Pastoral ministry is an opportunity to experience blessings, challenges, different types of situations and people, life, death, and the powerful presence of God.

August of 2013, I celebrated the 30th anniversary of being called into ministry as a pastor. I felt the call of the Lord the month before I started my senior year of High school. When I confessed my calling, I was met by joy from people as well as surprise and disappointment from others. During my senior year I began my candidacy process for ministry in the North

Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church with my pastor, Bro. Ben Jordan, shared my call story on Easter Sunday, and met with the Conway District Board of Ordained Ministry, the first time of many. After High School I attended Hendrix College, a United Methodist affiliated college in Conway, Arkansas. During my college years my call to ministry became more apparent and I began serving in great ways in my local church. I was very afraid of the next step that I would be required to take and that was to relocate out of state to enter into seminary. God prepared the way and softened my fears as I moved to Atlanta, Georgia to attend Candler School of Theology at Emory University. While in seminary, I served as a chaplain at Piedmont Hospital on Peachtree Street in the Buckhead neighborhood, was a clerk at a Christian Bookstore, and cooked weekly in a church as an employee all at the same time while attending classes. In all my business and demands on my time I was increasingly aware of the faithfulness of God.

After graduating from seminary with a Masters of Divinity, I moved back to Arkansas and served a two point charge. The two churches on the charge were in Fulton County. One was in the town of Mammoth Spring and the other was in the Community of Camp. The Camp church did not have indoor plumbing. It had two outdoor privies, one for men and one for women. After three years there I was appointed to churches in Fort Smith (2 years), Des Arc (6 years), Rogers (7 years), Conway (2 years), and now Bella Vista. Along the way, I have met both the kindest and the meanest of people, the found and the lost to the knowledge of God's love, truly committed Christians and those who were playing church, self-righteous Pharisees and Christ-centered believers. I have attended countless funerals, memorial services, weddings, worship services, church meetings, fellowship meals, and all types of church related events. I have stood beside hospital beds, sat in waiting rooms, held dying people, announced unexpected deaths to unsuspecting family members, offered comfort to families in crisis, witnessed the miracle of birth, offered support in both good and bad times. I have also been praised, criticized, misjudged, liked, deposed, spoken to as if I was stupid and confided in with trust, welcomed and unwelcomed, threatened to be shot, had two attempts to be punched in the nose, held many crying people, witnessed a family brawl at a funeral, offered many Kleenexes to catch tears, missed many vacations and times with family, given up days off, received gracious gifts, and formed many lifelong relationships but through these 30 years I have witnessed the presence of God who is faithful always.

Ministry can be both life-giving, stressful, easy, and hard, I have discovered. What I have come to realize if I was not called to it by God, I would have quit many years ago and began a new career. The reason I have endured in these past 30 years by living out Christ's calling is because God has equipped me to faithfully face each day with the power of His grace and the knowledge of His love. I thank each of you for being a part of my call story and for giving me opportunities to experience the faithfulness of God in your lives, the ministry of the Church, and in my life personally.

I am unaware of what the next 30 years will hold, as we all are, or even if I will have 30 more years to live. But what I am aware of is that God is faithful. I know that daily I will encounter His faithfulness.

God is faithful!

We are under construction.

If you notice any loud noises or mysterious smells from downstairs it may be our remodeling efforts for our youth and children's area. Our former Shoebox ministry room and Bazaar storage rooms were previously unfinished storage areas.

They are being transformed into a new dynamic youth area. Keith Sterwald and Ed Fisher have been adding electrical outlets and revamping our heating and air systems to effectively handle the new ministries that are transitioning downstairs. All their efforts are helping our church become much more energy efficient while providing appropriate heating and cooling.

Our new Director of Youth Ministries, David Hanson, has jumped right into the construction along with our youth. Together with the Board of Directors and myself progress is happening pretty rapidly. We have solicited costs from contractors for the work, but have chosen to do a lot of the work with our volunteers. Doing the work ourselves we are saving a lot of money. Currently we could use some people with expertise in hanging and finishing sheetrock. But even doing the work ourselves paint and materials can be expensive.

If you don't have any skills or time for construction, monetary donations are always welcome. Currently we have some money set aside for the renovations, but we need help from everyone to help our facilities become a focal point for our church. Currently our rooms are furnished with some leftover items and some newer furnishings of poor quality and durability. One way you can donate is through directed donations for the purchase of specific items such as tables, chairs, storage cabinets and technology, such as TV screens. Your donations can be designated for these items that we have selected to furnish our youth and children's

EDUCATION

In 1 Timothy 3:14-17, Paul emphasizes to Timothy the importance of staying the course, continuing in what he knows, believes and lives, for it is God alone who provided divine revelation to the writers of the scriptures and the teachers in which Timothy followed. True learning comes from God's perfect Word, the Bible; it provides guidance and encouragement for daily Christian living and values, and eternal life.

Christian Education is a vital necessity in your spiritual growth and daily living. This Fall FUMCBV is offering four Small Group studies for a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.

"The Wesleyan Way, A faith that Matters" is a class for new and old members seeking a greater understanding of our United Methodist Church theology and beliefs. The class day/time will be announced through Sunday's bulletin and will be led by Pastor Lee Myane.

"Henri Nouwen Discernment" is a book study for young families to answer the essential question by every Christian and seeker: "What should I do with my life?" The class day/time will be announced through Sunday's bulletin and will be led by Pastor Lee Myane.

SALT (Single Adults Learning Together),

Bible Study: "Bible Basics" Tuesdays, 9:00am, Room 5. First class is Sept 3. A 90-minute weekly Bible study led by Jan Lowe, for beginning and intermediate students. We will study the story of God, beginning with Genesis. Participants should bring a Bible to class. Homework is optional and discussion is expected as we consider together: What does the Bible say? Who are the key people? What can I learn from them? How can I apply it to my life today?

"Revelation, a Wesleyan Perspective"

What is the fantastic book called Revelations? The reason it seems fantastic to us is the apocalyptic style in which it is written, often a barrier to our understanding the message of the Book. The aim of this study is to fill in some more gaps in our understanding and to show how both Old Testament and New Testament scriptures, and indeed Revelation itself, provide many of the keys to the interpretation of the Book of Revelation. It is rooted in particular with Old Testament imagery, but a detailed study reveals a New Testament perspective. It has wisely been expressed that we shall only recognize the events in Revelation when they happen. Until then, let us explore to understand the theological meaning of these events; to understand what God is saying to us in this Book; and, to explore what God is saying to us in world events.

Revelation is a frequently neglected Book partly because its symbolism makes it obscure. Therefore, it should *not* be read lightly but with attentiveness; it will yield its treasures to those who seek them. Nora Robert's "The Witness"

Francine Rivers "The Mark of The Lion" (A 3 Book Series)

The first book "A Voice in the Wind" concerns the struggle of the early Christians as the Roman Empire cracks down on any group that dares to challenge their authority. Atretes, a German warrior, is captured as Rome expands its kingdom northward. Atretes is a champion in the arena and is able to win his freedom. In the second book "An Echo in the Darkness" Atretes becomes embroiled in the degrading life style of the Romans. In the third book "As sure as the Dawn" Atretes becomes acquainted with some of the Christians who are making their way out of Rome. Atretes wants to go back to his homeland Germanis and joins the group. Throughout his acquaintance with Theopolis, Luke's friend, and other Christians, Atretes becomes a strong believer and helps to evangelize the people of Germanis.


