Methodism started as small groups.

John Wesley and his brother, Charles, were 18th century Anglican priests, presbyters, and the founders of what became the Methodist Church. They developed the Holy Club, or small groups also called "classes" and "bands" to help people grow in their faith. Small gatherings - with no other purpose than to be together - speak in part to our fundamental need to connect with others in the human community. God created us to be in community with one another.

God never intended for us to live the Christian life alone. How can we apply these "one another" references unless we are in intentional, close relationships with each other? God calls us to love, not in an abstract or superficial way, but in a deep, face-to-face, life-on-life, transformative way - which is difficult and inevitably messy.

In our modern culture, small groups are often viewed merely as a program or a fellowship ministry within the church. But for the New Testament church, it was a way of life, encompassing every area of their lives. Their relationships with one another were critical to their pursuit of Jesus, their growth in Christ, and their witness to the Good News. It would be impossible to experience biblical community apart from spiritually significant, intentional relationships with other believers. Small Groups Are a Mission Beyond Themselves

Matthew 28:19-20 "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything that I've commanded you. Look, I myself will be with you every day until the end of this present age" (CEB)

John 13:34-35 "I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you also must love each other. This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other." (CEB)

The Great Commission in Matthew 28:19-20 mandates that every follower of Christ is on a mission to "go and make disciples of all nations." Jesus gave this instruction to all His followers, both as individuals and as the body of Christ. We, as a small group and as a church, bear collective witness to the good news of Jesus Christ.

One of Jesus' final instructions to His disciples is found in John 13:34-35. Note that Jesus did not say people will know we are Christians by how many churches we build, how many Bible studies we complete, how many prayers we say, or how many people come to our church. The litmus test is clear: people will know we are Christ-followers when we love each other the way Jesus does.

Theologian Francis Schaeffer asserted, "Our relationship with each other is the criterion the world uses to judge whether our message is truthful— Christian community is the final apologetic." Our nonbelieving friends, family, co-workers, and neighbors are watching and deciding on the validity of the gospel message. We need others to help us live lives worthy of God's calling so that people will see the power of God's love in and through us.

Ultimately, small groups are a way of living out our purpose, both as individuals and as a collective group of believers—to be the church. We share a common foundation of faith, and God has called us to live out the implications of that faith in a relational community, in the context of small groups.

Small Groups Can Be Life Groups/Gathering Groups

The reality is we often gather but we need to do it intentionally. We need to focus at least two main facets of our "casual" gatherings into a more "Christian community" effort.

Just as I have loved you, so you also must First, we must be aware of who is being left out. Who has not been invited? As already noted, it's not about whether someone belongs, but whether we have made sure they feel truly invited as if they already belong.

> Next, does the gathering group meet often enough on a regular basis to meet our fundamental need to connect with others in "life" – to develop that sense of community. Most of "life" occurs outside of the Sunday mornings in the church building so it is the connections outside of Sunday Worship that are so important. Gathering Groups are best when meeting weekly or at least monthly. That takes intentionality.

> The good news is the gathering can be centered around so many different things like breaking bread together in a home or a rotating list of homes. Staying on the topic of food, meeting for brunch at a restaurant or gathering at a rotating list of various eateries are also options. Gathering could mean holding a monthly potluck at the church on a Saturday (bring a dish and two cans for the Blessing Box), or carpooling as a group to a movie or live theater show on a regular basis. A group may be defined by their homes being in close proximity. Maybe you share a common collegiate or professional fandom, so you gather to cheer together in a home (or stream on the church screens in Becker Hall). You could start a new game group or work together on an ongoing community cause. What connections already exist? If none, let's create them because we are called to do just that.

And finally, it's okay to be in more than one.

MISSIONS SUNDAY

On Sunday, December 29, we will have a Unified Service at 11:00am in Becker Hall. It will be a mix of Classic and Casual music. All of the offerings collected during this service will go to the General Missions Fund which we use throughout the year to help local worthy causes. (Yes, Missions Sunday is on December 29 and not in January, but this newsletter will be published before then.)

A Missions Team Update from 2025 Team Co-Lead, Ted Lasher

Earlier this year, the FUMCBV Missions Committee was brought back to active status under the leadership of Steve Terry, joined by numerous previous and new committee members.

Over the past months, your Missions Team identified and made donations to 3 primary recipients: Bella Vista Boys & Girls Club (\$5,000), Cooper K-4 School (\$4,735), and Saving Grace NWA (\$1,500 + \$2,000 approved for Jan. 2025). Additionally, designated funds were distributed to the Blessing Box (\$1,171), Snack Packs (\$2,947), Habitat for Humanity (\$1,800), NWA Women's Shelter (\$50), and the Heifer Project (\$84). Moreover, FUMCBV members donated \$3,350 to UMCOR and another \$3,900 locally for disaster relief associated with the storms of this past summer! We have also supported 2 additional UMC organizations: Methodist Family Health (\$1,450) and Ozark Missions Project (\$1,366). In total, \$29,353 will have been donated by January 2025.

A large portion of these funds had been accumulated prior to this year. So now we need to identify ways to maintain Missions income so we can continue to support these organizations and programs here in our community. The Power of One (lengthwise folded bills in the weekly collections), and a designated monthly budget amount are our ongoing means of funding. Obviously, we will need to identify additional fundraising activities.

Missions Sunday, Dec. 29th, will be our first additional fundraiser for the Missions Committee. As Pastor Ron explained in the announcements, ALL money received during that combined 11:00 service will go to Missions for next year's donations. Please note that monthly auto-paid donations will not be received on the 29th and will not be included in the Missions Sunday funding. If you want to mail in a Missions donation, please indicate "Missions" on the check. Thank you in advance for any donations you make on the 29th. We also hope to identify additional Missions fund raisers during this next year.

In January, all Circles will have their Pledge Services that help UWF missions in the State, Country, and the World.





What is Sager Brown?



Sager Brown is an UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) sponsored depot in UMCOR Baldwin, LA, that is a center for relief supply operations. After being shut down for a few years because of COVID, they are up and operating again, shipping out approximately \$4 million in supplies in response to disasters in the US. They also reach out to the local Baldwin community through housing rehabilitation, food distribution, and educational programs. The many volunteers who come to Sager Brown each year make this all possible. It is a mission experience for all ages, capabilities, skill sets, and de-

sires to support God's children who have undergone a disaster in their lives.

Our church sent teams through 2019, and we are wondering if there is any interest in doing it again. It does involve some personal expenses for lodging and meals provided on the 25-acre campus. Work consists primarily of assembling the 4 different relief kits, but there is also a wide variety of work opportunities allowing for different physical abilities on campus and in the community.

If there is enough interest, we will try to schedule a trip sometime later in 2025. *We will meet* briefly on Sunday, January 12, in between services at 10:15am in Room 6 to discuss this mission.
