Update on The United Methodist Church

In early March, it was announced that General Conference 2020 is now postponed to 2024. This decision is based on the fact that our international brothers and sisters cannot obtain visas due to the pandemic. Shortly after that announcement, the Global Methodist Church announced it would launch on May 1, 2022. The Global Methodist Church is constructed of the more conservative entities of The United Methodist Church. There are a lot of questions surrounding how this will work and what it will look like, but at the moment, clergy, local churches, and even some annual conferences are considering disaffiliating from The United Methodist Church to join the Global Methodist Church. To do so, they must disaffiliate using the current Book of Discipline as it was amended in 2019 at the Called General Conference. At this time, based on the conversations our congregation has had over the past several years, we will not be considering disaffiliation. If you have more questions or concerns, please feel free to contact Rev. Jeanne.

We're unknowingly training our kids to have the same habits we have. And then came the hard question: what if my Bible was that important to me? What if my need for Jesus was that tangible? Of course, I have a few Bible apps on my phone, but I often don't feel the same sense of loss and desperate need for Jesus that I do for my phone.

This realization has led me to try to depend less on my phone and more on Jesus. Sure, I need it to look things up, and use it as a distraction for the kids, but I want the same craving for Jesus that I have for information found on my phone. I don't think I'm alone in this realization. And maybe it's not your phone that holds this place in your life. It could be the TV, sports, gossip, books.... You get the idea. My prayer is that we all crave Jesus like he is the most important thing in our daily world.







Richard and I moved from Prescott, Arizona, to Hiwasse in April of 2010. Richard's Aunt Harriet Hale bought tennis lessons for me in January 2011. One day, I mentioned to Harriet that I was looking for a place to get back into singing. She pointed out another tennis player whom I had seen around the courts. I hadn't played tennis with her, of course, because at that point, I was a lousy player! Harriet introduced me to Shirley Hofmann, who told me she was in a group called Bella Vista Women's Chorus and that I was welcome to visit a rehearsal.

I jumped at the chance and went to rehearsal the very next Monday. It was in the music room at a local United Methodist church. I met the director, Dr. Larry Zehring, loved the music, was impressed by the group of ladies, and joined the Chorus.

One day during break, Shirley told me that she attended that Methodist church, sang in the choir, and taught a Sunday school class. I had already visited a couple of other churches in Bella Vista looking for a church home. The next Sunday, I attended church and Sunday school. I met the dynamic pastor, Brother Jaimie Alexander, and immediately felt at home. One Sunday, Dr. Zehring stopped by the pew in which I was sitting and said, "If you're going to come to church, you may as well sing in the choir." I started singing for first service and later joined the third service choir, also, and attended Shirley's Sunday school class between services.

I felt completely welcomed in the church right away. The second Sunday I was there, a lady named Phoebe Bader asked me to sit with her, and a week or so later another lady named Maryann Johnson asked me to sit with her.
