Glimpses of Grace

I came across a quote on Facebook on May 15th, and it sparked the following post for me. I have received a few requests that I make it be my newsletter article for this month, so here it is!

"If a choir is only about singing and performing – there will be no choir for a while. If choir is about teaching and learning, growing, connecting, community, cultural exploration and transmission, and innovating – we will find a way to have choir." -Kellie Walsh

From the time I can remember existing, I sang. I sang by myself. I sang in countless choirs. I sang in highly selective choirs. I sang in chapels and cathedrals all around the world. All of my life, I have sung.

3 months ago, before we were in quarantine/socially distant, I wondered about this - Singing. Singing in worship... Singing on Broadway, singing on the street corner to try to pay a little more on rent... singing at the 5 concerts we had tickets for this summer, singing The Great Thanksgiving, singing ...

And now? The science field has finally spoken loud and clear: singing, yelling, anything louder than a normal speaking voice, requires more air and therefore will carry droplets farther than 6 feet. 12 feet is safe. 18 feet is safer.

Yet... singing is the first musical instrument most of us learn. Even if all we ever do is sing in the shower! Psalm 150 says, "make a joyful noise unto the Lord! ... Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!" (NRSV)

Singing is like breathing to me. Ironically, trained singers know that proper breathing is the key to good singing. That isn't lost on me. So as I help guide our church back to worship, how can we not sing, yet still make a joyful noise? How will worship still feel like worship without congregational singing? I can hardly wrap my head around it.

Yet... Psalm 150 says to use lute and harp and trumpet, dance and tambourine; strings and pipe; and cymbals-a noisy, clanging cymbal. I was recently challenged on my view of scripture and if it was merely a history textbook, a book of mythology, whether it was inspired or written by God, and tonight... tonight, I say that it is the Living Word of God. Who knew when Psalm 150 was written that in 2020 AD we would need other methods to praise the Lord? Who? Oh yeah, God.

Besides, anyone who has ever participated in choir will tell you, it's a whole lot more than singing that makes a choir, a choir. It's connection in a way that only the other people singing with you can understand. And sometimes, when you're so connected and so perfectly in tune, notes that no one is singing can be heard, and a mystical, spiritual moment happens.

Don't worry. I'll still sing in the shower, in my office, in my mom-van, in my house, and I'll likely step into the Sanctuary when no one else is around and lift my voice. (And then I'll clean the surface sitting 12-15 feet in front of me!)

Finding Purpose

We humans keep brainstorming options and plans, but GOD's purpose prevails.

Proverbs 19:21 (MSG)

So here we are still sheltered in place. What has it been, friends, 10 weeks now? So in our current normal, whatever that might be, we might ask ourselves, I ask myself and ask you, 'Have I lost my purpose during this time of isolation; have you lost your purpose?"

Maybe you typically volunteer at the hospital or at your grade-schooler's classroom at least one day each week. Maybe you regularly meet a friend at your favorite local restaurant for lunch or some downtime after work. Maybe you have been furloughed and the time in your job, accomplishing the tasks of your work and being with co-workers just doesn't happen as it once did. Maybe home schooling has come to an end for the summer and you are no longer 'the teacher'. I normally drive to Bella Vista to be at the church, helping in ministry face-to-face, up-close-and-personal with all of you. Right now, none of us can do these things as we once did. Keeping ourselves and others safe from the virus prevents it. We must respect the health of others and continue to practice the safety guidelines that have been given to us by our Bishop and our Governor.

As we sit in the moment, maybe in our rocking chair, maybe at our computer or iPad, maybe in the back yard as the children play, we might be thinking 'now what?' 'Now what am I going to do?' In today's culture of busy-ness, we are not used to being in the moment, to finding purpose as it comes to us step by step.

