases also continue to rise. I'm beginning to hear from some of you that you or a family member have been tested, and thankfully, those are coming back negative. I invite you to continue to be in prayer for those testing positive and our community.

As of right now, we hope to restart in-person worship around the end of July or beginning of August if things start to trend in a healthier direction. But when we do start back, it will be quite different from how we have ever worshiped before. Based on guidance from the CDC and our bishop, we will strive to make our worship experience as safe as possible. This means that we will worship socially distanced. Masks will be required for everyone in attendance. There will be no congregational singing or reciting liturgies together as a group, as they force the air to a much greater distance. Music will be experienced only by solos and specials. People 65 and older are encouraged not to attend. There will be no Sunday morning children or youth ministries. If any adult Sunday school wants to meet, it should be outdoors, socially distanced, with everyone wearing masks.

Worship will not feel the same, but God will still be fully present. I have learned that even though in-person gatherings have stopped, worship has never stopped! Many of us have continued to gather for worship on our Facebook Live or through our website livestream.

God continues to be present and move among us. Jesus's followers started by doing church in their homes, and the Spirit moved in powerful ways. Even though we are doing church in our homes, I fully expect the Spirit to move among us in life-changing ways!

Jesus teaches us that to be his follower means we must love God with every cell of our being and love our neighbor as ourselves. Because of my love for God, I knew that the most responsible way for us to love our neighbors was to suspend on-site worship for a while. It is my love for neighbor that tells me this is still the most responsible option for the time being. Believe me, I cannot wait to see you all again when the time is right!

For those of you who are unable to join us online, we love you, miss you, and are praying for you. Many of you have the option of tuning in via the Bella Vista channel on Sunday or Wednesday at 11:00. I hope you are able to do that. If you need to talk to someone, need any help, or would like me to pray with you, please don't hesitate to call me at the church office 479-855-1158 and leave a message. I receive those as soon as they are left.

May each and every one of us do all in our power to better love God and our neighbor every day.

True Worship

With what shall I come before the LORD and bow down before the exalted God?

Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old?

Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of olive oil?

Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?

He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you?

To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Micah 6:6-8

As we have been unable to be together at the church for worship in more than 3 months, and as I have watched the news of late, I have been reminded of a well-known verse written by the prophet Micah, chapter 6, verse 8. As children of our creator God (mortals), we are called to 'To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.' **This** is how we worship.

Micah was a prophet in the 8th century, about 130 years before the fall of Jerusalem and its citizens being taken into captivity by the Bablylonians. The culture at the time was filled with corruption and oppression, with idol-worship, with injustice, with have's and have-nots. The prophet asked the Lord, what shall we do to honor you? And the Lord replied, 'act justly, love mercy, walk humbly with your God.'

We often try to make it so hard, and yet it is so simple. We see dark images of injustice and oppression around us; we see the idols of pride and money and stuff, and we wonder, what shall we do? And the Lord replies, do justice, be compassionate, remember that I alone am your God, not those worldly things, walk humbly with Me.

I was thankful for the UMW Sunday worship on June 28 where we were all reminded of the Lord's justice and compassion as exemplified in the mission of the women of our United Methodist Church. In those who led the worship, we were reminded of the unity of diversity of young and old, of black and white, of female and male, of many voices blended together in True Worship. (If you missed that Sunday, I encourage you to find it on our webpage or Facebook page.) Google United Methodist Women and you will see described the 800,000 women who work for justice world-wide through compassionate service and advocacy to change unfair policies and systems.

To be the church away from the building, we are called to be in True Worship by acting justly, having compassion, and walking humbly with our God through our lives. In the coming days, weeks, and months, may we resolve to all join in **this** journey together.

Digital Evangelism

Have you ever heard the term "digital evangelism?" Me either until recently! I had a conversation with someone who works in the communications office at the Arkansas United Methodist Conference, and he said "in a world that's all online, we need to be doing more digital evangelism!"

I don't know about you, but that feels a little intimidating. Is he saying we should share our entire faith journeys on Facebook Live? Should we be posting Bible verses every day and hoping for the best?

Digital evangelism can mean that, but it can also mean something more genuine. It can mean that we're seeking to make disciples of Jesus the Christ even in a COVID-19 world.

Social media consumes a lot of our lives, even more so lately as we try to stay connected with each other. What if we were to use social media as a way to be better disciples?

Pause for a moment and think of someone you know who needs to hear an uplifting word, know that there's a support system here for them, or who needs to hear that Jesus is still at work today.

