Glimpses of Grace

Dear Friends.

The air is crisper, pumpkin spice is everywhere, it must be fall! And, in the church world, our last few months of the year are usually the busiest! I am excited that our staff met and planned programming, worship, and events through the end of the year with Plans A, B, and C depending on what restrictions we have in place. You'll see several of these events and information about them in the following pages.

We're hearing from several of you that you are frustrated we are not worshiping in person yet. The Relaunch and Leadership Teams are constantly monitoring the pandemic situation. We understand that many other churches have opened in varying degrees and you're wondering why we have not. We continue to adhere to the two principles that we began using back in March: "Love your neighbor as yourself," and "Do no harm." In that regard, we have been looking for a positivity rate below 5% for Benton County for 14 consecutive days. We get to about day 5 or 6, and we then have a spike for a few days. We wanted to monitor the schools reopening and the cases from Labor Day weekend. The Relaunch Team met this last Tuesday and decided to move forward with Small Groups being allowed in the building following the guidelines below, beginning October 1. We have set a date to slowly begin inperson worship and will send the entire congregation a letter about a week prior to that date with the protocols needed in order to keep everyone safe and healthy.

Small Group Indoor Guidelines

- 1. Designated group leader will be in charge of reserving the space with Janet Walton, taking attendance, room set-up, taking temperatures, and asking health questions.
- 2. All are required to wear a mask and maintain social distancing.
- 3. Limited to no more than 20 attendees.
- 4. Meeting to last no more than 30 minutes. This includes gathering and exiting.
- 5. Room must be sanitized after the meeting by leader or designated person.
- 6. At any time, the church may have to close the doors again if the community spread is in our area.

If you have any questions regarding these guidelines or the worship guidelines you will hopefully receive this month, please contact Amy Gilmore, Chair of the Relaunch Team, at amy@fumcbellavista.com or 479-855-1158.

Like many of you, I am conflicted. I miss you. I miss your hugs and warm smiles. I miss worshipping with you in the same room. I miss fellowshipping with one another. But I also love you too much to place you at risk or in harm's way. As one Relaunch Team member said, "I feel that we need to open to allow people to gather, but I won't be there." We, with the guidance from our Bishop, Governor, and the CDC, are praying that we will safely be able to begin gathering in the coming weeks. We will go slow and will stop if the risk seems too great, or if we have a positive case that has been in the building. In the meantime, I hope you will consider joining us for the many socially distant, outside events we also have planned!

Finding that Still, Small Voice

Then He said, "Go out, and stand on the mountain before the LORD." And behold, the LORD passed by, and a great and strong wind tore into the mountains and broke the rocks in pieces before the LORD, but the LORD was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire; and after the fire a still small voice. So it was, when Elijah heard it, that he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood in the entrance of the cave. Suddenly the voice came to him...

(1 Kings 19:11-13)

How our times these days are like the chaos that is happening in this scripture: winds, earthquakes, fires! It swirls around us and we feel the anxiety that comes with all the chaos. Are you feeling this anxiety now? There are days when I feel it.

So what do we do? We step out and wait for the chaos to pass and for the arrival of that still, small voice. My mother recently had some outpatient kidney surgery. She has had kidney issues for decades, but it had finally developed into the need for surgery. I was a tumble of anxiety. The surgery went very well, but the chaos came during the recovery: high blood pressure readings, pain, nausea. What should have taken an hour in recovery stretched to more than three hours. After a long day which started early, I took her home, fed her, tucked her in, kissed her, and turned her care over to her CNA's for the next 48 hours. At home, I fell into bed exhausted. But I slept well that night. In the morning, I heard that still, small voice. It brought a peace which told me 'I am with you. Sit with me. All will be well."

I often read my morning devotional from *Jesus Calling* by Sarah Young. One recent morning, the words brought this same kind of peace. Sarah Young writes, "Wait quietly in My Presence while My thoughts form silently in the depths of your being. I am the Creator of the entire universe, yet I choose to make My humble home in your heart. It is there where you know Me most intimately; it is there where I speak to you in holy whispers. Ask My Spirit to quiet your mind so that you can hear My still, small voice within you. I am speaking to you continually: words of Life...Peace...Love. Tune your heart to receive these messages of abundant blessing." (September 21, *Jesus Calling*)

Do you make a time to wait quietly in the Lord's Presence, that He may speak to you in holy whispers? In this crazy world where we live, you have to intentionally make this time, otherwise the chaos will take over. I pray you will find a way to join together with our Lord in this gentle journey, that you may hear that still, small voice beyond the mayhem and the madness of our world.

