



Charge Conferences each church holds every fall. A key part of any reporting must be based on the definitions, the clarifications, of what a "vital faith community" looks like, feels like, and accomplishes. The Bishop and Cabinet have marked it by seven key attributes – the first step.

- Welcoming, Spirit-filled worship+
- Lay Leadership identified and equipped for ministry in the church and the world
- Small group and intergenerational ministries
- · Relevant ministries with children, youth, and young adults
- Connectional work in partnership with others
- Intentional work for healing and reconciliation

They are based on other mainline denominational research results and are scripturally-based.

# **Lay Servant Ministries**



### Introduction to Lay Servant Ministries

This course is foundational for all courses in Lay Servant Ministries. Participants are encouraged to discover and employ personal spiritual gifts as God intended and to consider the importance of exercising servant leadership, developing future leaders, remaining rooted in consistent spiritual practices, and being part of a group that holds members accountable in their discipleship.

#### Lay Servant Ministries Basic Course

Using Lay Servant Ministries Basic Course Participant's Book by Sandy Jackson and Brian Jackson, this foundational course introduces participants to the importance of servant leadership and offers practical guidance for service in the church and beyond.

#### United Methodist Heritage

Using Living Our Beliefs: The United Methodist Way by Kenneth L. Carder, this class explores the history, beliefs, and practices of the United Methodist Church, providing a deeper understanding of its Wesleyan roots.

#### To Become a Certified Lay Servant:

- 1. Obtain recommendation from the pastor and the church council or charge conference of the local church or other United Methodist ministry in which you hold membership. (Pastor signature will be on first Charge Conference report.)
- Complete the "Introduction to Lay Ministries: The BASIC Course."
- 3. Complete an advanced Lay Servant Ministries course.

Contact the Office and add your name to the list! These classes are typically held on a Friday or Saturday and are \$15 per class plus the cost of the book [Scholarships are available].

# Welcome to the new section of our newsletter dedicated to our WB Groups.

### WB GROUPS SIMPLIFIED by Amy Gilmore

By the time the newsletter goes out, the first round of WB groups will have met – some maybe even twice! However, there is still some confusion surrounding these newly forming groups. I am going to try and clear it up, but I'm always available if you have questions.

Here's how it all began...back in 1703 John Wesley was born to Susanna and Samuel Wesley in Epworth, England. As a child...Did I go too far back?! Well, in reality small groups within the Methodist Church did come from John Wesley and hopefully you have been reading the "WB Chatter" in your bulletins for a little bit of history surrounding small groups. They are biblically inspired – from 1 Thessalonians 5:11 "Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing." and 1 Corinthians 12:25 "that there may be no dissension with the body, but the members may have the same care for one another."

To jump start these groups at FUMC Bella Vista, Pastor Ron and I decided to use the January 25th meeting as a starting point. If you attended the meeting, you were assigned to a group that day and requested to try to meet with your new group several times over the next six months.

If you're asking, "What are we supposed to do in these

groups?" There is no agenda, but suggestions were made. So far, WB groups have met for breakfast, games, lunch, and just a "getting to know you" time. These groups are all about building relationships with members of FUMC Bella Vista. We have had 38 people join FUMC Bella Vista since January 2023 and several more faithful attendees and if you don't golf with them or sit next to them in worship, you probably don't have a relationship with them or even know their name. How can a church grow and spread God's love and create disciples if there aren't relationships among the people?

If you're thinking, "What if I wasn't at the January 25th meeting, can I still be in a WB group?" Yes!! We want everyone to have a group of people that will support them, check in with them, and encourage them. Over the next few weeks, Pastor Ron and I will create more WB groups or you can create your own group. Please give them a fair chance, but I know they are not for everyone.

Keep your eye on the newsletter, weekly email, slides and all the places where we communicate to find out more about how these WB groups will help form new relationships and have a positive impact on FUMC Bella Vista.

# An AI Response to the Question: "What are some advantages of Small Group Meetings used by Methodist Churches?" (e.g. WB's, Shepherd Groups, Circles)

In preparation for our WB Dreamers meeting held on Monday, 2/24/25, I wanted to put together a brief explanation of small groups. Since I wasn't sure where to start, I decided to ask AI (artificial intelligence) for its input. (I used Microsoft Copilot Chatbot with GPT-4 Turbo.)

Methodist small groups often engage in various activities designed to foster spiritual growth, community, and service. Here are some common activities:

- Bible Study: Members gather to read and discuss passages from the Bible. This helps them deepen their understanding of scripture and apply its teachings to their lives.
- Prayer: Groups often spend time in prayer, both for one another and for broader concerns. This can include intercessory prayer, praying for personal needs, or simply spending quiet time in reflection.

- 6. **Worship:** Some groups include times of worship, singing hymns or contemporary Christian songs, and expressing their faith through music and praise.
- 7. **Learning:** Groups may study Christian books, watch and discuss religious films or videos, or invite guest speakers to share their insights.

These activities help create a supportive, nurturing environment where members can grow in their faith and make a positive impact in their communities.

I say don't be afraid or intimidated by AI. When challenged with questions in an appropriate Christian way, AI's answers can be very thought-provoking and insightful.



### **GREETINGS FROM UNITED WOMEN OF FAITH!**

The women of **UWF** have many charities we support throughout the year. We would like to highlight **Hub of Hope NWA**, A Human Trafficking Non-Profit.

**HOPE** stands for: **Healing**- in a holistic manner with physical, mental, spiritual and emotional health for survivors. **Opportunities**- for safety, health, autonomous living and sustainability. **Prevention**- to reduce the impact of trafficking. **Educa-**

tion- with training to help identify victims and tactics of traffickers.

We donated \$750.00 to Hub of Hope NWA in 2024. Forty-seven survivors were supported in 2024 with groceries, housing and meals. (262 survivors safely transported) These donations are made possible with proceeds from the Rummage Sale in August and the Bazaar in October. Many hands are involved in making these donations possible.

Bazaar workshops will start Thursday, March 6th, from 9:00am till 2:00pm in the Quilt room downstairs. Everyone is welcome to come and there are jobs for everyone from pressing material, cutting out items and sewing items. Bring your ideas and patterns. 
