FAITH WALK

with Senior Pastor, Brother Jaimie J. Alexander

Do you desire to be baptized? Would you like to be baptized by sprinkling? Would you like to be baptized by immersion? On Tuesday evening, March 31 at 7:00pm there will be a special Baptism Service for persons desiring to be baptized by sprinkling or by immersion. We have baptismal founts in both the Sanctuary and in Becker Hall for baptism by sprinkling, but because there is not a baptistery for persons desiring to be immersed in our sanctuary, we have been invited to use the baptistery in the Sanctuary of Bella Vista Assembly of God for this service. If you would like to be baptized at this special Holy Week Baptismal Service,

please contact the pastors at 855-1158 to visit about your desire and to set up a time to meet for conversation.

- > Romans 6:3-6:6 tells us that through baptism we become like him in death and life.
- ➤ 1 Corinthians 12:13 declares that we were made part of one body through baptism.
- > Galatians 3:27 reads, "For all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ."

Baptism is the rite of admission into the covenant community, taking the place of circumcision, which marked the children of Israel. (Colossians 2:11-12) According to John Wesley, the founder of Methodism: "It is the initiatory sacrament, which enters us into covenant with God. It was instituted by Christ, who alone has power to institute a proper sacrament; . . . And it was instituted in the room of circumcision. For, as that was a sign and seal of God's covenant, so is this."

Baptism is a rite demonstrating the washing away of the guilt of Original Sin (into which all people are born). Romans 5:14 discusses Original Sin; Ephesians 5:26 refers to baptism's cleansing. John Wesley wrote: "What are the benefits we receive by baptism? . . . The first of these is, the washing away the guilt of original sin, by the application of the merits of Christ's death." Baptism is the rite by which God's Spirit begins a new life for a person, adopting him/her into the family of God. (John 3:5, Galatians 3:26-27) John Wesley wrote: "And this regeneration which our Church in so many places ascribes to baptism is ... being "grafted into the body of Christ's Church, we are made the children of God by adoption and grace." This is grounded on the plain words of our Lord: "Except a man be born again of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." From "A Treatise on Baptism"

We believe modes of sprinkling, pouring, and immersion are valid so long as water is used and that a person is baptized "in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit" as Christ commanded. (Matthew 28:19)

From the beginning, baptism has been the door through which one enters the church. It was inconceivable to many that one could respond to God's grace by reciting the renunciations, affirming one's faith in Christ and loyalty to the Kingdom, without joining the fellowship of those who are committed to mature in that faith. Because baptism is a sacrament of God's grace and a covenant that God has initiated, it should not be repeated. However, God's continuing and patient forgiveness, God's prevenient grace, will prompt us to renew the commitment first made at our baptism. At such a time, instead of rebaptism, The United Methodist Church offers the ritual for the reaffirmation of baptismal vows, which implies that, while God remains faithful to God's half of the covenant, we are not always faithful to our promises. Our half of the covenant is to confess Christ as our Savior, trust in his grace, serve him as Lord in the church, and carry out his mission against evil, injustice, and oppression. The word sacrament is the Latin translation of the Greek word *mysterion*. From the early days of the church, baptism was associated with the mystery that surrounds God's action in our lives. That means that at best our words can only circumscribe what happens, but not define it. We cannot rationally explain why God would love us "while we were yet sinners" and give his only begotten Son that we should not perish but have eternal life. That is the most sacred and unfathomable mystery of all. We can experience God's grace at any time and in any place, but in the sacrament of baptism we routinely experience that amazing grace.

Blessed are those who mourn...For they will be comforted. (Matthew 5:4)

Have you ever thought about this? Why are we blessed when we mourn and how are we comforted? It's not something that we think of that much, or at least I don't. Over my eight years of ministry, I have been a part of people's lives as they mourn. As they mourn the death of a family member or friend, as they mourn a



sudden change that has taken place and leaves them wishing for the good ole days. Whatever may bring on the state of mournfulness, it often does not seem like a time to thank God or think about how we are blessed.