Arkansas Conference of United Methodist Church Disaster Response Ministries and Volunteers in Mission are partnering with several different organizations to rebuild a home. This home in Pine Bluff was destroyed in the wind storms that occurred on Easter Sunday this year.

This is a mission opportunity for the whole church. Anyone of any age may participate. (Youth under age 18 must be accompanied by an adult chaperone from their church in a 1:10/1:7 ratio, children under 12 must be accompanied by a parent.) All must adhere to COVID-19 guidelines.

Friday evening Oct. 16th, from 4pm-7pm, about 20 volunteers will meet in the parking lot of First United Methodist Church Conway to set up and cut lumber for each wall of the home. Saturday, Oct.17th, from 8am-2pm, 70-100 volunteers will assemble the individual walls of the home. No experience is required and all tools will be provided. At a later date volunteers will transport the walls to the stand-up site. A group of volunteers from Christian Aid Ministries, a partner in Disaster Recovery, will install the roof system. Volunteers will be needed to complete the exterior and interior of the house over the next couple of months.

OTHER NEWS



- * Kids of all ages are invited to drive thru the church parking lot to get treat bags! * For the safety of those handing out candy, kids and guardians are asked to wear a mask inside their vehicle while driving from trunk to trunk.

Trunk hosts are invited to park in the church parking lot and distribute candy (while wearing a mask and using a grabber to hand out candy)

Trunk or Treat is one of our largest outreach events, giving children a safe place to collect candy and show off their costumes! Every year, we receive compliments upon compliments about how well we execute this event. We'll need your help to make this Trunk or Trunk as good as the last!

This has not been a great year for anyone, but it's particularly hit hard people in the live music industry. As Covid-19 has been indiscriminate in its infecting adults of all ages and incomes, it has also affected the livelihood of performers of all styles and genres.

I count myself somewhat lucky. The church kept all salaried staff on at their full salary, and let us figure out a path forward. Instead of working with the Chancel Choir, I work with the soloists you hear in their place at the Sunday offertory. If you've watched the Wednesday evening service, you may notice that I also joined "The Band", as Kenneth calls us. I even recorded a bunch of music on my Weekly Acorn series that you can still find by going to my Website and clicking *Listen* under the Performing heading.

I was also blessed by my piano students. They all went online during the week that the church and schools closed, and stayed with me through the end of the spring semester. Over the summer, I did lose some students to relocation and online school fatigue. Those who did stay took more lessons than usual because they had nowhere to go on vacation.

Through some aggressive recruiting efforts, I now have 20 students this fall, which is quite a bit higher than I've had in past. I even have an online student who lives very close to the church. I'm still accepting students, if you know anyone who is interested!

That's where my luck ran out. Almost all of my occasional and seasonal work performance work evaporated. My biggest seasonal gig, playing semester-ending juries and a graduation ceremony at the University of Arkansas, went away as students were sent home in the spring and did all of their work online. The spring ballet exams I play for were also cancelled. Even here at the church, memorial services were conducted without me at the organ bench, except for one service where the organ music was amplified outside through the magic of Kacy Spears!

There was an event called the Red Alert Restart, #RedAlertRestart for those on Instagram. I missed the announcement for this September 1st event, focused on trying to get new legislation to help performing artists out of work, plus encourage those who enjoy live music to find a new way to support it. It got me thinking about the businesses that I've shunned since March, and I've tried to support them once again, while staying fully masked and not putting myself in harm's way.

What are some of the things that you used to enjoy prepandemic, that you haven't thought about since? If you like to go out to eat, can you try outdoor dining, take-out, or curbside pickup? If you like music, can you find an outdoor event to support? What are some ways that you can add little splurges back into you life in a safe-as-possible way? I'd love to hear your thoughts!

HAD GREAT GOALS FOR 2020 AND THEN.....THE VIRUS



Stewardship Corner

Christian Stewardship: It's not Your Treasure to Bury by Regan Rose

I don't know about you, but there's only one place I've ever heard someone use the word "stewardship," and that's in church. It's not an exclusively Christian word, but if Oxford ever published a *Lexicon of Christianese*, "stewardship would most certainly have an entry. Sadly, if this theoretical dictionary did exist, the definition for Christian stewardship would probably just say, "See tithe."

I say that would be sad, not because stewardship has nothing to do with finances, but because such a narrow definition of Christian stewardship robs us of a full-fledged understanding of the matter of Christian stewardship. If you're trying to become a productive Christian, you need first to understand that everything, not just your money, belongs entirely to God. Your time, energy, resources—absolutely everything—belongs to God.

