A Year, a Season

Moving from October to November, we see the calendar days of 2022 continue to fall, torn off the pad, or marked out on the wall calendar. November brings a close to the Christian 'Year' with the last Sunday of the year being Christ the King Sunday. It is November 20th this year. The next Sunday is the first Sunday of the Christian 'Year' – Advent begins the 27th.

Embedded in the Christian 'Year' are the seasons (in order) of Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time (Time after Epiphany), Lent, Easter, and Ordinary Time (Time after Pentecost). These are the seasons of our faith. Like the leaves outside, the parament colors change along with the seasonal changes. As winter approaches leaves fall, temperatures drop and sunsets come WAY TOO early. I will miss the best of Summer and early Fall. But we know the beauty of fresh snow, hot soups, and warm fires are ahead, too.

Our church is also going through a change in seasons. The church always has and always will be going through seasons. Each season brings its own special joy, and a sense of the new, a sense of hope. Yet, I will miss the best of what was before. We are experiencing so many changes, so many. Some changes were planned and known and then others – sudden and shocking.

There are several verses from Isaiah 55 which provides support, strength and hope as our journey into another season continues. From verses in Chapter 55: "All of you who are thirsty, come to the water! Listen carefully to me and eat what is good; enjoy the richest of feasts. Listen and come to me; listen, and you will live. My plans aren't your plans, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. Just as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my plans higher than your plans. You will be brought back in peace. Even the mountains and the hills will burst into song before you; all the trees of the field will clap their hands."

We go with God into a new season. We will seek, enjoy, and burst into song as we eat what is good. We will be brought back into a place of peace. Actually, we are already in a place of peace! The third verse reminds us to listen and to be drawn closer to the Holy One. May our ears be open to hear the plans God has for each of us. Fully Human, Fully Divine– Advent Study

Beginning Sunday, November 27, this study for youth and adults will take place between services from 10–11 a.m. Using Whitney Simpson's study Fully Human, Fully Divine: An Advent Devotional for the Whole Self, our group will briefly review the weekly theme and scripture, then do a couple spiritual exercises together that help us to embody the themes which are: Slow Down and Hope, Simplify for Peace, Sit with Joy, and Savor God's Love. A book will not be necessary to participate on Sundays.

The seven spiritual exercises are: Breath Prayer, Mindful Movement, Lectio Divina, Visio Divina, Christian Meditation, Creative Contemplation, and Practicing Presence. Simpson's book contains "how to" descriptions of seven spiritual exercises and provides an example for practicing each of the seven every week.

If you are interested in having a book so that you can follow the daily regimen of suggested spiritual exercises, books can be ordered from Upper Room Books online or other book sellers for \$20.00.




OUR FAMILY





A Thanksgiving Message

Our family has some Thanksgiving traditions, and I'm sure you have them as well. One is to go around the table and each person says one thing that they're thankful for. Like you, our family is thankful for spouses and kids, health, friends, and we're thankful for another year with us all being together; we're thankful for a country with freedoms and I'm thankful for a church that feels like family. Everyone shares in the thankfulness of the other.

The Apostle Paul wrote this: "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!" (2 Corinthians 9:15). We have a lot to be thankful for this year, and it is good and right for us to thank God for spouses, kids, jobs and health. But when Paul says, "We thank God for his indescribable gift!" he's talking about something specific. Actually, Someone specific. He isn't thanking God for things (though he could, and in other places in the New Testament, he did); rather, he is thanking God for Jesus. Or to say it another way, Paul is thanking God for God.

The greatest gift that God ever gave the world was His Son, Jesus Christ-who was (and is) God in the flesh. This is really what Christmas is about: the idea that God became a man (this is what theologians call "the incarnation"). As C.S. Lewis put it in Mere Christianity, "The Son of God became a man to enable men to become sons of God." And although Paul knew nothing of our American holiday on the fourth Thursday of November, I think it's right for us to talk about Christmas at Thanksgiving. Not because I'm trying to rush past this holiday and get on to the next one; but because our gratitude on this holiday is *informed* by the next one.

This Thanksgiving, I encourage you to thank God for all of the people and things you can think of. Be specific in your gratitude; articulate and enumerate all of the blessings in your life, because, "Every good and perfect gift is from above" (James 1:17a). But I also encourage you this Thanksgiving to thank God for God. Don't just thank Him for what he's giving you; thank Him for who He is. The purpose of all of these earthly blessings is not that we become infatuated with the gift as an end to itself, but rather, to draw our eyes up to the Giver. He was the one who gave His Son so that you and I could be rescued from sin and restored to a reconciled relationship with Him. God did all of this to reach us.

We have so much to be thankful for.



It's November already and the beginning of the busy holiday season. We are fortunate to have Terry and Cynthia Augspurger's story this

Terry and Cynthia Augspurger (T&C) have a history with First United Methodist Church of Bella Vista. Terry's parents, Roger and Betty, retired to Bella Vista in 1987, purchasing a home on Lake Windsor. T&C's family visited at least twice a year. In the summers they cruised on the pontoon in the lake, and they celebrated Christmas with "Grandpa Roger" and "Grammy Betty."

Terry and Cynthia often attended worship services at FUMC of BV. They especially enjoyed the Christmas Eve Services. Cynthia grew up in Methodist Churches with magnificent pipe organs. FUMC of BV has such an organ and a friendly congregation who attracted them to transfer their membership in 2018. Each had attended "Walk to Emmaus" weekends.

Both T&C graduated from the University of Iowa and married in 1972. Cynthia worked at a bank while Terry earned his MD degree (4 years) and 5 years of residency in adult, child, and adolescent psychiatry at the U of I in Iowa City.

Marshalltown, Iowa became their home for 34 years. Terry practiced child & adolescent psychiatry at various state institutions, as well as many community mental health centers, public hospitals, and clinics. Terry always felt God's call to work in the public sector and to treat the disadvantaged.

On July 30, 1984, T&C, daughter Amy, and a host of relatives and friends welcomed three-month-old Jo Sang Jin from South Korea at the Des Moines airport. Both of our children's adoption stories show God's love and blessings to our family. We have two grandchildren.

Cynthia was passionate about her mental health center volunteer job, applying to pharmaceutical patient assistance programs to receive free medicine for mentally ill patients. Her team acquired almost 4 million dollars' worth of medicine for patients in five years.

Music of all genres compel T& C to participate in and listen to groups in NWA. Terry sings in the church choir and BV Men's Chorus. He plays bass and sings bluegrass, blues, and folk songs with musicians he's met locally.


Cynthia enjoys playing bassoon solos at church, in the BV Community Band, ECHO, Joyful Noise, and any ensemble she finds.
