"SHINGLES" PREVENTION"

Since a number of our members have experienced the long term pain and inconvenience of the disease called "shingles" recently and the disorder seems to be occurring quite commonly, it is appropriate to share information about an effective (relatively new) way to prevent its occurrence or at least reduce its severity and duration.

The preventive injection recently made available to us is called <u>Zostovax</u>. If your doctor does not have the medicine on hand to administer to you, he or she may ask you to order the prescription from your pharmacist. (to be refrigerated until you pick it up and then administered quickly at the prescribed time thereafter). Your insurance does not cover the cost, you may be charged \$218, a small amount for the discomfort that shingles would cause.

The procedure is about as painless to the patient as the "flu shot."

Even a person who has already had shingles may want to get a Zostavox injection to reduce further the likelihood that another attack will occur.

Health & Wellness cont'd.

Having shingles is an unpleasantly painful experience which may typically persist for seven weeks. Serious neurological damage may even result which will persist for months, years, or the remainder of a person's life.

Anyone who has ever had chicken pox is especially susceptible, although it may attack others also.

UMW FINANCIAL MATTERS

Our local UMW raises funds for mission through personal pledges and various fund-raising projects such as the February Sweetheart Dinner, our annual Rummage Sale (August 7, 2010), our annual Bazaar (October 2, 1020) and special efforts such as the Friendship Quilt currently under construction. Pledge money supports the programming and expenses of our local UMW unit as well as district, conference and global UMW organizations and mission efforts. Funds from the Bazaar, Rummage Sale and other

fundraisers are used to pay expenses for these projects. All remaining funds are used for local projects (such as \$2,000 recently allocated for the kitchen renovation) and local mission efforts (such as Shoebox and Prayer Shawls) and to support charities in Northwest Arkansas which benefit women, children and youth. Last year, our local UMW unit provided \$23,875 in support of all of these efforts. We hope to raise even more money this year for mission work in our area.
