The Discipleship Journey

"Advent: Season to Prepare"

We rejoice as the first Sunday of Advent has us starting the preparations to receive a king, the Savior of the world. I am going to leave the Advent narratives to other sources and approach discipleship from a daily, year-around, perspective. In doing so, it still is a form of better preparing ourselves for the birth of the Christ child. After all, Advent is a season of preparations for all of us.

In 1729, while John Wesley was a student at Oxford, he started a club with his brother Charles. It was soon mockingly dubbed "The Holy Club" by some of his fellow collegians.¹ The club members rigorously self-examined themselves everyday by asking 22 questions. The first list appeared in 1729 or 1730 in the preface to Wesley's second Oxford Diary. Similar questions appeared in his 1733, A Collection of Forms of Prayer for Every Day in the Week. As late as 1781, Wesley published a similar list of questions in the Arminian Magazine.

Each day the early group, which never numbered more than 25, gathered and reviewed some or all of these questions. Yes, every single day.

Here are a few of them:

- Am I self-conscious, self-pitying or self-justifying?
- Do I disobey God in anything? •
- Am I defeated in any part of my life? •
- Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
- Am I proud? •
- Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?
- Do I grumble or complain constantly? •

A key Wesley insight was that spiritual growth is fostered not only by the disciplining of one's personal piety, but also by the equally important disciplining of one's behavior. The Methodist was to train what she or he did, in order to train what she or he believed. It was this key insight that caused Wesley to structure Methodism the way he did. Inward faith could be affected and nurtured through outward action. Wesley, it seems, built his Methodist structure to manage not belief or even inward faith, but outward actions. The heart was quickened through hearing the word of God and experiencing God's grace directly, but it was in the disciplined management of the outward actions that this fledgling faith grew and matured. I pray that this will be true for me also.

I will keep a few copies on my desk of the full list of 22 Questions. If you are so inclined, stop in and I will gladly share a copy. You can decide if you want to discuss your thoughts on any of the questions. I am not sure I will be ready to answer on my behalf, but I will try. Each day I prayerfully strive to live a life that answers them in a way that shows the Christ that lives in me. May I learn from my mistakes, my made stronger each day to share the Good News. May I be better prepared to

My Dear Friends, It is now time for Advent and a new liturgical year. The word Advent means coming toward or approaching.

As we draw close to the end of another year, once again the days become shorter and shorter in terms of sunlight until we mark the shortest day of the year on December 21. Then, the days slowly but surely begin to become longer, as more and more sunlight fills the skies.

Nature's dramatic show of sky light inspired the ancient pagan world to believe in gods of light and darkness which battle each other in a never-ending struggle of good vs. evil.

Our Christmas gift is learning about Rod and Arlene Alford. Enjoy!

Rod took early retirement, due to the health of Phyllis, his first wife, in June 1990 and moved to Bella Vista. They had the opportunity during Rod's working career to move many times (Texas, Virginia, Delaware, Colorado, Maryland, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and the Netherlands). Moving as often as they did, they never had the opportunity to get really involved in a church or community.



This all changed when Rod and Phyllis

moved to Bella Vista. Finding a church that they could get involved in was easy. Rod had been a Methodist his whole life, so they visited every Methodist Church in the area. It was a very easy decision to join FUMC in Bella Vista in January 1992. The members were very friendly, and the church was very active with a lot of opportunities to get involved, which they did. Retirement afforded them the time to support FUMC and the community.

Phyllis passed away in 1998. Rod says, "The church and the members were a tremendous support to me during this time. Then the Lord sent me Arlene."

Arlene and her first husband, Frank, had moved here from Southern California in 1995. Her husband also passed away in 1998. Rod's Phyllis and Arlene's Frank were brother and sister, so Arlene and Rod were in-laws. They were married in 1999.

Arlene joined FUMCBV in 1997. She is a member of the UWF and the Church Council. She was the Church Treasurer for three years and handled the Membership Books for over 20 years. She also was active in the Disciple Classes. She played golf in several leagues and was a President of the 18-Hole Women's Golf Assn. She was voted into their Hall of Fame in 2017.

Rod has served as the Lay Leader, lay member to the Annual Conference, chaired the SPRC, Finance Committee, Evangelism Committee, and the Endowment Fund several times. As a Certified Lay Speaker in the United Methodist Conference, he preached in various churches in Northwest Arkansas. He is an active member of the UMM, where he wrote the UMM Constitution and the Bylaws and cooked pancakes for many years. He has been fondly known as the "Candy Man." He always had peppermints for the children.

Rod and Arlene also have participated in Helping Hands, Habitat for Humanity projects, volunteers for many golf tournaments, NWA Children's Shelter Fund organizing golf tournaments to raise funds, Cancer Challenge (28 years), and they were honored as Volunteers of the Year in 2013, LPGA (16 years), Single Parent Scholarship Fund of Northwest Arkansas (Advisory Board Member).
