Listening with Ears of the Heart

As we hear the first whispers of fall with the cooler weather and the exclamations of children beginning a new school year, I am reminded of how busy our lives can become this time of year. Carpools, fall festivals, vacations, homework, sporting events, friends and family can all vie for our time. Before we know it, our calendars are overflowing their

borders with commitments, and we are gasping for breath as we wonder how we will accomplish it all. And we haven't even begun the holiday season yet!

My mind shouts, "Full steam ahead," "No rest for the weary," and "There's much to be done before the day is done." My heart whispers, "Slow down," "It can wait until tomorrow," and "Be still and know that I am God." I wrestle between my head and my heart. I struggle with letting go in a "Go get 'em" world. But scripture reminds us where God can be found.

As Elijah stood on Mount Horeb after escaping the wrath of Queen Jezebel, he encountered God. The LORD said, "Go out and stand at the mountain before the LORD. The LORD is passing by." A very strong wind tore through the mountains and broke apart the stones before the LORD. But the LORD wasn't in the wind. After the wind, there was an earthquake. But the LORD wasn't in the earthquake. After the earthquake, there was a fire. But the LORD wasn't in the fire. After the fire, there was a sound. Thin. Quiet. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his coat. He went out and stood at the cave's entrance. A voice came to him and said, "Why are you here, Elijah?" 1Kings 19:11-13 CEB

Being present with God in the thin and quiet is a choice we make. It is an important choice. It requires surrender to the Lord. It requires courage and commitment. Sometimes we choose to spend time alone with God as we study scripture, pray and reflect where God is working in our lives. Other times, we choose to be with God in the presence of other Christian believers. By gathering with other Jesus followers in a small group setting, we encourage, support and learn to surrender together. Playing on Team Heavenly Virtues, as our current sermon series encourages us to do, requires us to surrender to God's presence and influence often. We can't expect to live a life of virtue without practice.

For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part, but then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. 1 Cor. 13:11-12 (NRSV)

Another Year on the Journey

Here we are at the beginning of a new school year with brand new challenges and opportunities ahead for many of us. For most of my life I have either been a student or a teacher. I find the rhythm of the school year life-giving. Each new year is a new journey, a journey in learning and understanding, a journey with opportunities to grow. The year is filled with challenges and struggles which bring steps in the right direction, interspersed with a few stumbles and falls. If we pay attention and apply ourselves, at the end of the school year, we can speak and think and reason more fully than we could at the beginning of the year. Typically we find that we have progressed in ways beyond what we expected or even imagined. Summer brings a chance to take a rest, to catch our breath, and to let the new-found understanding percolate within us. And then in the fall, we take another giant step forward in the new growth as we move to the next "grade" to face the new challenges of yet another school year. I love that rhythm: learn, reflect, and grow; learn, reflect, and grow....

Spiritual growth is like that. Each year of life itself gives us new challenges and opportunities to grow in understanding of God through God's grace and love. Each year, and in fact, each day, brings us new insights of God and of our relationship with God. We have to pay attention and apply ourselves; and if we do, as Paul wrote to the church of Corinth, over time we see more clearly. At the very core of our being, we humans have a yearning to know God more fully.

N.T. Wright, a modern-day theologian, says in his book *Simply Christian* that "spirituality is a hidden spring that bubbles up within human hearts and human societies." Our indefinable thirst to see and know God, a longing for springs of living beyond what this world can provide, is an indication that our humanity is created for more than this. Wright calls this yearning an "echo of a voice", God's voice, within us. Are you taking opportunities to satisfy the yearning to know God; are you paying attention so that the image of God in the mirror grows clearer with each passing year? We may not have thought of it this way, but we are all theologians; all of us have a faith that nudges us to seek a greater understanding of God. Let this school year be the one where you find an opportunity to grow: be a part of a small group study, or a Sunday School class, or a Bible study, read and reflect on the Scriptures on a regular basis, spend time daily in prayer, look for God in your life each day. God is there; we just have to pay attention and reflect on God's image. When we are intentional about this, the image grows clearer and brighter with each passing day. As Paul said, "Now we know only in part; then we will know fully." Join in the journey toward knowing fully. You will be so glad you did!



PRAYER SHAWLS

The Prayer Shawl group, off for the summer, will be back to regular 10:00am Tuesday morning meetings in Room 6 on September 15. Some of the knitters continued their work from home during the summer months, and have now added a couple new elements to their ministry.

A few months ago the group began knitting **Prayer Coverlets** to be given to newborns or children who are seriously ill.

Most recently, **Prayer Cloths** are being made, prayed over, and blessed, to be given to those who have a serious circumstance but have already received a prayer shawl. The Prayer Cloths are 4 or 5 inches by 5 or 6 inches.

And last, **Prayer Squares**, a smaller version of the Prayer Cloth are being made, prayed over and blessed and put in baskets at various places in the church that anyone can pick up for themselves or to give to others when there is a particular prayer need. Initially, the Prayer Squares will be in a basket in the Narthex. As more squares are knitted, baskets will be placed in Becker Hall and the Chapel.


Frustrated in your walk with God? Easily distracted in your devotions? Habitually overcome by selfishness? Overwhelmed by the cares of this life?

It caught my eye and when I turned it over, the name Bob Dittmer was on the back. What talent and love he must have put into making that cross for the church. I kept it for a year until I discovered a current member, Dick Bacon who does beautiful woodworking and he has graciously made 4 duplicates of Bob's work which will be for sale in our Bazaar this year. Bob's cross has been preserved, hanging in the chapel now as well as duplicated for others to enjoy. If you take a look around the walls of our church, especially in the chapel, you will find other examples of past member's talented works.

Also, at Christmas time, you will find decorations on the chapel tree that were found in the back of a closet and were made by former members back in the 70's, as were most of the Crismons on the Narthex tree. I wonder what stories they would tell about the fun and fellowship those members had while creating those decorations, much the same as we do today down in the Quilting room every Thursday.





Volunteers in mission service come and help with the refurbishment of homes, low-cost clothing and furniture is provided through the community store and local crafter's wares are marketed to a wide area through the craft marketing ministry. A wide variety of ministries to families, older adults, women and children, and youth make their lives fuller and help them receive the assistance they need to make their lives a bit more livable.

Support for these ministries come from churches and individuals across the nation. Over the years the Mission has enjoyed wide support in The United Methodist Church as well as from other denominations.
