

#WeAreMore: A word from the Bishop

General Conference is over. What happened—or didn't—during those 11 days in Portland during which 864 delegates came together to make missional, legislative and financial decisions makes a difference. Here are some of my take-a-ways.

We chose to stand united for the sake of staying in mission. Our gathering reflected our global nature more than ever before. We committed to continuing our work in the Four Areas of



For the first time, a General Conference appealed to the Council of Bishops to lead legislatively as well as spiritually. We bishops have humbly accepted this challenge as we appoint a special commission to engage in finding a way of moving forward, including the possible crafting of legislation related to human sexuality that may be presented at a called session of General Conference prior to 2020.

While this work is carried out, the prohibitions outlined in church law still exist, as does the process for addressing violations. There is, however, a desire to explore alternatives as we seek a deeper and healthier unity as members of the Body of Christ. It is my prayer that the Holy Spirit will enable the commission and the Council of Bishops to offer a powerful witness to the world about what it means to live in unity in a world that finds it increasingly easy to divide, blame and hate.

When all is said and done, however, we are more than demonstrations, parliamentary maneuvering, budgets, legislation and whatever the media reports about us. I personally witnessed this in our Arkansas delegation. While there are striking differences of opinion on key issues, they modeled what it means to be joined together in the Body of Christ as they laughed, supported each other and prayed together. I was proud of them, and I know you are as well.

What is true about our delegation is also true about our Conference. We are more when we continue to focus on spiritual revival. We are more when we seek to "Grow by One." We are more when we get involved in "200,000 Reasons" in order to ensure that no child goes to bed hungry in our state. We are more when we engage the mission field right outside our churches.

In closing, I return home from General Conference reminded of three very important things. First, I love you. Second, I am grateful to serve in ministry with you. And third, I am ready to roll up my sleeves as we continue to create vital congregations that make disciples of Jesus Christ, who make disciples equipped to transform lives, communities and the world.

FAITH WALK

General Conference 2016 has ended after 10 days of meetings, worship, debate, and decision making. One of the great take-a-ways I have is that the United Methodist Church is a Global Church more than we have traditionally thought. It seems, from an analysis of multiple votes on various issues that I am told that the United Methodist Church has taken a decisive step in a more orthodox direction,

and certainly a more global direction. The presence of non-American delegates was more powerfully felt and from comments to reporters one gets the sense that African members especially now have a stronger voice in the process of the church more than ever. Our global connection has not only been retained or grown cold but has deepened and is stronger. The strength of the UMC is now clearly in the hands of the global church. The African church, growing at significant rates, now holds the power in our denomination. The General Conference is scheduled for the first time outside the U.S. (in 2024 in Manila, Philippines, followed by 2028 in Harare, Zimbabwe). The UMC grew by a total of 1.2 million members in the last four years, mostly outside the U.S. The Africa Central Conference has grown by 329 percent, while in the United States the denomination has declined by 11 percent. I celebrate that God is working in wonderful and unseen ways to bring about a world-wide body of believers! Spiritual revival is taking place in ways we have not encountered before.

Other happenings at General Conference that I have read about and watched by livestream where:

An overwhelmingly strong vote (75% to 25%) disaffiliated the UMC from the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice. This represents a significant shift in thinking for the global Church.

The church continues to pursue important justice and mercy issues including human trafficking, stamping out killer diseases like malaria and AIDS, environmental stewardship, and the sanctity of human life.

The language of the Book of Discipline around issues of human sexuality remains as it is. Other votes related to this issue were shelved in favor of a future conversation guided by the Council of Bishops after further study.

The Conference defeated motions to separate the American Church from the global Church. The call to remain a global Church became one of the more important themes of the Conference.

The body of the Conference requested and received the leadership of the Council of Bishops on the issue of human sexuality. A commission was formed which has been charged with studying the issue and developing a strategy for graceful exit and disaffiliation for those who disagree with its findings.

A disaffiliation-with-property proposal passed a committee vote, signaling support for an eventual conversation about this. While that proposal did not make it to the floor of the Conference, it should be a priority of the Bishops' commission to explore this option.

The margins in the votes on key issues signal that the weight of opinion has shifted toward a more orthodox theology. Both the University Senate and Judicial Council received a number of new members who are more theologically orthodox. For the first time, the chair of the Judicial Council is not an American.

A proposal was made and accepted requiring bishops to hold one another accountable for decisions in their individual Conferences.

