Pat Reid - Servant Heart Scholarship



You have to be pretty new to our church not to recognize Pat Reid. She has served on nearly every committee and ministry; she's a natural leader, giving orders with the best of them, but she is also the first one in line to scrub floors or make coffee. Over the past couple of years Pat has begun to pass her leadership responsibilities in the church to others. It's not easy, because she can still keep pace with most of us. But we are glad she is able to sit back (occasionally) to enjoy the rewards of hard work.

Pat is also active on community boards and organizations. Her favorite is the Single Parent Scholarship Fund, where she was honored by having the "Servant Heart Scholarship" established in her name. It is a \$2000 continuing scholarship, given to a deserving student over and above the basic scholarship each is given. Jim Russell, President of the organization, had this to say about Pat, "Whether serving punch at a gathering, stuffing envelopes, or interviewing students, Pat Reid is a mentor. Pat's natural administrative expertise and her nurse's training make her especially valuable as she works with our students and our office staff. No job is too menial or too complex. With grace and a sense of humor, Pat comforts our students and suggests solutions."

Pat will want you to know that Single Parent Scholarship Fund is a program for Benton County that enables students to pursue their educations and helps them avoid dropping out because of unexpected financial hardships. They are celebrating 25 years of service in this area. Pat his been with them for over 20 of those years. In 1984 they provided 22 scholarships for a total of \$3,900. In 2009, they awarded 491 scholarships for a total of \$383,757. We are proud that Pat was recognized for her efforts in the success of this group. We also want to recognize other members of our church who serve on the advisory council of this board: Dan Chase, Bill and Aggie Danenhauer, Mary Margaret Roberts, Karen Schroll, Dawn Thompson, and Bob Toney.

Mission of the Month

The September Mission of the Month is

Restoration Village. This is a local nonprofit home and is supported by churches and individuals. It is a residential provider of hope for women, often with children, who are in crisis stages of their lives. These may include physical, sexual, or emotional abuse. The village is also home for unwed mothers who have no other place to go.

Their work continues as a result of God touching the hearts of people to contribute unselfishly to the finances of Restoration Ministries. Restoration Ministries receives no government, state, or municipal funding and depends solely upon people like you who believe and support second chances for all of God's people. We believe and confirm that all people are God's image and deserve to know His love, His compassion, and His restorative power.



MISSIONS

The United Methodist Church is at the forefront of providing care, sustenance, and nurturing for people in need everywhere in the world. The Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church is very active in its Volunteers-In-Mission (VIM) Program. Outside of Arkansas, the teams work under the auspices of the United Methodist Commission on Relief (UMCOR). UMCOR is normally one of the first organizations to respond when help for people is needed because of a natural, or man-caused, disaster anywhere in the world.

Putting our faith into action is at the very heart of our Christian calling. The New Testament instructs His followers to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, give shelter to the homeless, heal the sick, care for the widows, and nurture the children. Through VIM, every person in the church has the opportunity to serve and live life more faithfully. Bella Vista FUMC has a Volunteer-in-Mission Program and a number of trained VIM leaders. We have responded to the Hurricane disaster areas in Louisiana and Mississippi over the past three years, and we are ready to respond again when the need arises. Our next "hard" scheduled mission is in April, 2011, to Sager Brown UMCOR Depot in Baldwin, LA. We anticipate more trips before that date.

We realize that not everyone is physically capable of handling the rigors and work demands of some of the mission trips. However, everyone can be of great assistance to the VIM program by providing funds to offset the costs of a trip, which can be extensive. There is an account maintained by the FUMC Bella Vista Finance Office for VIM needs. If you wish to participate, please make out checks to Bella Vista FUMC with "VIM" written in the lower left hand corner.

ENDOWMENT FUND MAKES PROGESS POSSIBLE

Count your blessings, Name them one by one, And it will surprise you What our people have done!

In 1991 Mary Wales, Leonard Carter, Carmen Heck and Pastor Dorman took the first steps to organize our Endowment Fund. In 1997, our Charge Conference took official action to establish the fund. The people involved in the 1997 Charge Conference proposal were Rogers Scoles, Rod Alford, Mona Johnson and Pastor Dorman.

Since that day, much has happened. Numerous individuals, through bequests and direct cash gifts, have built our Endowment Fund to over \$600,000. From that permanent fund, earnings are taken annually to fund special projects for our Church. Since 1997, nearly \$100,000 has been expended for specific items which we have not asked individual members to underwrite.

So far in 2009, \$38,400 has been spent from the earnings on the fund. Part of that was for two humidifiers needed to stop deterioration of the organ and piano due to dry air in the Sanctuary. We also made a financial gift to the Youth Confirmation program and we are thankful for the 16 youth who benefited from that program.

All of the money in the Endowment Fund comes directly from you in gifts and bequests honoring people, in memory of friends and from your heart. Many members have also remembered the Endowment Fund in their estate planning.

Once the men receive their packet of six tickets they may choose to sell them, or in many instances individuals simply choose to make a personal donation of \$30 to cover the cost of the tickets and give them away. For those individuals that may have not gotten their tickets at this point, they may be picked up in the church office.
