
UMW FRIENDSHIP QUILT

UMW Donates Quilt Tops and Funds to Quilts of Valor Project

UMW members and guests had the privilege of hearing a presentation on the Quilts of Valor (QOV) Project at the March 24 quarterly luncheon. Donna Roche of Rogers, northwest Arkansas coordinator for QOV told the group that over 500 quilts from northwest Arkansas have been presented to wounded military service personnel, veterans and military medical personnel at military hospitals in Iraq, Afghanistan, Germany and Veterans Administration Hospitals throughout the United States. Each red, white and blue quilt is approximately 50" by 70" in size. When quilts are ready to be mailed, the national QOV office determines which medical facility needs them.

Donna shared letters from wounded heroes, their families and medical personnel who have received quilts and expressed their heartfelt gratitude. Over 26,000 quilts have been donated nationally

About 15 of our UMW members met on two different dates and sewed seven quilt tops which were presented to Donna along with a matching pillow case for each, fabric for backing, and nearly \$300 to help defray shipping costs. The needs of our church, our people, our nation and our world are many; instead of being worried, or fearful. . .be prayerful.

"'Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God.' (Phil.4:6)

This famous passage has several qualifying factors in the command. The very first qualifier is that we are to be "careful for nothing." The Greek phrase, meden merimnate, could well be translated "let no man make you worried." This phrase, it should be noted, is a command, not a suggestion.

If we are to enjoy the peace of God promised by our Lord as a result of our requests, we must first understand that our prayers and supplications are presented before the Lord's throne without taking thought (Matthew 6:24-25) about how we might solve the problems.

Prayer takes many forms, from the lofty intercession for national leaders (1 Timothy 2:1-2) to the unprejudiced pleading on the behalf of another (Job 42:10). The Lord Himself "made intercession for the transgressors" (Isaiah 53:12) "and wondered that there was no intercessor" (Isaiah 59:16). Surely we can be faithful with this great access to the sovereign power of eternity.

Yet how often do we fail with mere personal requests and supplications? Even the "blessing" that most of us offer at meal times is recognized in Scripture as an appropriate "prayer" and "thanksgiving" to the Supplier of all things (1Timothy 4:4-5). How much more important, then, is our legitimate cry for help as we face the challenges of ministry and spiritual warfare? Knowing that our "warfare" is not a "carnal" one)2Corinthians 10:4), we should be even more diligent in "praying always with all prayer and supplication" (Ephesians)."


