As Eugene Peterson says in his prologue to this Book: "Paul's happiness is infectious...But happiness is not a word we can understand by looking it up in the dictionary. In fact, none of the qualities of the Christian life can be learned out of a book. Something more like an apprenticeship is required, being around someone who out of years of devoted discipline shows us, by his or her behavior what it is."

Paul is such a master. During these times of fear of economic upheaval, terrorist threats, children's safety, aging bodies and bank accounts, Paul can teach us how to be happy no matter what the circumstances. Christ's happiness depends not on what happens on the outside, but on the growth occurring on the inside. That is why He came to walk this earth in physical body: to grow our souls. After all, that is the only thing that goes from this life to the next.

The Book of Philippians is really about personal freedom; freedom from fear, freedom to choose happiness, to be happy. Not that we avoid, as someone who does not experience the world, but as one who experiences the world *through* the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ. As we are changed so is the world around us.

#### MISSION OF THE MONTH

#### Samaritan Community Center

Samaritan Community Center is a faith-driven, non-profit organization founded 21 years ago with a strong commitment to "Breaking the Cycle of Hopelessness" in Northwest Arkansas. This commitment by the staff and over 250 dedicated volunteers is freely given to individuals and families regardless of their faith. In addition to offering a helping hand, Samaritan Community Center also believes in providing their clients with the guidance needed to navigate the path to emotional and physical healing.

Given today's economy, the center expects to serve over 100,000 of our Northwest Arkansas neighbors this year. This is a 53% increase in clients in just 2 years. The center's waiting room is filled with clients young and old, employed and unemployed, healthy and sick, married and single - Most of whom have never before needed this level of personal assistance.

With the needs of their clients in mind, the Samaritan Community Center has offices in Springdale and Rogers and operates a Thrift Store. In addition, the center operates a soup kitchen, a food pantry and provides counseling services. For many of the clients the Samaritan Community Center serves, the most important thing offered is hope. Hope is as individual as the clients - for some it is a meal, for others a smile, and for many it's spending time in an environment where they are not judged, but loved without condition.

#### Shoebox Ministry

We so appreciate all of the donations given to Shoebox as the September "Mission of the Month". These donations make it possible to purchase items needed that are not received through regular donation.



#### **Boxes Delivered**

122 shoe boxes were delivered this last month along with 53 Sunshine Sacks to Cooper Elementary for the start of the school year. Our delivery total that we report is usually a month behind as we deliver after the due date of the newsletter.

## **BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT**

This has been a very busy summer for the Board of Directors, some of the items that the Board has been dealing with are:

The kitchen updating is nearly completed. This included a new stove, painting the walls and cabinets, adding additional electrical circuits to allow more usage of outlets in the kitchen area and replacement of the wooden cabinets in the coffee room with a stainless steel cabinet. Yet to be completed is building shelves in the coffee room, replace labels on the doors and drawers in the kitchen and replacement of the warped exit door in the kitchen.

The upright refrigerator in the kitchen failed and had to be replaced. The faucets in the large sink in the kitchen also failed and were replaced.

All the fire extinguishers in the church have been brought up to date.

Three members of the Board attended Early Response Team short course to increase our ability to respond to emergencies in either our church or the surrounding area. Another course will be taught soon at the Highlands United Methodist Church. When the date has been finalized, an announcement will be sent out and additional members will be trained. Our church should have at least 12 members trained and prepared to assist in an emergency.

The church staff has been trained in CPR and rescue breathing.

A concerted effort is underway to clear any unneeded or unused items from the church. If you know of anything that falls into this category, please notify any Board Member.

We recently reached a milestone, of sorts, the church has gone over 4 months without an air conditioning failure.

Our on-going problem with bats continues, but I believe we are getting closer to a solution to the problem.

We have had two small water heaters fail in the last few months and have had them repaired. Many other items have been addressed and replaced or repaired as needed.

Our church is slightly over 30 years old and, as a building ages, it requires maintenance and repairs. The Board of Directors appreciates the help of all members in notifying us of problems that arise in the church infrastructure that allows us to have them repaired before they become too large.
