MAY 26, 2024 TORNADOES IN BENTON COUNTY

















IN THE WEE HOURS OF THE MORNING OF SUNDAY, MAY 26, SOMEWHERE BETWEEN 5-8 TORNADOES TOUCHED DOWN IN NWA WREAKING HAVOC, CAUSING MAJOR DAMAGE AND WIDESPREAD POWER OUTAGES IN DECATUR, BELLA VISTA, CENTERTON, BENTONVILLE, AND ROGERS. MORE AREAS WERE AFFECTED, BUT THESE WERE THE HARDEST HIT CLOSEST TO HOME. THE PHOTOS ARE OF DAMAGE IN ROGERS TAKEN THE FOLLOWING DAY. ROGERS SUSTAINED OVER \$33 MILLION IN DAMAGES ALONE. OVER 64,000 CARROLL ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS (HALF OF THEIR TOTAL CUSTOMERS) INITIALLY LOST POWER DUE TO DOWNED POWER LINES. IT TOOK MORE THAN A WEEK AND THE ASSISTANCE OF 11 STATES TO RESTORE POWER TO ALMOST EVERYONE. DESPITE ALL OIF THIS, ONLY 3 LIVES WERE LOST IN BENTON COUNTY. ROGERS HIGH SCHOOL OPENED ALMOST IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE STORMS TO FEED AND TEMPORARILY HOUSE VICTIMS. THEY ALSO COLLECTED MONEY AS WELL AS A NUMBER OF ITEMS TO DISTRIBUTE TO PEOPLE. AS OF MONDAY, JUNE 3, FEMA IS NOW ON THE GROUND, SO ROGERS HIGH SCHOOL CLOSED THEIR OPERATION FRIDAY, JUNE 7. ALL ITEMS AND MONIES COLLECTED WILL STILL GO TO



TORNADO RELIEF. EARLY ON, FUMCBV BEGAN COLLECTING THESE ITEMS ALONG WITH MONETARY DONATIONS. OVER THE COURSE OF MORE THAN A WEEK, THE MISSIONS TEAM AND DELIVERY VOLUNTEERS DROPPED OFF MORE THAN THREE LOADS OF DONATED GOODS AND A CHECK FOR \$4,000. WE ALSO GAVE \$1,400 TO UMCOR AND PLAN TO CONTINUE TO SUPPORT THEIR RELIEF WORK. THANK YOU TO EVERYONE WHO GAVE SO UNSELFISHLY OF THEIR TIME, THEIR WALLETS, AND THEIR HEARTS.

June? Really? How can that be? The year 2024 is zipping away so quickly that it makes my head spin! Maybe we can slow things down just a little bit by traveling back to the year 2003. Here are some activities that took place in 2003 that I found interesting:

- William Evans was the guest speaker for the first in a series of Elder Life Phase programs. He is the co-author of AstroFit and a pioneer in the field of age reversal. You might want to look up that book. It was written to help astronauts stay fit.
- On January 18, a retirement luncheon was held to honor Rev. Jocelyn Bernholdt.
- The United Methodist Women (now UWF) project for the year was to collect items to be delivered to youth in detention centers in our Conference area.
- The new sound system in Becker Hall was declared "completely operational."
- "Thursday Night Alive" events were held on four Thursday evenings during April. These were sponsored by the Education Committee. Over 200 members attended one or more of the sessions.
- The entertainment for the United Methodist Men's Ladies' Night was the Perfect Harmony Quartet. I wonder how many times Perfect Harmony, the Men's Chorus, or the Women's Chorus has performed for Ladies' Night over the years. Perhaps I will reach a total as I continue to research our history. The more things change, the more they stay the same.

- According to Bill Detlefsen, this notice was in the June 15 bulletin: "That tall tube you see in Becker Hall is a quarters-only Goat Bank. When that tube is full, it will buy one goat from the Heifer Project International." The Goat Bank was filled up in three weeks, and another Bank was immediately set up.
- On July 12, a Handbell/Chime Festival Concert was held in the Bella Vista Community Church, featuring bell choirs from six Bella Vista churches. The concert included solos by Dawn Thompson and Marjorie Hemphill-Salomo. For those new to the church, Dawn Thompson directed our handbell choir for many years.
- A Healing Conference was held in the Sanctury on July 25 and 26 in conjunction with the Order of St. Luke the Physician. The Conference was led by Rev. Dr. Jack Sheffield of Austin, Texas, and was attended by 200 people from Arkansas and nearby states.

Many other activities took place in the church during 2003. I just chose a few to highlight.