Such a holistic view of stewardship is precisely what the Scriptures teach. If we take this responsibility seriously, it will dramatically affect how productive we are with our lives. So, let's look at one of the key New Testaments texts on stewardship. Here are four observations about Christian stewardship from the Parable of the Talents.

The Heart of Christian Stewardship

In Matthew's account of the Parable of the Talents, Jesus, speaking of the Kingdom of Heaven, says, "For it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted to them this property. To one, he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away" (Matthew 25:14-15).

Those people charged to look after the man's things while he was away are stewards. A steward is someone who is charged with looking after something on behalf of someone else. In this story, the master charges his servants to look after various amounts of money while he is away.

Now, this may seem obvious, but it is key: Whatever it is, a steward has been charged to look after it does not belong to him. So, in the story, the master doles out money to three servants, "each according to his ability," then he leaves (15). The first two servants invest that which was entrusted to them and make a handy return. "He who had received the five talents went at once and traded with them, and he made five talents more. So also, he who had two talents made two talents more" (16-17). Excellent work, stewards! But what's wild is the servant who had been entrusted with one talent hoarded it like a crazy lady on a TLC special. "But he who had receive the one talent went and dug in the ground and hid his master's money" (18). The servant who buried the talent had no business doing so. It wasn't his money. He was supposed to invest those things which his master had entrusted to him. It was not his treasure to bury.

Here, then, is the heart of Christian stewardship: It doesn't belong to you, but you are responsible for making good use of it for the Master. That means whatever God has given you stewardship over, it is not yours to waste. If it belonged to you, then, of course, no one would have any right to tell you what to do with your resources. But it doesn't belong to you.

You can't bury your time in video games, bury your cash in frivolous purchases, or bury your energy in unworthy pursuits. Because it's not your time, it not your money, and it's not your energy—they all belong to the Lord. And He has entrusted them to you so that you might invest them and make a good return for Him until He returns. But what exactly has God given us to watch over?

The Domain of Christian Stewardship

The next important question is this: What does Christian stewardship encompass? What do the "talents" represent? What precisely am I responsible for looking after? One way to answer these questions is first to answer another question: What of mine belongs to God? The short answer is everything.

Your money belongs to God (Haggai 2:8)

Your soul belongs to God (Ezekiel 18:4)

Your life belongs to God (Romans 8:9)

Indeed, everything on earth belongs to God (Deuteronomy 10:14; 1 Chronicles 29:11; Psalms 24:1; 50:10; 12)

Money

Money, therefore, is to be used to sustain yourself and your family, but it is also to be used to care for suffering saints, promote the cause of gospel advancement, and provide support to your local church. These are eternal investments that, if we want to be faithful stewards, we need to get serious about.

Time

Similarly, the specific allotment of time you have been given on this earth is not a mistake; a random number generated on some heavenly computer. Psalm 139:15 says, "in your book were written, every one of them the days that were formed for me when as yet there was none of them." Yet, so many live as though after being saved, the rest of life is simply a waiting room for heaven. So, they occupy themselves with aimless distractions instead of recognizing that these few short years, we also have talents which the Lord expects us to invest. It seems like when it comes to worthy activities with eternal benefit; we never have enough time. Yet, we always seem to be able to squeeze in one more episode, one more game, or a few more minutes for the things we really want to do.

Energy

The same is true for energy. In this age of laziness, some of us are far too careful about managing our energy levels. Don't want to overdo it! Got to be careful not to burn ourselves out! And while there are those who are prone to unhealthy levels of activity and refuse to rest, I think the majority of us use the specter of "burn-out" as an excuse to be slothful. We stay home from church Sunday morning because we had a big Saturday. We don't volunteer to help brothers and sisters in need because we had a big week.

Always in need of a mental break, we squander the allocation of energy which the Lord had entrusted to our stewardship on temporal pursuits. Not necessarily bad things, but energy is a limited resource, and a steward often needs to say "No" to otherwise good things so that he/she can say "Yes" to energy investments, which will yield higher returns for the master.

Other Resources

And the same is true for every other resource you have at your disposal. It's all God's. As the parable indicates, not all have been given more, some less. But all have some resources loaned to them by God. Perhaps it is your connections, your living situation, your job, or your abilities. These, too, should be invested for the glory of the King of Kings. Christian stewardship demands it. Our resources are not our treasure to bury.

So, the domain of Christian stewardship extends beyond finances to all of life.

The last few paragraphs may have felt like a guilt trip, like I'm telling you that you must make some massive sacrifice of joy to be a good steward. But Christian stewardship is really an immense privilege.