In my almost 8 years of ministry, I have done 33 funerals, assisted a few others, and been to countless more in my lifetime. As I look out on the congregation, I see plenty of mourning and don't think much about the blessing. But at the last funeral, I was a part of I got to thinking about this scripture. I realized I was looking at it the wrong way. Yes, all of these people were mourning because of this human loss, but maybe, just maybe, the blessing comes from the memories, the moments shared with this person, a life that was well lived that led to the moment of sadness when they were gone. As, Dr. Seuss once said, "don't cry because its over. Smile because it happened."

So the next time you are at a funeral, or have some major life change and you are in that state of mournfulness, may you take comfort in knowing that you are blessed because of the memories and because your heavenly father is comforting you.

The gift of Rest

Just a few days ago, we had our first snowfall of the season. It was of such a magnitude that all the local schools and universities were closed, all the local churches were closed, and many businesses were also closed. Most of us were completely snowed in, so we could not go anywhere, if we had wanted to do so. All of the typical hustle and bustle of our lives came to a screeching halt.

What a blessing a snow day is. What I mean is the kind of day where we are forced to abandon the tyranny of the demands of daily life, the tyranny that drives us and becomes our idol; the kind of day where we are forced to slow down, even completely stop, where we must take time to "be" rather than to "do." Some of us have trouble dealing with that kind of a day; some of us relish it and welcome it with open arms. Sometimes I am one and sometimes I am the other. On that Monday, February 16, I welcomed it with open arms. Neither my husband nor I could leave. Our driveway, which is long and steep, was completely covered with a layer of snow on top of ice. It was totally impassible.

I sat in my warm, fuzzy robe lingering over my tea until noon. We put out lots of bird seed; and the birds of every variety spent the day feeding on our back deck. We saw male and female cardinals, blue jays, chickadees, doves, tufted titmice, finches, sparrows, several varieties of woodpeckers, and squirrels, as well. They all shared the seed and I marveled at the unity in their diversity. I marveled in their diversity – so many colors, the reds, the blues, the golds, the greys, the pinks, the tans and browns, each unique and beautiful. The beauty of the snow and the colors of the birds made a gorgeous picture. Before the snow, I had been carrying my own version of heavy burdens. But on Monday, I had received the gentle gift of a "snow day", a day to put that all aside and to reflect on the beauty and wonder of our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. My soul was at rest. All of us need to experience the gentleness of that kind of yoke, no ego to "do", only humility to "be". I pray that you will also find a way to be able to leave the burdens of this world behind, to take Jesus' yoke upon yourself, and to grow closer to our God during this Lenten season.



Juvenile Detention Meal Ministry

Matthew 25:37-40

"Then these righteous ones will reply, 'Lord, when did we ever see you hungry and feed you? Or thirsty and give you something to drink? Or a stranger and show you hospitality? Or naked and give you clothing? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you?' We have a small, dedicated group of volunteers who prepare a home cooked meal and deliver it to the Benton County Juvenile Detention Center in Bentonville. We then spend an hour or so, visiting with the young people who find themselves incarcerated at the JDC. As of now, we only visit about four times a year, but there is an opportunity to increase the number of our visits. If you would be interested in spending about two hours once every other month on a Saturday to visit, encourage and engage with young people who are in need of support and understanding — this is a ministry for you. Volunteers must pass a background check.

The spouse serving as caregiver will typically develop feelings of loneliness due to lack of intimacy, which adds additional stress and even feelings of resentment. Counselor Cyndie Lyon, L.C.S.W., will present information and answer questions on the topic "Beyond a Dementia Diagnosis – Dealing with Issues of Loneliness and Lack of Intimacy". If you are a caregiver for a spouse, this session will contain vital information for you.

WALK to EMMAUS spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders. The program's approach seriously considers the model of Christ's servanthood and encourages Christ's disciples to act in ways appropriate to being "a servant of all."

The Walk to Emmaus experience begins with a 72-hour short course in Christianity, comprised of fifteen talks by lay and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian discipleship, and what it means to be the church. The course is wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship and daily celebration of Holy Communion. The "Emmaus community," made up of those who have attended an Emmaus weekend, support the 72-hour experience with a prayer vigil, by preparing and serving meals, and other acts of love and self-giving. The Emmaus Walk typically begins Thursday evening and concludes Sunday evening. Men and women attend separate weekends.

The Chrysalis Flight experience is similar to the Walk to Emmaus but is designed for teens between the school ages of entering their sophomore year of High School to graduating seniors
