## Glimpses of Grace Rev. Jeanne Williams, Senior Pastor

You might have seen or heard the United Methodist Church in the news in the last month. Some of you are well aware of the Commission on the Way Forward and all that it entails, and some of you are likely unaware. I'm going to do my best to inform you of this entire situation and point you to other resources if you want more information.

At the 2016 General Conference of the United Methodist Church (meets every four years and is the global meeting of our denomination), legislation was brought forward to alter our current Book of Discipline wording concerning homosexual language. The three points currently in our Book of Discipline in consideration are: 1. Self-avowed, practicing homosexuals cannot be ordained; 2. Ordained clergy cannot marry homosexuals; and 3. Local churches cannot hold homosexual marriages on church property. The General Conference asked the Council of Bishops to put together a Commission to study this topic, make proposals back to the Council of Bishops, and to hold a called General Conference in February of 2019.

The Commission on a Way Forward came up with three models for the Council of Bishops to consider. (Link below) Earlier this year, we were all invited to attend a session in our district to hear about the models and to give some feedback. Several of our members attended. Two weeks ago, the Council of Bishops met and decided to favor Model Two – the One Church model – for the called session in 2019, but they are also proposing the other two models so the body can discuss and vote on all three. (News release link below)

The bottom line? No one knows anything! And we won't really know anything until after the called session in Feb. 2019. Even then, we may not really know or fathom the impact at the local church level for some time. I can honestly say that there are pros and cons to each model; much discussion and praver has happened and will continue to happen; and that there is an obvious difference of opinions on this subject.

For clarification, I will continue to follow our current Book of Discipline. I will continue to lead our church in being disciples and making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. And I will continue to pray for those who will make these difficult decisions for our denomination. I ask that you join me in prayer and that if you have any questions, please contact me. If I don't know the answer, I'll help you look for one!

## JOINING IN THE JOURNEY TOGETHER Brenda Wideman, Associate Pastor

## Ordination, Deacon and Red Shoes

On Tuesday, June 19<sup>th</sup>, at the Arkansas Annual Conference in Hot Springs, I will be ordained by Bishop Gary E. Mueller. The United Methodist Church recognizes that there are those within the church community whose gifts, evidence of God's grace, promise of future usefulness, and response to God's call, set them apart for leadership and ordained ministry within the community.

The journey toward ordination is a long and arduous process. There is affirmation of the call, which my home church of Sequoyah UMC in Fayetteville provided. There are 3-4 years of seminary education, which I did in Dallas at Perkins School of Theology. There is a 2 or more year residency with service at a given local church, which I did here at FUMCBV. There are district committees and conference committees whose purpose it is to oversee the lengthy written and oral exams in order to ascertain gifts and readiness for servant leadership. All in all, ordination typically is a many year process before one may be deemed ready for the final Bishop blessing. It will have been 8 years from my call to my ordination. Obviously, this is not something to be taken lightly. <u>All</u> ordained clergy, female and male, young and old, have received a call such as this and have been through this vetting process. Thankfully, we each are blessed in that God walks with us and grows us through it all.

I will be ordained as a deacon in full connection. As a deacon, I am called to servant ministries; called to ministries of justice and compassion; called to walk back and forth on the bridge between the church and the world, representing the church to those in the world and bringing the concerns of the world to the church for its ministry in the world. Elders are called to order (administer) the local church, I am not called to that, so I will never be a senior pastor nor 'have my own church.' Deacon stoles rest over the shoulder, rather than around the neck, as elder stoles do. You will see the difference when I wear stoles. Deacons can have their primary ministry in churches (as I do), as chaplains, as teachers, as music ministers, as spiritual directors, in non-profit community organizations, and in many other church/world capacities. Ministry that bridges the church with the world fits my calling, especially since I spent 27 years in the world and away from the church. Reflection on my life's journey has revealed God's continual presence and relationship in all seasons of my life. I have experienced that God's love, justice, and hand of grace extend to all people of all nations, in all places, and at all times. God is in all aspects of our lives; I have lived this and helping folks to see this is a major aspect of my calling.