Now, ministering to that person will look different now than it would pre-COVID. Pre-COVID, you could invite them to lunch or for a walk on a trail while you catch up and invest spiritually in one another. Today, that looks more like a phone call, FaceTime conversation, or even by sharing something on social media!

Clicking the "share" button on Sunday morning Facebook worship and inviting your friends, family, and loved ones to experience worship with you is a great way to do digital evangelism! You're taking a step of faith to share the worship you're experiencing and participating in at 9:30am on Sunday mornings and sharing a pillar of your faith, which is this church body.

"But how does sharing a Facebook video make disciples?" Great question! On average, we humans have to see something seven times to remember it, and even then, it's a partial memory of the true event. If you share a Facebook worship service once, someone might scroll by. Share it the next week and personally invite people to join you in watching it, and they'll remember the experience but maybe not the sermon or any of the music. As you continue to increase exposure, that's when they're able to become introspective and ask questions about worship, maybe about Jesus, maybe about heaven! Discipleship is a process, and a worthy one! Investing in the spiritual life of others is how the church began and continues to grow!

So, now I ask you, how can you do digital evangelism?

ARKANSAS UMC ANNUAL CONFERENCE RECAP

The Arkansas Annual Conference was held June 13, 2020, via a 4 and a half hour Zoom webinar. Reverend Jeanne, Pastor Brenda, Lou Kaufmann, and Ken Swanson

attended as FUMC members while Amy Gilmore and Kenneth Wilson attended as District At-Large members. All voting was done via polls on Zoom or telephone. There were approximately 700 voting members in attendance and most were able to vote without a problem!

The Bishop opened the Conference with an 8 minute, 46 second silence in remembrance of George Floyd. Bishop Mueller then spoke about the justice and racism that continues in our country. He talked about supporting the black churches, such as the St. James United Methodist Church in Pine Bluff, an historic Black church more than 150 years old. He also unveiled annual mandatory training for clergy that will be sponsored by Philander Smith College, a black UMC college that actually hosts our Conference offices in Little Rock.

We had the following worship services: an opening service, a celebration of life service for those pastors and spouses who died in the past year, a retiree recognition service, and a sending forth service in which the District Superintendents gave their district a blessing.

We had various reports and the unveiling of 200,000 MORE Reasons. 200,000 Reasons was our conference initiative to end childhood hunger in our state. As we have begun to address the hunger problem, it has become obvious that more than providing food is needed. We adopted a new initiative of 200,000 MORE Reasons to increase literacy and education, especially in the southeastern portion of our state where the statistics are the worst. Please watch for more information about this coming soon!

Here is Lou's summary: "Certainly something was missing in that we were not all together, but the conference did its best to put together the meeting that normally would cover two and three days, in just four hours. It was concise and to the point. The Bishop presided very well as he usually does. Considering the times we are presently in, I feel the church did its best with our current situation and got its message out to everyone. I am sure next year everyone will be together again and everything will be better."

From the Organ Console Broc Hite, Organist/Pianist

What a difference a month makes! Change seems to be accelerating, which is not always a good thing. We have many more freedoms than we did last month this time, but we also have far more coronavirus cases, including serious ones that are filling local hospitals. Black Lives Matter has come back into our lives with a force that I can't remember in my lifetime. Just to clarify, though I was born during the Civil Rights Movement in the mid-sixties, my memories of the time are of Captain Kangaroo and Bozo the Clown. With all the labeling going on these days, hopefully I can catch a break for that period of my life where I could count my age using one hand!

While many were posting the black square on Instagram, protesting in the streets, or writing profusely on their Facebook accounts, I largely stayed silent. For me, it was just better to listen than to talk, like the old expression that God gave us two ears and one mouth for a reason, and that reason isn't symmetry!

Even before BLM re-emerged, I had been thinking about how to expand my repertoire to include female composers. I purchased a short composition by Stephanie Ann Boyd, whose music I introduced to Bella Vista in the Wesley Series back in 2016, though haven't learned it yet - it's quite difficult! I also just bought a book of the piano music of French composer Cécile Chaminade, who joins Fanny Mendelssohn, Clara Schumann and Amy Beach as 19th-century composers you've heard of, but whose works you probably couldn't name. Female composers will emerge in church and/or on the Weekly Acorn.

I would really like to purchase several volumes from Oxford University Press's Piano Music of Africa and the African Diaspora, but the scores are really expensive. Since music scores are paid for out of my own funds, I'll have to budget and introduce them eventually.