I think that is why a recent devotional from *Jesus Calling*, by Sarah Young spoke to me. Sarah writes these devotionals as if Jesus were speaking heart-to-heart with us and this one speaks to finding purpose in the moment. Let me share some of it with you:

'I am your Lord! Seek Me as Friend and Lover of your soul, but remember that I am also King of kings – sovereign over all. You can make some plans as you gaze into the day that stretches out before you, but you need to hold those plans tentatively, anticipating that I may have other ideas. The most important thing to determine is what to do right now. Instead of scanning the horizon of your life, looking for things that need to be done, concentrate on the task before you and the One who never leaves your side. Let everything else fade into the background. This will unclutter your mind, allowing Me to occupy more and more of your consciousness.'

My hope and prayer for all of us as we continue to shelter in place and as we may soon begin to step back into the world of busy-ness, my hope is that we will continue to hold this message in our hearts, this message from *Jesus Calling* of staying in the moment in the Lord's purpose.

And that when the tears come and my shoulders shake and my breathing falters, may it be counted as prayer.

And that when I stumble upon a Tabitha Brown video and hear her grace and love of you *may it be counted as a hearing a homily*.

And that as I sit at that table in my apartment, and eat one more homemade meal, slowly, joyfully, with nothing else demanding my time or attention, *may it be counted as communion*. Amen."

That. That is flexibility.




Because of the uncertainty of our ability to have large gatherings in the future, the Rummage Sale may be delayed or even postponed until next year. Please watch all announcements as to what will



Stewardship Corner

What is Stewardship?

In biblical terms, Charles Bugg defines stewardship in the Holman Bible Dictionary as "Utilizing and managing all resources God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation. Christian Stewardship regards the obligation of Christians in managing and utilizing intelligently the gifts that God has given. The Christian steward is not only responsible for the financial blessing provided by God but also the spiritual gifts that are given through the Holy Spirit. God wants human beings to be His stewards in the work of creation, redemption, and sanctification.

Stewards in the Bible

Joseph's story in Genesis is considered one of the best examples of biblical stewardship (Genesis 39). After Joseph was brought to Egypt, the Lord made him a prosperous man. While Joseph was in the house, his Egyptian master, the Bible says, "So Joseph found favor in his sight and attended him, and he made him overseer of his house and put him in charge of all that he had." (Genesis 39:4)

Relating to the biblical stewardship definition – "the manager of a household" – it is clear why Joseph is an extraordinary example of what it means to be a good steward.

Importance of Stewardship

According to scripture, God created Earth for mankind, and we are stewards of His creation. This means it is our responsibility to look after and take care of this world. We should accept this responsibility and appreciate God's gift of creation for being our home. Our stewardship of creation involves the caretaking of the environment and animals as well as our families and communities. Being a good steward in this world is one way of expressing our love for God and our gratitude to Him.

"As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

Trials in Biblical Times

The people who lived in Bible times were no strangers to trials. But many were also well acquainted with the character of God – a loving, protecting Father quick to console His people. He comforted them then and comforts us now.

"I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world, you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33)






Q1 If you have been worshipping online, how have you been watching worship?




Q2 If we were to continue online worship for an extended period of time, would you continue to worship in that way?




Q3 Which best describes your attitude toward returning to worship service at church? Select one:



Q4 Besides guidance from the CDC, Governor, and Bishop, what other signals would you want to see before you return to attend a worship service at church? Select all that apply.




Q5 What precautions do you plan to take when you return to a worship service? Select all that apply.


Q6 What precautions do you expect our church to take for worship gatherings? Select all that apply.



Q7 Would you be willing to attend your class or small group where it typically meets?




Q8 Which of the following describes the attendance level at which you would be comfortable attending a worship service? I would be comfortable attending if the worship area is...




Q9 Would you be willing to attend a worship service at a different time than you typically attend to allow people to be more spread out in the worship area?




Q10 Would you be willing to attend a drive-in worship via low-transmission radio with the expectation that windows remain rolled up except for ventilation and that all will remain in their cars?




Q11 What is your age?
