Glimpses of Grace

General Conference 2019 has happened. By the time you read this, I will be back home, in my own bed, and at my desk again. I must say that being present while our church decided on our future was an emotional roller coaster. I am going to attempt to summarize what happened and the "now what?"

The General Conference took a day to be in prayer together on Saturday, Feb. 23. We began the Legislative work on Sunday where the body first prioritized the order in which they wanted to perfect in legislation the some 100 petitions presented to the body. The vote revealed that petitions pertaining to clergy retirement were top priority, followed by the "Traditional Plan" body of petitions, then two plans that allow for those who disagree with the "plan" passed how they may graciously leave the denomination. And the "One Church Plan" was prioritized as fifth.

The Legislative Committee, made of the entire 864 delegates, met on Sunday afternoon and the entirety of Monday. The petitions for clergy retirement funds, the Traditional Plan, and the two disaffiliation plans, were "perfected" in legislation while the One Church Plan didn't make it out of Legislative Committee. As a reminder, the One Church Plan was one of the two plans the Commission on the Way Forward submitted to the Council of Bishops and that the Council announced they were in support of last May.

Tuesday morning, we began the Plenary portion of the Conference. The Traditional Plan as it was passed out of the Legislative Committee was deemed unconstitutional in several places overnight by the Judicial Council. The Wespath Benefits petition was passed, and then we moved to the disaffiliation plans. One of them was amended and passed and we were on to try to make the unconstitutional parts of the Traditional Plan constitutional before our hard deadline of 6:30 PM. (The monster trucks show started coming in at midnight that night!)

A minority report was given to the body to substitute the One Church Plan for the Traditional Plan and that was voted down. The body then spent the remaining time on the Traditional Plan. The vote was called at 6:15 PM and it was passed as it stood. Two more items that happened: a referral to the Judicial Council to review all work passed in Plenary and deem it constitutional or not, and a referral to the Ethics Committee on whether or not bribery took place of some delegations in order to gain their vote.


For some, this feels like a victory. For others, it feels like a heartbreaking disappointment. Still others are scratching their heads and asking, "What's going on?" We have examples of each in our church. And we love you, however you feel about the actions of General Conference. We want every single person to know that he or she is a valued member of our church body.

So what does this all mean? We are a global church with varying cultures. We are a deeply divided global church. Most every vote was a 55%/45% split. Some reports say that if the United States UMC delegates had taken a separate vote, the One Church Plan would have passed by nearly 75% in favor. We do not know what parts of anything passed will actually go into our doctrine until the Judicial Council meets in April.

For our local church, this means:

- 1. Our ministry and character of our church will not change. We will have church this Sunday. We will continue to teach the children, encourage the youth, take care of the sick and dying, and reach out in love to the community. Our focus will stay on Jesus and his Gospel of love, grace, mercy, and power. We will continue to be open to all people and welcome everyone into our midst.
- 2. We will abide by the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. We have a very diverse congregation, and the only way to order our life together is to stay in covenant. There are parts of the Book of Discipline that each of us could disagree with. It will continue to change as we move forward, just as it has for every General Conference in our history.
- 3. It was announced that our Annual Conference will host several regional town hall meetings in the coming months to explain, debrief, and answer questions. When we know the details of these, we will publicize and invite anyone who wishes to attend. (continued on the next page)





Blessed are You who Weep Now

During the month of February, Rev. Jeanne has been sharing with us reflections from the Gospel of Luke for the sermon series "#SeeAllThePeople." In this series, we come to realize that Jesus saw ALL the people, the sick, the poor, the hungry, the down-hearted. He not only saw them, he

heard them. He heard their voice, their cries for help. He reached out to them and assured them that he would bring comfort and healing. In Luke 6:21b Jesus told the crowd, "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh."

