Summer Message 2023

It's been three weeks since we gathered as the Arkansas Annual Conference in Hot Springs, and I am still reflecting on and giving God thanks for that event. As we move into full-on summer, I want to share some thoughts and information with you.

Conference staff and other leaders have already held multiple conversations to evaluate our work and to process the feedback that some of you have sent in. (You can still share your own evaluation <u>here</u>.) We heard you say that you enjoyed the theme of "Come to the Table" and the way it was woven through the conference, including the round table format and time set aside for getting to know folks from other churches. We learned again the power of sharing our stories with one another, and we provided our own foretaste of how those conversations might go with new friends and partners in ministry. I have also heard of the inspirational spirit of the laity session, where folks were lined up at the microphones to share the good mews of what God is doing in their churches and communities.

The movement from lament to hope was a healing one, and our worship was well-designed by the planners and powerfully executed by our musicians, both in the plenary and at First UMC Hot Springs. Many of you have expressed your appreciation for the musical setting of the communion liturgy we used in opening worship and have asked if it could be shared. The author of those lyrics has updated her work, which you can find <u>here</u>. She does ask that you contact her to use the liturgy and that you share the attributions as indicated. I have enjoyed using this and other musical settings for holy communion for some time now, and it was delightful to share that celebration with you. Additionally, my Episcopal address can be found <u>here</u>.

The ordination service was another high point. I will never forget the sound of that sanctuary, its very rafters ringing with the preaching and the sound of your voices raised in song. The Holy Spirit was running loose among us for sure! We also remembered those who have gone on to glory, with a good word of hope. We celebrated the faithfulness of our retirees and the joy of new clergy beginning their journey.

In addition to the work of worship and reclaiming our common identity, we tended to the business of the conference. We held plenary discussions about conference resources and how they can best be used to strengthen and equip ministry in local settings. We examined the nature of our link with and support of the general level of our denomination. And we pointed toward the need for strategic conversations in the year to come, as the transition of disaffiliation continues and the newest chapter of our journey in mission emerges.

Since coming home from Hot Springs, I have passed my six-month anniversary here in Arkansas. I continue to delight in traveling around the state, getting to know you, and growing in appreciation for your ministry. I give God thanks and praise for the stories of churches impacted by disaffiliation who are making new, vital, hopeful strides forward. Congregations are busy with creative takes on Vacation Bible School and feeding ministries of every sort, with enormous impact. Our youth have served on mission trips, kids have gone to camp, and adults young and old have tutored children in reading. To be clear, busyness is not the point, but connecting and serving is. There is no doubt that God is inviting us to do good work, and the people of the Arkansas Annual Conference are responding to that holy invitation!

"Come to the Table" is a real thing-it is indeed God's call to us, God's welcome to us, and ours then to pass along,

so that all might have the chance to meet Christ at that table. We are healing, we are growing, we are sharing, and now God is urging us to scoot over and make more room! I pray your summer brings rest at some point and a change of pace. May God bless you and your churches in your ministry!

Lay Leader's Message

was a conclusion I read awhile back in an article. formed to renew the church. Small groups like At any given moment, about one out of every two loneliness. It doesn't matter if you are an extrovert or introvert, rich or poor, young or old, we all are vulnerable.

Loneliness and isolation have grave consequences for our mental health, physical health, and collective well-being. This includes anxiety, depression, heart disease, stroke, dementia, and obesity on a personal level. In addition, the loss of social connection leads to reduced productivity in the workplace, worsening performance in school, and diminished civic engagement on the societal level.

Loneliness was not unknown in Wesley's eighteenth century. It was a time of massive social dislocation, with people being forced out of rural areas into cities and coal mining areas where they found themselves alone.

Methodists formed Societies to provide assistance and counter their isolation. This is only one instance of Wesley's insistence that Methodists befriend people experiencing poverty. Methodism itself was an antidote to loneliness. Wesley's movement was not a church, but a

America is facing an epidemic of loneliness. That connection of larger societies and smaller groups class meetings served many purposes, such as Americans is experiencing measurable levels of weekly accountability for faithfully practicing spiritual disciplines, but they also brought people closer together.

