
Worship for Lent



A Culture of Caring





Confidently Trusting God

The Disciples IV class that I'm in just finished up Psalms. Next, we will proceed to John and Revelation, the final half of our fouryear program. The conversations were thought provoking, reflecting on the stories behind Psalms and imagining both what the author was experiencing and how Jesus and the disciples might have understood these poems and songs. Today I want to talk about Psalm 3.

The heading at the top of the poem tells us that this Psalm was written when King David was fleeing from his son Absalom. In the story, Absalom works to gain the Israelites' favor in an attempt to overthrow his father and become king. David flees Jerusalem with those who are still loyal to him. When the time for the battle becomes imminent, David is advised to stay back and to allow his troops to go to war without him. It says that he stands by the city gate while all his men marched out in units of hundreds and thousands. And then he waits. And this is the Psalm written during that time. Lord, how many are my foes! How many rise up against me! Many are saying of me "God will not deliver him." But you, Lord, are a shield around me, my glory, the One who lifts my head high. I call out to the Lord, and he answers me from his holy mountain. I lie down and sleep; I wake again, because the Lord sustains me. I will not fear though tens of thousands assail me on every side. Arise, Lord! Deliver me, my God! Strike all my

What do you know about the Congregation Honor and Memory Garden? I had no idea! As you walk to the church from the parking lot toward the front doors under the portico, have you taken time to notice the American flag flying or the beautiful sundial? I have to admit that I haven't really paid much attention, as I seldom use that upper parking lot or enter through the front doors. Below is the original plan for the Garden. It reminds me of God giving Moses instructions for building the tent of meeting or to Noah for building the ark.

"A garden to view and remember loved ones who have passed on...a garden to view and honor those of the present for whom we care very much and a magnificent site from which the U.S. flag can be proudly flown.

"The garden will be located between the upper and lower levels of the parking lot in front of the Narthex. It will, when completed, run the full length of the island.

"The focal point of the garden will be the U.S. flag on the right of the steps, and a large bronze sundial on the left of the steps. The flag pole will be 50' high and will accept a flag up to 10 x 15'. The aluminum flag pole will have a permanent anodized dark bronze finish. The flag, made of nylon, will be light and will float gently, even in the modest breezes.

"Arkansas natural quarry stone will be used to build the surrounds and the raised bases for the pole and sundial. Space will be provided to plant such shrubs as holly, pieres, juniper, heather, etc., as well as small beds for seasonal flowers.

"Recessed lighting at the base of the flag pole will enable night time viewing of the flag. The recessed lights will be shielded to protect from glare. Small safety walk lights will be located at the top and bottom of the steps on both sides.

"The flag pole will be near the same height as the church steeple,

thus the flag will be visible from every vantage point where the steeple is visible today. The location of the flag pole will provide approximately 145' between the church steeple and the flag.

"The flag pole will be equipped to fly a separate church flag along with the U.S. flag when desired. It is suggested the church flag be flown on special occasions. One suggestion is to fly the church flag only upon the death of a church family member, as a symbol of love and respect.





"The proposed sundial will consist of several hoops and rings, marked by various symbols and pierced by an arrow. The sundial will be made of cast bronze and will measure 30" high and 24" wide. The rings and hoops will be supported by a flat bronze base with zodiac symbols. The flat bronze base will anchor to the stone.

"A poem engraved bronze plague [sic] will be attached to both the flag and sundial stone base or stone surround.

"A record of those being honored will be provided in the Narthex, with inclusion of the donors name if desired. A gold star will be used to signify those honored who are deceased. [See Books of Remembrance in the glass-covered case in the Narthex.]

"The flag and sundial will be the first elements built. Additional elements will be designed and built as funds become available. Each new element will be designed to coordinate with existing elements, so as the garden grows, continuity of design will be achieved."
