Glimpses of Grace

Happy Fall! I am loving how wonderfully busy we are during these months! The UMW Bazaar, the UMM Pancake Breakfast, Stewardship season, fall studies and programming – they are all great! In this month's newsletter, you will find all of these activities with details, plus many more. I want to talk about the Stewardship Season, and two other items that need to be brought to the congregation's attention.

First, *Stewardship*. To many people stewardship is a "four-letter" word. We don't like to talk about money, and that is the first thing that comes to mind when we hear the word, "stewardship." However, stewardship is so much more than giving money to the church, or any organization, for that matter.

Stewardship, according to Webster's Dictionary is, "the conducting, supervising, or managing of something; *especially*: the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." This can be stewardship of natural resources, money, skills; really all the gifts God has entrusted to us. So when we have a season of focusing on stewardship, we are focusing on ALL of the gifts God has entrusted to us and in turn, committing to giving back a portion of these gifts to God.

I hope you will join us in the next four weeks as we look at stewardship through the lens of our membership vows in the United Methodist Church. If you haven't joined the church, I especially encourage you to join us in worship so you may learn more about our vows and how our stewardship is part of all of our vows.

Second, many of you have noticed a change in the parking signs outside of the Office Door. The pastoral staff and a few others have decided to park elsewhere in our lots so that guest and handicap parking may be more accessible to the door. We feel that it is important to show our guests that they matter more than the pastoral staff and that we prioritize their presence with us. New signage will be up soon to designate these places as guest and handicap guest parking.

And, finally, something else I wish to bring to your attention. As you know, we moved from having three pastors on staff to two in July. Pastor Brenda and I feel that this transition is going well. We have also found that the only area that this may be felt is in pastoral care. We are doing our absolute best to visit everyone in the hospital and rehabilitation regularly. However, we have come to realize that we simply may not be able to visit daily, especially to those in the hospital. We will at least touch base by phone on the days we cannot make a personal visit to the hospital. For those in rehab, we want to let you work on your rehab and rest, so as a policy we don't visit as often, but do keep up with you regularly. As always, we cannot know you or your loved one is in the hospital unless you let us know. The pastor on call checks the office voicemail regularly when the office is closed (evenings and weekends).

Above all, please keep our church in your prayers daily. I am constantly excited and energized by you and the many awesome ideas you are bringing forward for how we may make disciples of Jesus Christ who make more disciples for the transformation of the world!

Are You Listening?

Know this, my dear brothers and sisters: everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to grow angry. James 1:19 (CEB)

Are you listening? Are you really listening? I absolutely abhor TV talk shows where the participants spend all their time talking, no - actually shouting, over each other. Everyone is so busy selfishly and pridefully making their own point that they make no effort to listen to others. It seems that only disrespect and a quest for power are behind this behavior. I personally find it impossible to focus on a situation like this. I can only wonder if the participants are listening to the message the other person is trying to share, if they are truly listening to one another.

In our daily lives, we are bombarded by so many messages that sometimes it is hard to focus. We are so filled with things to get done that there is no time to pause and listen to what is going on around us. There is no time to hear our friend or spouse or partner, no time to listen to the words of our children or our teachers, no time to listen to the voices of the birds or the whisper of the gentle breeze. We are so rushed to move on to what is ahead that we find no time to listen to the present, no time to <u>be</u> present in the moment or with another person.

In her book, *Practicing the Sacred Art of Listening: A Guide to Enrich Your Relationships and Kindle Your Spiritual Life*, Kay Lindahl quotes the statistics that "Most of us spend about 45 percent of our waking hours listening, yet we are distracted, preoccupied, or forgetful 75% of the time." She goes on to discuss that listening is a choice, a gift, and an art. When we choose to listen, we extend the hospitality of the gift of being heard, of "feeling understood, refreshed, whole, connected, and healed." We build relationships when we listen, when we truly listen. But when we truly listen, it does something within <u>us</u> as well. Journalist and author Paul Hawken writes, "When we listen to people, our own language softens. Listening may be the cardinal act of giving...! think it is the source of peace."

You are invited to be a part of a group study as we share in listening, in relationship, and in peace through reading Kay Lindahl's book, *Practicing the Sacred Art of Listening*. The date and time of this will be announced during the month of October. Be listening for this announcement and let's join in the journey together.


"By loving kindness and truth, iniquity is atoned for, And by the fear of the Lord one keeps away from evil." Proverbs 16:6



Center of Benton Control

Children's Advocacy Center of Benton County

The Children's Advocacy Center of Benton County (CAC) opened January 10, 2000 to provide a safe place to serve sexually, and physically abused children in a supportive child friendly environment. At the CAC abused children and their families can receive the support needed to deal with the abuse. We are available to serve all Benton County child abuse victims under age 18 after a report has been made to the child abuse hotline.

Services provided are:

- ♦ A child-friendly and non-threatening environment
- ♦ Trained forensic interviewers
- Specialized Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner and an on-site medical exam room
- Child advocates to assess family needs and provide follow-up, support, and referral services
- On-site counselors available to meet with the child and non-offending family members
- ♦ All services at no charge to the family
- ♦ A child-friendly and non-threatening environment

In 2016 the CAC opened 950 cases; conducted 976 forensic interviews; performed 230 forensic medical exams, provided 2,116 counseling sessions to children and their families and facilitated training and education events to 9,213 people.

Your support of October's Mission of the Month makes a huge difference these children.

Our thanks to Steve Larsen for facilitating the purchase and installation of the 16 new DMX lights in the Sanctuary. Along with the existing lighting, we are still adjusting them for focus, color, and intensity to make what you see the best possible view for any given activity of worship.

It is opportune to recognize one individual whose contribution to FUMC's facilities is paramount. Keith Sterwald. He has been without the shadow of a doubt a person selflessly giving of time, talent, and presence. He has removed and installed equipment, lights, systems, walls, doors, electrical works, televisions, plumbing, et cetera in an effort to make the environment safe, efficient, and pleasant. And the more volunteers we have trained, the less any one individual is called on to sit in the booth and enhance worship for everyone. Dedicate one hour per month.