> As Wesley said, "Participants now happily experienced that Christian fellowship of which they had not so much an idea before. They began to "bear one another's burdens" and naturally to "care for each other." As they had a more intimate acquaintance daily, they had a more endeared affection for each other.

> Yet even in the absence of human company, there is One whose presence we can always rely upon. Wesley believed that since Pentecost, the Holy Spirit brings the presence of God to all people and indwells who have faith in Christ. God is close, not far away, and will be there when all else fails. On his deathbed, John Wesley found the strength to say, "The best of all is God with us." He would agree with Paul in Romans 8 that nothing, not even death itself, can take us from the love of God

With your indulgence, let's back track just a little in order to pick up some additional items that were contributed or events that occurred prior to September 1996 when the 20-year anniversary was celebrated. Some items were highlighted in previous history articles and will not be included here. I have been reading with gratitude, "A History of First United Methodist Church, Bella Vista, from 1976 through 2003" which was painstakingly compiled by now-deceased member, Bill Detlefsen. The following information is contained in that history.

In 1990, Rev. Harold Fitch was named "Second Associate Minister." I did not see his name in the other historical compilations I have been reviewing and wanted to make sure this information is included.

Moving along, on June 16, 1992, the church Trustees accepted two handmade gifts. The first gift was a needlepoint picture of The Last Supper, stitched and presented by Yvonne Wright for the Chapel (still there; check it out). The second gift was a portrait of Georgia and Vernon Becker, painted by Carol Peters, and presented by Carol and Joe Peters. That painting was hung in Becker Hall, and is still there. Also in 1992, a "flowing fountain" was placed in the atrium as part of the "Lethem Memorial."

There are a couple of items to add for 1993. Approval was given for Jocelyn Bernholdt to be affirmed as Diaconal Minister. The courtyard between the old and new parts of the building (the atrium) was named the "Walt Lethem Prayer Garden," planted and decorated by Elaine Lethem and her family. This is the peaceful area where one can sit in the shade of dogwood trees, listen to the water in the fountain, and watch bluebirds around their little house. Let me know if any of you have the date when the bluebird house was installed.

That will save me hours of culling through minutes and newsletters and would be much appreciated

Do you remember when the church had 29 Shepherd Groups? Oh my! In 1993, that number was reduced from 29 to 21. Up until that time, the groups had simply been numbered, so I assume that is why we still have a "Shepherd Group One." When the number was reduced, a decision was made to rename the groups after the books of the Bible, using male names only, in order to prevent confusion with Circle names. That obviously changed later and is a story for another day.

The big news in 1994 was that a number of areas at the church and the parsonage were in need of updating and repair. Some money was borrowed and a fund-raising campaign was started in order to refurbish the parsonage, repair the parking lots, update various systems, and refurbish pews and wood paneling. This shows how quickly things can deteriorate and the ongoing need for funds for repairs.

In 1995, Albert and Janice Condra gave to the church a framed crocheted rendering of the Lord's Prayer, later hung in the Chapel/Parlor.

We will stop here for this month. Hopefully, you haven't fallen asleep reading this. If you wish that I would not continue with this recitation of historical events, you are welcome to provide your story of how you came to the church. Mission of the Month: AUGUST



Every time a child sits in our interview room to speak with one of our forensic interviewers, the conversation is recorded. The hope is to prevent the child from having to retell their story to mitigate the effects of trauma.

Through the Lens of a Forensic Interviewer

Earlier this spring, Kallie, one of our forensic interviewers, sat with a child during a forensic interview as they told their story. We recognize the

power of collaboration and the strength of a multi-disciplinary team and one crucial component of this approach is the invaluable presence of a prosecutor during these times. With their deep understanding of the legal system and commitment to justice, prosecutors bring a unique perspective to the multi-disciplinary team approach. In this particular instance, their involvement ensured the legal aspects were carefully considered, minimizing the opportunity for this child to have to re-tell their story and lessening the chances for re-traumatization. Together, our team is breaking the cycle of abuse and building resilient families.



In 2022, 45% of the cases we heard were sexual abuse.



We see all ages from infancy to young adult with allegations of child maltreatment.



90% of children seen know their offender.