The charge to the Council of Bishops has no definition beyond the formation of a commission. No timeline or specific goals other than the discussion of human sexuality were assigned to this commission.

Approval was given to begin the development of a New Hymnal.

June 19th through June 22nd the Arkansas Annual Conference will be held in Hot Springs, Arkansas, We will learn more there about General Conference and what forms of ministry God is using in Arkansas to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the World. FUMCBV will be represented by the three pastors as well as Jim Prather, and Vicki & James Forrest. One of the highlights of this Annual Conference will be the commissioning of Pastor Judy as a Provisional Elder and Pastor Brenda as a Provisional Deacon at a Service of Ordination on Tuesday evening, June 21 at 7:30. You are invited to attend this service. It would be great to get together for a meal before the service or refreshments following the service with those who attend. Let me know if you are attending and would like to get together!

Listening with Ears of the Heart Associate Pastor Judy Rudd-Platt

For most of us, our first encounter with pilgrims occurred in elementary school. We learned that they were men and women who wore funny hats and came over on the Mayflower to establish a new life in America. They were a brave, adventuresome people of faith who

sought a new home where they could freely worship God as they chose. For many, many years, this was the only image of a pilgrim I knew.

As I grew in my faith, I became familiar with another image of a pilgrim – an image of a person who seeks a deeper, more intimate friendship with his or her Creator. Our United Methodist Hymnal holds a prayer by St. Augustine that beautifully describes this yearning. "Thou hast made us for thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they find rest in thee" (UMH 423). For many of us, life is a pilgrimage of our restless hearts seeking our home in God. In recent weeks, I noticed that several of our hymns and praise songs have described a journey of the heart which seeks the peace and contentment that is found only in God through Jesus Christ. "Blessed are those whose strength is in you, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage" (Psalm 84:5).


Pilgrimages occur in all shapes and sizes. Some are as simple as taking a "closer walk with thee" in the familiar surroundings of everyday life. Other pilgrimages involve committed preparation, extensive travel and the exercise of muscles and faith. I have encountered both in my life, but a recent opportunity to share about my experiences on the Camino de Santiago in the fall of 2014 revived the importance pilgrimages have had in my life. When we are intentional about our journey of faith, whether it is in the everyday occurrences of life or a planned time away, we have the opportunity to know our Creator more fully and to be more fully known.

Two opportunities for pilgrimage in the company of our brothers and sisters in Christ are quickly approaching. The first is the Women's Retreat on July 30th. We will journey to Eureka Springs for an intentional day of being in the presence of God and embracing our belovedness as sisters and co-heirs with Christ. The second is a pilgrimage to the Holy Land September 21-October 1, 2016 with Bishop Mueller. Pilgrims on this Holy Land pilgrimage will walk in the way of Jesus and our Christian forbearers in such places as Jericho, Qumran, Masada, Bethlehem, the Jordan River, Galilee, Nazareth, Cana, Samaria and Jerusalem.

June is the real deal - whether you are newly freed from school or living another blessed day with your family, working or in retirement, you can't



It is a pleasure to report that requests for financial & food assistance has been down so far this year, though that may increase when school lets out. Although sales have also been moderate, we continue to give 85 cents of every dollar earned back into the community.

Did you know that 20% discounts are given to military personnel on Mondays and all First Responder employees on Wednesdays? Spread the word. Also, programs are already in place with Pea Ridge and Gravette schools to provide coats or other needed clothing, and work is in progress to assist with other area schools.

The Benton Co. Master Gardeners have begun work on HH property to grow fresh produce to be distributed through the Food Pantry this year.

So, many good things are happening at this facility. We hope you will continue to shop and support this great organization.


UMW SUNDAY IS COMING!

From the Organ Console

Broc Hite, Organist/Associate Director of Music

I am planning to explore some of the compositions by Edwin Henry Lemare (1865-1934), whose career I could most easily describe as the Rachmaninoff of the organ. There are many similarities between the two composers. Though Lemare was born in England, not Russia, both settled and died in Los Angeles at age 69. They were prolific composers and recitalists for their instrument. Their music is of a late romantic style, since they were born within a few years of each other.

Lemare composed more secular than sacred music, which supported his later career as a concert organist versus his earlier career as a church musician. Though the majority of pieces I will play are sacred in nature, I will play as postludes several compositions that were clearly composed for concert use. You heard one of these in May, the light and airy "Concert Gayotte".
