WHO ARE WE? WHERE IS GOD CALLING US?

Who are we? Where is God calling us? As a church, what will we be doing in the year 2015? These are questions that constantly need to be in our minds and hearts as we seek to reach people for Jesus Christ where God has planted us.

Through the Arkansas Conference we have access to the most current demographics and based on that information the trends of where we will be in 5 years. Demographics show the following population within five miles of FUMCBV: 25% are 34 and younger; 37 % are 35 to 64; 38% are 63 and older.

Who will we be? Trends through 2013 are projected to remain steady except in population distribution. The only segment projected to increase is the 55 to 64 age bracket or the Enrichment Years. This age bracket is usually composed of "C & E" Christians (Christmas and Easter); those who were raised in church or lived in the culture where church was important, know the stories and language, but have dropped out or become nominal attendees.

Working with a church-wide committee composed of both traditional and contemporary worshipers, the following observations and proposals were made:

Becker Hall is shared space with Contemporary worship and banquet hall facilities making maneuverability cumbersome at best and sometimes dangerous with wires running across open space. The sound system literally melts down during use. Current construction of the stage is wasted space.

<u>Proposal</u>: In order to use this space faithfully meeting the needs for both Contemporary Worship and banquet hall facilities we need to lower the stage, creating more open access to stage for worship and other presentations. Storage facilities too should be added to the back third of the space. Install appropriate sound, visual and lighting equipment for Contemporary Worship. Since the piano is used for more than Worship on Sunday, it will remain at floor level.

The Sanctuary has no visual capacity and front pews crowd or would prohibit any ambient worship experiences. Our worship attendance in each traditional service prohibits combining them into one service.

<u>Proposal</u>: In order to enhance our traditional worship experience we will install appropriate visual equipment and remove the front pew and modesty rail to give more room up front.

Having passed the Board of Directors, the Finance Committee and the Administrative Council, the result is what you now see happening in the church facilities. I pray that you will pray for the construction taking place and that it will be used to God's glory. Thank you for your understanding during this time of remodeling and renewal.

The Angel Tree will be up on November 1. Each card on the tree represents a real child in our community and it




lists the age, sizes, and wants of that child.

Angel Food Ministry is slowly growing in our church and community. Three other churches are acting partners. This ministry is for everyone. Angel Food strives to relieve the burden of food purchase by offering good nutritional food at a reasonable cost. Menus are offered each month for your selection.

The Signature box is designed to feed a family of four for a week at a cost of \$30. Also, special boxes are offered each month ranging in cost from \$22 to \$28. One of the most popular is the Fresh Fruit and Veggie box at \$22.

Orders are placed and paid for during the first two weeks of each month with the food arriving for pickup in Becker Hall on distribution day at 9:30 A.M. on the Saturday following due date of orders.

FUMC also has a "Church Angel" program where food can be donated anonymously or purchased for a designated family. Donations of any size are welcomed to this ministry. 

Veteran's Day Celebration Sunday November 15