The United Methodist Church has been ordaining women for 62 years, since 1956. Even though a woman's voice in ministry has been present since the early church, women find achieving acceptance of women as clergy can still be difficult. Acknowledging this struggle, you will see that the women clergy of the Arkansas Conference will wear red shoes for the ordination ceremony. This tradition extends back to the legacy of Georgia Harkness (1891-1974), the first professional female theologian in the United States. She was proud of the story of her great-grandmother, Abigail, who as a devout and outspoken Quaker, broke the mold and wore a red coat in protest of those who would suppress the voices of women. Because of her 'worldliness', Abigail , and her husband, Daniel, were dismissed from the Society of Friends. The red shoes acknowledge the importance of a women's theological voice in the Church and in the World. I will wear red shoes on the Tuesday of my ordination.

I thank you for your prayers for the ordination to which I have been called; I thank you for your acceptance of the calling of a deacon to bridge the church and the world; and I thank you for your support of a woman's theological voice and your understanding of the significance of the red shoes when Rev. Jeanne and I wear them. Thank you to each of you for joining in the journey with me!

The month of May was a busy one. We celebrated a much needed Mother's Day for all of those mom's who put up with



Come for a great meeting and hear some other exciting news.



## **MISSIONS**



What is Sager Brown? It is an UMCOR (United Methodist Committee On Relief) sponsored depot in Baldwin, Louisiana that is the headquarters for their relief supply operations. Approximately \$4 million in supplies are shipped each year from the depot to people in need around the world and across the US. They also reach out to the local community through Baldwin housing rehabilitation and food distribution programs. The more than 2,000 volunteers who come through Sager Brown each year make this all happen.

Our church has been sending VIM (Volunteer in Missions) teams of around 12 members for many years. It does involve some personal expenses including charges for lodging and meals provided on the 23 acre campus. For this year, we do have scholarship money available for one person. Work consists primarily of assembling relief kits but there is also a wide range of work opportunities allowing for all kinds of physical abilities on campus & in the community. We are scheduled to send a team this year from **October 27 through November 2<sup>nd</sup>**, so we will be looking for volunteers in the next couple months. There will be an information meeting with a PowerPoint presentation Sunday, June 24 at 12 noon in room 6, but if you have any questions now, talk to Verna Bottjen - 876-1392.

**VILLAGE HOUSE** is a nonprofit adult day program dedicated to enriching the lives of participants and providing affordable respite for caregivers.

The center provides care for individuals who may no longer feel comfortable staying at home by themselves. Persons with memory problems, Alzheimer's disease, stroke victims, arthritis sufferers or persons with other ailments and needs are welcome at Village House.

Village House offers its supervised programs of activities of daily living, but who do not require nursing care. An interview with the family and prospective participant is conducted by the director to assess appropriate placement.

Village House was established in 1988 and is licensed by the State of Arkansas Department of Human Services. They are certified to accept Elder Choice/Medicaid Participants.

Your donation to Village House will help provide services for senior members of our community in a safe, loving and happy environment.

Village House began as a volunteer organization and volunteering continues every day. From direct care workers to musicians to crafters or program presenters, Village House needs your help and support.

#### **Does This TAX LAW Apply to You??**

Good news for our Church members who use traditional IRA investments to make donations to First United Methodist Church of Bella Vista. You can now do that without having to pay federal taxes on a distribution, per the 2017 Tax bill. The following is from Kiplinger Financial:

"People older than  $70\frac{1}{2}$  can transfer up to \$100,000 per year from their traditional IRAs to charity, which can count as their required minimum distribution, but is not taxable if they follow the rules for a qualified charitable distribution (QCD). (This doesn't apply to a Roth IRA, which has tax-free withdrawals and no required distributions.) The gift stays out of your adjusted gross income only if you make a direct transfer from your IRA to the charity. It doesn't count as a tax-free transfer if you withdraw the money first and then make a donation to the charity. Ask your IRA administrator what steps you need to take, because the procedures can vary from firm to firm."

Since this process is somewhat complicated, please talk to your tax preparer and IRA administrator so you can give to Your Church and not have to pay federal taxes on that distribution. The charitable gift will remain as a tax deduction.


