How time flies! Is it really Advent, the season of waiting and preparing for Christmas already? There is so much to do at this time of year: decorating, baking, visiting, and feasting, choosing the right gifts and wondering what gifts might be received.

In the midst of this flurry of activity, simple questions might pop into our heads: "Is this what it's all about?" or, "Is there something more?" Perhaps after the food is eaten and the gifts unwrapped, you ask yourself, "Is there a gift out there somewhere that would really satisfy me?" If we are honest with ourselves, that is what we want in life—something that can meet our needs, help us with our problems and decisions, bring comfort, happiness, and peace.

The good news is that there is such a gift. It is custom-made just for you and is given by someone who knows exactly what you need right now. It gives you more than anything money can buy. And it comes from someone special, who knows you and loves you deeply, and who wants only the best for you.

I pray for each of you as you begin and continue following our Savior whose birth we are about to celebrate.

We took some detours down memory lane the past couple of months. We paused in September to remember the tragedy of 9/11. We took time in October to honor Dr. Larry Zehring's 30 years of service to FUMC Bella Vista. Then, in November, we expressed our thanks to all of those who have served our church over the years in any way, with highlights on United Women in Faith (United Methodist Women) and United Methodist Men. Now that we are feeling properly thankful, we will return to the past with recounting our history.

In the September narrative, we ended with some activities and achievements in 1997. What happened next? Let's see. I did find one more item of interest for 1997. Bill Detlefsen reported the following in his history of the church: "UMW member Sharon Golaway and family presented the program for the United Methodist Women's 25th Anniversary Tea on December 3." We have now passed the 50th year. How time flies!

Moving on to 1998, here are some other quotes from Bill's history that highlight service and progress that year:

"The Library board reported that the UMW books are catalogued and the list will be distributed in February." (This is a good time for a reminder that there are excellent books in the UWF library and in the library in general. Happy reading!)

"Rod Alford's assignment in March was to visit new members at their homes, and give them information about the church, then write a short biography for the newsletter." (Visits and biographies continue all these years later.)

"In December, the sixth pictorial roster was distributed. The opening pages included a brief history of the church, photographs of the sanctuary and ministers Teague, Whitfield, Wilkerson, Hammett and Senior Pastor Wendell Dorman."

There were some changes in staff during 1998. In June, Thomas S. Stone joined the staff as an Associate Minister, and Joy Bernholdt was ordained a deacon in full connection. In addition, Rev. Paul Johnson had some health issues, so Rev. Dick Ihne replaced him as an Associate Minister.

In reviewing and researching our history, I have found that there are a number of nonprofits in NW Arkansas that we have been supporting for a long time. In 1998, Mountains of Food monies were distributed to Soul's Harbour, Arkansas Rice Depot, Helping Hands, and Care and Share. Other mission assistance included sending a vehicle to missionaries in Bolivia, Pennies from Heaven funds to Habitat for Humanity building in Third World countries, participating in Habitat for Humanity projects locally, collecting donations for relief of tornado victims in Manila, AR, and for hurricane victims in Honduras, declaring the Oklahoma Indian Mission as one of the "Missions of the Month," and supporting the PAK-A-SAK program.

Some fun activities in 1998 included a Christmas dinner theater program called "Nautical but Nice," produced and directed by Sharon, Mark, and Miki Golaway, a music department dinner, the annual Watermelon and Cantaloupe Feed, a Memorial Day informal worship service at Tanyard Creek Pavilion, and Thursday Night Alive services.

Enough history for December. Have a truly blessed Christmas. As my Aunt Shirley likes to say, "Remember that Jesus is the Reason for the Season."

"Advent: Symbols of the Second Coming" Ret. Rev. Cathy Luck



We know the biblical story of Christ's first coming among us: how he was born in a stable, to the young maiden, Mary, and her betrothed husband, Joseph. We know how she rode on a donkey on the way to report for the census in Bethlehem, ultimately giving birth in a stable (or cave). We know how the shepherds heard the angels sing, "Glory to God in the highest," and the wise men followed the Star. This Advent, let's learn about symbols that have assured Christians that Christ will come again in glory. Most information about these symbols will be found in "The Book of Revelation to John," the prophecy of Daniel, in the letters of Paul and Hebrews, and the Jewish books of Enoch.

These symbols lurk in the background of our Advent Celebration. They include trumpets, the scroll, the two-edged sword, the number seven (seven assemblies, seven stars, seven seals, etc.), the tree of life, first fruits, golden bowl. and

What about the wreath, the Christmas banquet, colorful Christmas blooms? When Jesus died and was resurrected without a seemingly fulfillment of all physical reality, believers looked for a deeper "universal" understanding to his life and ministry. In the words of Father Richard Rohr, "Resurrection is about the whole of creation, it is about history...everything that has been changed, over great expanses of time." (p. 186 The Universal Christ)


