ARKANSAS UMC ANNUAL CONFERENCE RECAP

The Arkansas Annual Conference held the first ever known hybrid annual conference on June 2-4, 2021. About 300 people joined via zoom while another 400 gathered in the Bank of the OZKS Arena. Reverend Jeanne, Pastor Brenda, Judy Bilyeu, and Ken Swanson attended as our representatives with Rev. Jeanne attending in person while everyone else attended virtually. Amy Gilmore and David Williams attended as District At-Large Equalization Members. David also assisted in leading worship as part of the house band.



The Rev. Dr. Erin Beasley and Rev. Dr. F. Willis Johnson presented to the Annual Conference a discussion on racism and the church titled "Honoring Our Wesleyan Heritage through Racial Reconciliation."

Business sessions consisted primarily of reports from various agencies and institutions. The Trustees Report included business from the 2019 Special General Conference that gives the Annual Conference discretion on how to handle the property of churches who choose to leave the connection at this time. This was perhaps the most contentious portion of business this year.

Two resolutions and one petition to General Conference were brought to the Conference. The resolutions were Project Transformation Arkansas' Relationship to Arkansas Annual Conference, which passed; Regarding Decisions about Potential Separation, Departure, or Realignment as an Annual Conference, which passed; and a General Conference Petition to Clarify Deadlines in Paragraph 507 was presented by the Rev. Jim Polk. The purpose of the petition was to clarify the deadline for petitions to be sent to General Conference, considering the twice-delayed General Conference, which was set to occur in 2020, but has now been pushed back to 2022. That resolution passed by a vote of 465-46. The Petition was then asked for a Decision of Rule by the Bishop which means it now goes to Judicial Council for their ruling.

The Delegation to General Conference reported that not much has changed other than GC being delayed from 2020 to fall of 2022 because of the pandemic. Visas for those traveling from around the world are quite difficult to obtain. There is continued conversations among all opinions, but there is still not an overwhelming feeling of where the United Methodist Church is heading. We do know that whatever happens at GC 2022, it will take several years to implement.

From delegate Judy Bilyeu, "I came away with the knowledge that much has been done by the church, even through the epidemic. But also was left with great concern about how divided our conference is for the future. It was wonderful to see that even with this turmoil, we have men and women who are stepping forward to ministry."

Glimpses of Grace

To everything there is a season, says Ecclesiastes 3. This is a common scripture choice for memorial services, so I've used it a lot in my career. And from time to time (pun intended) it makes me stop and reflect.

We have many seasons in life: childhood, youth, young adult, career, middle age, retiree.... or, seasons of joy and health, and seasons of grief and pain. I took some time in the last month to reflect, pray, and ask for direction from the Holy Spirit. Direction for me personally and for our church. I walked away from Annual Conference in June feeling heartsick for the glimpses of how the next few years seem like they are going to look in our denomination. It isn't going to be pretty. And then I started thinking about our church and our community and our mission from God.

We all have walked through a season of a pandemic. No, it's not over. We still need to be aware and cautious in certain situations. The new Delta variant is especially concerning; however, the season of quarantine and mandatory masks for everyone and washing our groceries (did we actually do that?!) seems to be in our rearview mirror. And as I emerge from that season, there are some things that I'm reflecting on that I think might ring true for some of you.

My priorities have shifted. What used to be super important to me pre-pandemic is not so much now. This shift has made me wonder where each of your priorities may have shifted, or even intensified. And, if, as I suspect, many of our priorities have shifted, where does the church fit into that? For some, the church building just doesn't hold as much meaning. "I can connect via zoom for meetings, Sunday school, and I can watch the sermon online anytime." Yet for others the ability to gather in the building has renewed their spiritual life.

I mentioned in a sermon a few weeks ago that I thought the pandemic ripped the proverbial band-aid off of Western Christianity and exposed a gaping wound of a mass movement of people who no longer "need" organized religion, especially Christianity. I've even heard from some of our members that the need to gather with others just simply isn't as important as their spiritual life increased when they worshiped at home or on their own.

So where does this leave us? Especially in Bella Vista? Do we wallow in the losses, or do we stop wallowing and talking and start doing? We're really good at talking, especially about the past and what we "could" do in the future, but what I've found in our beloved denomination is that we're really, really good at talking and very hesitant at the doing. So I feel after much prayer and holy conversation that this is where we need to go in the next few months:

- We need to identify our priorities as individuals, as a church community and in our community.
- > We will utilize the Gospel Discipleship resources and have a tool for each of us to identify how we approach our discipleship and how to deepen it.
- > We will hold some coffee chats/porch meetings this fall and hear from you what your priorities are for yourself, for our church, and our community.
- > Finally, I want us to then discern with God how best we as First United Methodist Church, Bella Vista can make a difference in our community as we move outside of our walls and meet people where they are: the coffee shops, restaurants, golf courses, ball fields... wherever that may be.

As I have spent time reflecting and praying, I feel this is where the Holy Spirit is leading us. This work needs to be completed by the end of the year so that we can lean into where God is calling us. No, we won't have any denominational answers before November of 2022, but God is calling us to move in our community and share God's love regardless of what happens there.

How will God use us? How will God use you? Beloveds, for everything there is a season. We're in a season of discernment and growth as a church family. I invite you to please pray with me for God's guidance and wisdom in the next few months as we embark on this post-pandemic journey together.

We All are Called!

For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us. (Romans 12:4-6 NRSV)

Did you know as a child of God that you have been called? Did you know that you have been given gifts and graces and these make you who you are in service to God's people? The Apostle Paul wrote to the growing Christian community in Rome that God had measured out a portion of those gifts to each one of them. Paul confirmed that we are each unique in our gifts and that by combining our gifts, we are stronger and more complete together.

