Dhat's the (Hi)Story? Jill Hale, FUMC Historian



It is hard to believe that Easter is behind us, and we are already into April. Last month, we explored the happenings at FUMC Bella Vista in the year 2000. Let's take a look at 2001.

As you will recall, we learned last month that the Board of Trustees had determined that the Sanctuary needed renovations. Funds were raised, and work commenced. In January 2001, the project was completed which included new carpet and new pew installations, as well as the laying of the slate floor in the Chancel. According to "A History of First United Methodist Church Bella Vista" written by Bill Detlefsen in 2003, the first service in the remodeled Sanctuary was held on Sunday, February 4.

Throughout the building, ceiling and walls were cleaned and painted, and light fixtures were repaired and polished. Many church members assisted and are specifically named in the church History. These include members who are still active in our church today. We sincerely thank all of you who have continued your service and devotion to FUMC Bella Vista for these many years! During this time, new air conditioning was also installed in Becker Hall, and heat pumps were installed in the office and in the Sanctuary. This may not be exciting information, but it shows that the church was thriving if these items could be purchased. In fact, one entry references the "rapidly growing church."

There were many activities during 2001, including a golf tournament in October. It was an 18hole event with 132 golfers participating and raised a net profit of \$4,159. United Methodist Men and United Methodist Women contributed to the purchase of 16 card tables and numerous chairs for use by the many various groups.

Ministry opportunities abounded during this time. One could be involved in a bereavement program called TLC (Tender Loving Care), in Stephen Ministry that extended a caring hand to congregants in hospitals, nursing homes, and private homes, in a special program called "Igniting Ministry," or in cooperating with the Ministerial Alliance to provide worship services to Concordia and the Village House.

As always, UMM and UMW were active throughout the year. Everyone enjoyed the Pancake Day in May and the Bazaar in the fall. A series of dinners were held in Becker Hall throughout the year to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the church. Each month, a different group of early members was recognized. For instance, at the January dinner, members who joined between 1976 and 1978 were honored. Other church activities included Disciple I, II, and III classes, and two Wesley Series film festivals.

The attacks that occurred on 9/11 resulted in a review of the Flag Code for flying flags at halfmast and of security measures for the church.

One final item I found of interest was the mention of something called the "501 Club." Congregants who had signed up pledged to pay \$10 each time a call for help was received, with not more than two "calls" each year. The "call" in May 2001 was for the Arkansas Rice Depot, which was unable to provide food and emergency supplies because of the severe ice storms in December 2000, when their shelves became depleted. Our members contributed \$2,360 to this effort.



Saving A Child's Sight

As members of the Bella Vista Lions club, Maryann Johnson and I do vision screening of preschool children at twelve preschools in Bella Vista, Bentonville, and Rogers. We screen approximately 500 children each year.

Why do we do it? Our mission is to save the sight of even just one child and give a child a chance of better vision and succeeding in school. The younger a child is when we discover a vision deficit, the easier it is to correct.

We use a screening device manufactured by Welch Allyn that can detect seven different problems with a child's eyes in seconds. We usually spend two days at a preschool, so we can screen as many children as possible. If a child is referred for an additional examination, the parent is given a copy of the report created by the screening device to take to their optometrist, like the one at right.

This report is very useful to the optometrist giving him/her a place to start the examination, in part because the screening device is over 99% accurate.


We do not often hear about our successes, but one mother wrote us a note after we referred her child for an additional examination. It read: "Thanks for doing this! Because of you, we discovered he was losing sight in his left eye. He can see perfectly fine in his right eye, but that's all. His brain was using it and shutting his left eye down. Now, he will always have a deficit in his left eye, but it's not nearly as bad as it could have been. Thank you."

Through the Bella Vista Lions Club, we are able to provide glasses and medical treatment for vision problems for people meeting the U S poverty guide lines. We also have low-vision readers to loan out.

This is my mission and I intend to continue as long as I'm physically able to do so. It is my small way to serve God's people.