How many of us are weeping? How many are weeping for losses in our lives, weeping for losses of loved-ones who have died or who are estranged from us, weeping for loss of purpose, loss of security, loss of health, loss of self? How many of us need to find healing that will, once again, lead to laughter? Adam Hamilton writes in his book *Why*? that when God sees those who need love and healing, God sends God's people to walk with us in that need, and to bring compassion and encouragement in that need.

Have you ever been a part of a support group, a support group where your voice is heard, where you are supported in your journey in ways that bring hope and healing, and ultimately in ways that bring the laughter of new life? If you are weeping today, I invite you to join us in our Grief Support Group which will begin meeting Tuesday, March 12. In this group, each participant is treated as a unique individual who has a unique walk through their circumstance of grief. Each participant is treated with respect and caring. During this 8-week session, we will discuss what grief is, how it affects us, how it is a season similar to the seasons of the year, and how we can find hope and healing on the other side of our pain.

When Mourning Dawns – Living your Way through the Seasons of Your Grief Tuesdays, beginning March 12, 5:30-7:00pm ~ In the Chapel Refreshments Provided

I also invite you to bring a friend, for there are many of us, inside and outside of the church, who are walking silently through grief and need to have our voices heard. Jesus sees us and hears us and sends others who care. *Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.* (Matthew 5:4 NRSV) Yes, we <u>are</u> truly blessed when we join in this journey together, a journey of caring relationships which bring comfort.

We have not had much negativity leading up to the General Conference, we certainly don't want to exhibit destructive behavior now. In your conversations with those outside the church, let it be known what a wonderful, loving, warm, and welcoming church we have, despite what the press and social media are saying about the United Methodist Church in general right now.

These have been difficult days. I witnessed a very somber ending to General Conference as even those who wished for the Traditional Plan to pass were in tears over the deep divide and hurt caused by this Conference. I ask that you pray for our denomination, our church, your pastors, staff, lay leaders, and one another.

From the Organ Console Broc Hite Organist/Associate Director of Music



I'm preparing a short piano recital in Becker Hall on Sunday, March 3rd, at 12:10 p.m. It includes what we know as the Twinkle, Twinkle variations of Mozart, though he never knew that title. After that, I present the harsh six months of fall and winter from Tchaikovsky's The Seasons, after playing the spring and summer months last year. Each of these miniatures reveals a mood from Russian life and Tchaikovsky's musical language.

The highlight of my service playing will be on St. Patrick's Day, which is on Sunday, March 17th. Both composers featured were born in Dublin, though they didn't stay in Ireland for long. prelude is a piano nocturne by John Field, who invented the nocturne, though it was made famous by Chopin. Field spent most of his career in Russia following musical study with Muzio Clementi in London beginning at age 11. The postlude is by Charles V. Stanford, who moved to England for his college education and career. He wrote a hymn tune, still in the Episcopal Hymnal, that sets the words of the ancient Irish prayer "St. Patrick's Breastplate." Stanford then composed an elaborate fantasy on his own hymn tune, which is the third and concluding movement of his Fourth Organ Sonata. I played the second movement, "Tema con Variazioni", in February.

For the balance of the month, I'll continue playing some of Alexandre Guilmant's works. Plus, I'll start exploring a collection of Bach chorale preludes that I found while looking through my own scores. The collection of 33 pieces itself was itself discovered by Bach scholar Christoph Wolff in 1984 among an unmarked collection of musical scores donated 117 years earlier to Yale. The so-called Neumeister Chorales are early works, but they contain indications of the musical genius that emerged in later compositions.

SHOEBOX MINISTRY UPDATE

Thank you to everyone who has supported Shoebox Ministry with their time and/or donations of items or gifts to purchase these items.

We continue to support those who are homeless or temporarily displaced in Northwest Arkansas. These shoeboxes are packed by area churches as well as FUMCBV with travel size toiletries. They deliver the boxes to us monthly for distribution. Area shelters are contacted monthly and then we deliver to them as requested. Extra items donated that are not placed in boxes are then sent to the shelter where they can be used. Full size items, tarps, clothing items are an example. There is a home for everything!

