Church, the body, and the circle of sinners-turnedsaints, is where He resides, and if we ask, He is faithful to come.


So even on the hard days at church —

"Seeing In the Dark" Ret. Rev. Cathy Luck



It's a phrase that must have been used for a book or a movie, or perhaps it is a poem. What you may not know is that these four words describe the outcome of the mystical "Dark Night of the Soul". I used to think that the dark night was a time of severe depression and desperation, a time when one feels like giving up, a time when God or any divinity or power seems remote and uncaring if not absent, and I assumed that was all the dark night.

What I realize today is "the dark night" as just described is actually not about someone or something outside, but about us. Whatever the circumstances around or within us that lead into the darkness, our physical, emotional, and spiritual senses are engaged in a different way than usual. Isolation, achiness, and physical illness are some of the ways we respond. We may feel afraid or angry. We may feel tired. We may be grieving. We may feel cold. We don't understand in our minds what has changed, why it has changed, or what we can do about it. Do you hear the egocentricity in this description?

The truth is the ego can no longer pursue, achieve, and control in the stage of faith known as "the dark night". This darkness is literally a step in the process of spiritual formation. The darkness may have started when the faithful person intentionally began to let go of control as a positive step toward growth with God. However, as the time of loss and letting go expanded, so did the darkness. The story of Job comes to mind. From beginning to the end, we read of a God-fearing man who is attempting to hold on to his faith in darkness. In the arguments presented by his friends, Job does not find any light. I can just imagine that after every argument is presented, another light goes out. What happens after four lights have gone out is total darkness. Then Job learns to "see in the dark". Perhaps without even realizing that his next utterance is one of faith, Job questions God. What? God is

there in the darkness to hear his plea? I'm not even sure that he expected God to answer. Job was making a plea into the empty lightless night. But when God speaks, Job begins to be able to see again.

"Seeing in the dark" is my new realization about the dark night of the soul. Before we move on to the next stage of faith, first we learn to "see in the dark." It's not just a return to the way things were before the darkness, but it is a new way of seeing the world. As if we were created for the night, we are given new eyes that see we are not alone.

Advent in the Christian calendar is an annual symbolic time for experiencing the dark. The twelve days of Christmas are a symbolic time for discovering the presence of the numinous in the dark. And Epiphany is for formulating and sharing our stories of what we have discovered with others. May we feel this rhythm in the coming days, weeks and on into the new year.

Disciple Fast Track I

Becoming Disciples Through Bible Study

Many members of our congregation have completed four years of Disciple Bible study. The rewards are immeasurable! Have you always wanted to know more? As the Psalm says, "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet, a light unto my path."


Adapted from the original DISCIPLE I study, this twenty-four week study was developed in response to the time demands of busy lives. Revised and updated for the BeADisciple Study App, the digital version of Disciple Fast Track I offers a sweeping survey of Scripture, from Genesis to Revelation, with readings that cover the equivalent of about half the Bible.



Disciple Fast Track I includes commentary, Bible reading, and scholar videos. Weekly meetings are 75 minutes each.

30 minutes / day 5 days / week 24 weeks

All materials needed can be accessed through your smart phone, tablet or computer. Once-a-week group sessions will be conducted on Zoom. Do you have a friend or family member who would like to participate with us? Using the digital app and Zoom classroom, we can have participants from all over the world including our snowbirds! 




Silent Auction Thank You


