Despite being the busiest three months of the year for me, I love October, November, and December. I love the weather. I love how people are more aware of one another. I love how active and busy the church life is. And now that I have a child, I love the fall activities we get to do together as a family.

I have always said that my favorite holiday is Thanksgiving. Now, of course, I love Easter and Christmas and all that they bring with them. But, I think my love of Thanksgiving goes way back to when I was a child. Thanksgiving was a fun holiday. For one, nothing happened at church for this holiday, so I wasn't drug to anything by my mom. We always had a huge family feast with extended family. I remember my grandma always making sure there was enough room at the dining room table for every single person. And sometimes that was a creative endeavor!

As we all grew older and physically farther apart, these kinds of traditions changed. What didn't change was that we always gathered family around the table. Sometimes this was actual family and sometimes it was family of choice. Heath and I have hosted both of our families since we've been married and it has given me such joy to do so. Over the years, we sometimes didn't have our blood-family to celebrate the day with so we just invited all of our friends who were also without family that day to our table.

I'm looking forward to the holiday again this year. First, because I will be able to sit around tables with my church family and many others from the community on Thanksgiving Day. Second, because a new home means making our old traditions fit our new circumstances.

I love the concept of gathering around tables. One of my earliest memories of reading the Gospel on my own is tallying how many times Jesus gathered with people around a table, or a party, or just gathered people together to eat. Tables are gathering places. Food is something every single human needs to exist. And, food tends to equalize people. When everyone sits down at a table together, suddenly the CEO and the factory worker are just passing the rolls. The liberal cousin is laughing with the conservative cousin. Tables and food defy societal normalizations.

We, as a church, like to gather around tables. We like to eat together. We like to experience Holy Communion together around a table, too. Our 6-year-old daughter has taken to calling Communion, "Community" lately. I don't have the heart to correct her because, she's right. When we experience Holy Communion, we experience Community.

As we gather at multiple tables over the next couple of months, I invite you to think about who is welcome at each table with you, and how may you extend the table to others?

### Walking through the Dark

Seven centuries before the birth of Christ, the prophet Isaiah proclaimed to the Hebrew people: The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness, a light has dawned. (Isaiah 9:2 NIV)

Here we are some twenty centuries later and we should ask ourselves, are we people walking in darkness? As the days get shorter and the drive back to Fayetteville each evening gets darker and darker, I can feel my spirits sag at this time of year. The lack of sunlight in the Fall leads some to a condition known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). Folks feel sluggish, lack energy, lack focus, feel hopeless; they just experience a basic lack of interest in life.

What's the cure? Scientists tell us the cure is light therapy. That's just what Isaiah said 2,700 years ago!!... When we are in deep darkness, we need the light to dawn on us!

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. ... In him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:1-5 NRSV)

Many of us find ourselves walking in the dark when we experience losses, when we experience the struggles of life. It can happen especially at this time of year. As the holidays approach and the decorative lights begin to appear, we just want to sit in the darkness.

It seems very strange that I am writing the November Good News






We will have our excellent dinner as usual and have the report on the October Prayer Breakfast.

### November Mission of the Month

As many of you may know, FUMCBV has been



the home of Shoebox Ministry for over 20 years. Shoebox provides basic hygiene items (soap, shampoo, tooth brush and paste, wash cloth, laundry soap, deodorant, razors, etc.) to homeless folks in Benton and Washington County. Items are packed into a shoe box and delivered to homeless shelters in the area. Our ministry also provides 120 "Sunshine Sacks" to Cooper School each month which contain similar items for students whose families may not be able to afford these basic hygiene items.

We are an interdenominational ministry, working with St. Bernard's Catholic Church, First Presbyterian Church of Bella Vista and United Lutheran. Our members support us by bringing in travel sized items (you know those shampoo, lotions and soaps you get in a hotel?? Those items! Be sure to pick them up and donated them to Shoebox!) as well as cash donations from United Methodist Men and Women and our congregation.

We place two orders a year through American Hotel Supply for items such as toothbrushes and tooth paste, deodorant, etc. American Hotel Supply has been gracious in keeping our costs low and shipping costs to a minimum. Donations that are received that do not "go" into shoeboxes or sunshine sacks are used to send on to women's shelters or to our troops overseas. Nothing donated goes to waste!

Homelessness is an on-going issue in our area. We may not "see" it in our day to day lives, but it is a very real problem. So far this year, we have delivered over 2,000 shoeboxes to shelters in Benton and Washington County. Our Shoebox Ministry is able to provide these basic items only through your donations of items, but more importantly, cash. Our cash reserves have reached a dangerously low level. Your donation to Shoebox Ministry will allow us to continue to reach the homeless in our community.