Another project, our Sunshine Packs, certain basic items such as soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, shampoo and lotion are packed in a quart-size zip-lock bag by the ladies in Martha Circle each month. They are then taken to Cooper Elementary School. Children eligible for the snack pack program are given one of these Sunshine packs.

Many items we use need to be purchased. Your monetary donations, no matter how small, fill this need. Again, thank you for your continued support of this ministry. There are not enough words to describe what these items mean to a child.



The STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Reflection: The Stewardship of Lent

When I was a child growing up in the Shenandoah Valley, I recall that our Lutheran church focused on two aspects of the sacrificial nature of Lent. One was a mite box. My Parents placed it on the kitchen table, and each day they would put coins in it. I don't recall that I put any coins in the box. I watched. The second thing was no meat on Friday. You need to understand that this was a big deal in our house - my parents raised all of our food including all the meat. We ate a lot of meat, especially beef. No meat at dinner was noticeable. My brothers complained. That was noticeable too.

Somewhere along the line, I developed a dislike for Lent. Who likes to do without something they love? "Where's the beef?" could have been my motto. In our early thirties my husband John and I were living in Columbia, SC. I was the volunteer Christian Education Director at our small church, and I confessed to our Rector, Bob, that I didn't like Lent. He asked why, and I explained that I just couldn't make the connection between giving up something and the theology of Lent. "What's giving up chocolate got to do with my spiritual life?" I asked. The Senior Warden chimed in that he was giving up ax murders for Lent. "See," I said to Bob, "that's my point. He's not even giving up something real for heaven's sakes. What's it got to do with making us better Christians?"

Bob rose to the occasion. Lent, he said is the season that the church has set aside for us to intentionally reflect on our relationship with God, others, and ourselves. It is a time to reflect on those things that bring us closer to God and others, and those things that keep us alienated from God and others. Bob encouraged me to add something to my life in Lent, not take something away. So I began what has since become a yearly discipline. I've added such things as special daily readings, a Lenten retreat, daily worship, a spiritual discipline such as centering prayer and volunteering with the less fortunate.

Clever Bob. By adding these types of disciplines to my life, I began to take away, or give up, other things. Out of one of these Lenten habits I developed the practice of giving away at least two articles of clothing every time I buy a new one. It's a small thing that has made a big impact in my life. Another time I developed the habit of the mite box! (Isn't it amazing what children learn by just watching?!) Now I give away additional monies in Lent.

Another time I gave away old grievances, and rebuilt some relationships. I'd never pledged to the church, so one year I said, "Shoot, I'll make a 6 week Lenten pledge to the church and we'll see how THAT works!" It worked. I can't not pledge anymore. Giving draws me closer to God because I have to do without some of the material things of this life that I love. And when I move them out of the way, God moves in.

We are here as God's stewards. You and I are called to learn generosity by giving. We are called to model it for children.

Due to governmental regulation, the *Meals on Wheels* program has elected to implement a new procedure. The administers of federal assistance programs have determined that ALL persons interacting with Medicare & Medicaid recipients (i.e. meals on wheels delivery people) must have passed a detailed background check. To comply with this mandate, would require all people in Bella Vista that drive and/or deliver meals to pass this



background check. *Meals on Wheels* Administrators have decided that it would be more financially sound to hire three full time permanent drivers for the Bella Vista routes rather than pay \$15 for each of the many, many background checks that would be required. Meals will continue to be prepared at the Benton County Senior Center, but beginning April 1, 2019 the newly hired drivers will depart from the Senior Center and will be responsible for delivering all meals in a timely manner.

Therefore, with this new governmental requirement and the above decision to hire drivers, the Churches of Bella Vista will no longer be directly involved in this area's *Meals on Wheels* program. If anyone wants to stay active in this community program, please contact the Benton County Senior Center (273-7348) and they will explain how you can assist with this or any other available program.

I sincerely thank everyone who has been a loyal supporter and participant in the *Meals on Wheels* program over the past 25+ years.