For July, expect a return to the organ in force, even though you won't be returning to the sanctuary just yet. I will be playing Dudley Buck's Concert Variations on the Star-Spangled Banner in our patriotic concert online at 6:00 Friday, July 3rd. For postludes, you'll hear some pieces of Leo Sowerby as a teaser of what to expect for a postponed birthday recital dedicated to his music. You'll hear other organ music that I would categorize as meaty, or portabello for my vegetarian friends. In August, there will be another installment of the Waltzes of Frédéric Chopin.

To close, I offer you a reminder about the Weekly Acorn. It's a bitesized weekly recital, typically 5 to 10 minutes long, and usually on piano. A new episode airs each Friday at noon, and you can get alerted by following my Facebook business page. The archives can also be found on my Website.

The Purpose of Wealth

Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things; come and share your master's happiness!

Matthew 25:21b (NIV)

It is an odd question for the son of a truck driver, who was the son of a sharecropper, to ask, but the question is valid; "What is the purpose of wealth?"

I understand there is a false presupposition that anyone who creates wealth is evil. This mindset comes from passages like "the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil" (1 Timothy 6:10), which is true. Nevertheless, the same book presents the wealthy man as the hero in the parable of the talents (Matthew 25:14-30). Also, Proverbs 13:22 reminds us that a "good man leaves an inheritance for their children's children."

"Indeed, the Jewish tradition views a person's quest for profit and wealth to be inherently moral." ---Rabbi Lapin Somehow, most Judeo-Christians do not have such a noble view of wealth creation. Many Christians see wealth creation as inherently depraved. Perhaps that needs to change, since if one considers wealth creation morally reprehensible, then making money and building wealth become something to avoid rather than achieved. And, with wealth, many Christian endeavors would be unattainable.

So, what is the purpose of wealth? One very materialistic view is "he who dies with the most toys wins." But, in truth, he who does die with the most toys still dies. The "win" in wealth is not in toys. The "win" in wealth is found in the purpose of money.

What does God want us to do with our money?

God calls on us to give tithes and offerings (Malachi 3:7-12, Proverbs 3:9-10 to the local church. **One of the most worshipful things a believer ever does is give.** Giving is a matter of the heart. It is an act of love. We offer ourselves first, then give our wealth willingly, liberally, cheerfully, regularly, and proportionately (1 Corinthians 9:6-7 and 16:1-2, 2 Corinthians 8:5, 12:9-7) So **the "win" in wealth is that our giving is greater.** God will often test us with our money. Be ready! (Luke 18 and 19, Joshua 7). There are many biblical examples of those who failed the test, and there are those who passed the test.

Will you pass the test?

Will you excel in the grace of giving? (2 Corinthians 2:8) Have you ever seen a U-Haul behind a hearse? Why do we try to keep that which we cannot keep? The win in a biblical understanding of wealth is passing the test.

God wants us to use our wealth to provide for our families (1 Timothy 5:8). There is great satisfaction and joy in taking care of your immediate family and those in your church family. I doubt anyone will ever recognize all the social welfare provided week after week by local houses of faith. The win in wealth is the ability to care for those you love.

Hospitality is opening you home to those you know and have deep relationships with and those with whom you have yet to build a friendship. It is not about your home being extravagant or humble; it is about it being used to spread Christ's love (Romans 12:13). Indeed, wealth allows us to practice the rich tradition of faith, providing for our family, and hosting friends in our homes.

Wealth allows us to fund Kingdom business (1 Kings5-7; Luke 8:1-3). I look back at all the church expansions, Christian universities, missionaries, pregnancy centers, homeless shelters, medical missions, children's homes, etc. that I have had the joy to contribute to, and I smile. **There is great contentment in being a part of the expansion of God's Kingdom.**

While serving as an Executive Pastor, we were in a campaign. It was Sunday morning, and she made a beeline straight to me. I do not know how you feel, but when a church member on Sunday morning makes a beeline to me – often, it is not good news. She stopped, opened her hands, and said – "The jerk left me years ago; it is about time this did something good again." I looked and in her hand was the biggest diamond I had ever seen. So, what did I do as an Executive Pastor? I took it and sold it. And then we used it to fund the Kingdom.

Money matters. **Wealth in the hand of a righteous man is noble.** So, whether you are a one-, two-, or five-talent person (Matthew 25:14-30), I pray you will be found faithful. I pray you will show an increase. May you hear the words, "Well done, you took what I gave you and created wealth."