For the past four years, we have had a ministry that serves our church family and community in ways that care for them. This ministry is the Congregational Care Ministry (CCM). These are laity who have been called to serve our church family and to assist Rev. Jeanne and me by identifying and by ministering to those whose health and struggles in life make it difficult for them to be an active part of our faith community. Sometimes the struggle is temporary and other times, it is an ongoing difficulty. CCMs serve the least, the last, the lost, and the lonely. In 2017 we started with 4 CCMs and since then we have grown to a current total of 6 CCM's. On the weekend of August 27-28, we will host a training seminar in our Becker Hall to grow not only CCMs for our church, but also to expand that ministry in other churches in the state of Arkansas. If you are sensing a calling to be a part of this ministry, please come talk to me about this.

Paul told us that we have each been given unique gifts and graces, so it may not be that being a CCM is your calling. But, even if that is not the case, I do know that Jesus calls each of us to love one another. Each of us, regardless of our gifts, is called to know that the CCM ministry exists, who the CCMs in our church are, and when we know of our beloved friends and families who need this ministry, it is our calling to let the CCMs know of this. Those who are struggling should not have to struggle alone, and unfortunately, there are times when we have not yet been made aware there are those who need this ministry.

And, no doubt, we are <u>each</u> called to pray. I ask each of you in the coming months to pray for the hearts of those who are and will soon become CCMS, to pray for the success of this seminar, and to pray for the least, the last, the lost, and the lonely that they may be found and may find healing in their lives as they join in the journey of this ministry

After months of planning and fundraising, the time finally arrived for our Youth Group to embark upon a project we had been eagerly anticipating. On June 13, Rev. Brenda commissioned the small group of Alec Gilmore, Julia Forst, Karyss Bosch, Andrew Smith and Renee van Dyke to go forth and be the hands of Christ. We did just that. The evening of June 20, during worship, I received word we would be constructing a wheelchair ramp at a Neighbor's home in Avoca. We packed our vehicles with tools most of us had never

used, threw in a set of sawhorses and off we went into

the rainy morning.

As soon as we got there we saw why her project had been chosen. Her current ramp was nearly unusable. We consulted each other to make sure we were interpreting the plans correctly. We received a quick tutorial on proper tool usage from OMP staff and then we were left to figure it out. Just as we began to have faith in our ability to do this, our Neighbor seemed to lose faith in us! She wanted her old ramp back. We assured her we could do this, it would be ADA compliant, and it was coming along really well. Soon she started spending a little more time outside with us. She'd smile and tell us it was nice. And we played with her dog.

As we repeatedly turned to God to equip us for this project, He also increased our faith in ourselves. By doing so, it increased our Neighbor's faith in the entire process. As we bid her goodbye on the day we completed her ramp, she smiled brightly and passed out hugs. A gift we had made from scrap wood was prominently displayed in her kitchen. I brought her a bag of tomatoes from my garden and she thanked me, but not just me and not just for the tomatoes. She thanked all of us for making her life a little easier and her week much less lonely.

In our daily worship time, we always shared what the day had meant to us or where we saw God at work. On that final day, most of us just sighed and smiled. We had indeed served as the hands of Christ. Mission accomplished! (see page 11 for pictures)

Stewardship Corner

Four Principles of Biblical Stewardship

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already.

C. S. Lewis, Mere Christianity

Bill Peel wrote an excellent essay entitled *Leadership* is *Stewardship*. In it, he suggests that there are four important principles about biblical stewardship we must understand.

> Principle number one: the **Principle of Ownership.** The psalmist begins the 24th psalm with, *The earth is the LORD's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.*

In the beginning, God creates everything and puts Adam in the Garden to work it and to take care of it. It is clear the man was created to work, and the work is the stewardship of all the creation that God has given him.

This is the fundamental principle of biblical stewardship. God owns everything, and we are simply managers acting on his behalf.

Therefore, stewardship expresses our obedience regarding the management of everything God has placed under our control, which is all-encompassing. Stewardship is the commitment of oneself and possessions to God's service, recognizing that we do not have the right of control over our property or ourselves.

Echoing Deuteronomy 8:17, we might say: "My power and the strength of my hands produced this wealth for me." But Deuteronomy 8:18 counsels us to think otherwise: *Remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth.*

What's the (負i)多tory? Jill Hale, FUMC Historian

There was no response to the historian message last month asking for memories about the stained-glass window in the Chapel/Parlor. In culling through historical information, I was able to determine that the window was installed when the "Chapel/ Lounge" was renovated in 1992. The Chapel had previously been the fellowship hall for the church and was updated when Becker Hall was completed as the new fellowship hall. The window was given by Mary Kraska.



From stained-glass window explanations I found: "The design of the Chapel window is based on Luke 3:16, 'He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire.' The Holy Spirit appears as a descending dove with tri-radiant nimbus indicating that it is a member of the Triune God. The dove is the Biblical symbol of the Spirit as it first appeared in this form at the baptism of Jesus.

"The tri-radiant nimbus about the head of the dove coincides with the arms of the cross and the Circle of Eternity at the center of the cross. Below the dove are seven tongues of fire which have a downward and outward motion, as at Pentecost. Seven flames are used as a number associated with the Spirit reminding us of the seven gifts of the Spirit."


For August, we will move back into the Sanctuary and for a look at the history of the Casavant pipe organ. Please send me any memories you have about the selection and installation of the organ.
