This year our children and youth will be working together to support **INGATHERING 2021**–United Methodist Church of Arkansas. The focus this year is to construct disaster relief

kits for our NW Conference Disaster Response.

Cleaning kits (also called flood buckets) are especially needed after floods earlier in the year. Hygiene Kits provide basic necessities to people who have been forced to leave their home because of human conflict or natural disaster. Relief kits will be used to stock the new resource center and make it ready for response.

Perhaps your group, Circle or organization would like to construct a bucket as a team. You may also donate individual items from the lists below that will be combined to assemble kits. We are also collecting new and gently used children's books for distribution in our local community. Donations can be placed on the desk outside the Becker Hall doors or on the table in the Narthex.

Contents for each kit are listed below:

CLEANING KIT SUPPLIES


- One 5-gallon round bucket with re-sealable lid (May be used, but must be clean)
- > One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner (no spray cleaners)
- > One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- > One 4-8 oz pump spray air freshener
- > One 6-14 oz pump spray insect repellant
- One scrub brush
- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes (no terrycloth, microfiber, or paper towels) (remove from packaging)
- Five Scouring Pads (NO stainless steel pads with soap) (remove from packaging)
- ➤ 36-50 clothespins
- > One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic)
- > 24-roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45 gal. size) (remove from packaging)

CLEANING KIT SUPPLIES (continued)

- Five N95 particulate respirator masks (1-3mil Thickness) (NO surgical masks)
- > Two pairs kitchen gloves (remove from packaging)
- One pair work gloves (cotton with leather palm or all leather)

HYGIENE KITS

- > One hand towel (15x25-17x27")
- > One wash cloth (no kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber)
- One comb (sturdy, with at least 6" of teeth no pocket combs or pics)
- One toenail or fingernail clipper (no emery boards or files)
- Bath-size soap (3 oz or larger no Ivory or Jergen's soap - leave in package)
- One adult toothbrush (do not remove from package, advertising not acceptable)
- > Ten Adhesive bandages (3/4 x 3in)
- > One 1-gallon size re-sealable bag

Glimpses of Grace Rev. Jeanne Williams, Senior Pastor

RECONNECT. That's my word for this month. I heard it used repeatedly in September from various aspects of my life, so I just decided that I would make it my word for October. To reconnect implies that you, or something, was once connected to something else and is not now. I think about all the things that need reconnecting in my life: personal relationships,

spiritual relationships, groups that fell apart during the pandemic, commitments I once held dear that fell away during the pandemic, or maybe it's reconnecting a battery or toy part that's disconnected. In my world, all of these things are true!

In my understanding, sin is anything that separates me from God. So anything that comes between me and my connection to God is considered sin. And that includes friends, family, busyness, my own stubbornness.... You get the point! Thank goodness we have a loving and forgiving God who just wants us to be in relationship together. Therefore, when I realize that I've disconnected from God and seek to reconnect, God is always willing and waiting, patiently and lovingly.

This month we are focusing on reconnecting with one another in our church family as we reconnect with God, too. And before you think, "But, Pastor, my relationship with God is just fine," realize that we're all moving to Christian Perfection and still have room to grow closer with God. Reconnecting with our church family may mean calling someone you're used to seeing in worship and always spoke to, but you haven't seen them lately. Or, maybe it's grabbing 3 or 4 other friends and deciding to sit down together for accountability and study. Or maybe it's calling Amy (855-1158) and letting her know that you're ready to greet/usher/acolyte again. I want to invite you to consider one new way of reconnecting with your church family and God this month, and prioritize that action.

Our theme for Stewardship is "God's Work, Our Hands". Stewardship, by definition, is not just about money. We have made it that in the church world, but it's really about being good caretakers of all of God's Creation. We are stewards of this Creation and sometimes we need to remember that means we care for all of the Earth, of animals, of other humans, of... all the things. Stewards means that we don't actually own anything, but we are to care for it and return it to God's care. That's a really hard concept in our current society. So before you decide not to attend worship in October because it's the "money month," I want to encourage you to come and hear how we are caretakers of Creation and how God needs all of us to reconnect and do God's work.

Caring Hearts, Caring Hands

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.²⁹ Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.³⁰ For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

(Matthew 28-30 NRSV)

Has the past year and a half made you weary, made your burden hard to carry? The pandemic has brought with it burdens we never expected to have to bear: illness, stress, anxiety, death, isolation, loneliness, loss of jobs and relationships. We read of Jesus in the New Testament. We know Jesus as someone who reached out to others, someone who cast out the demons from the lives of the troubled. We know him as a healer, as a companion, as a friend. As



disciples, we are called to care for others in the ways of Jesus.

On August 27 and 28, our church was the host for a two-day seminar for Congregational Care Ministers (CCMs). Our presenter was Rev. Karen Lampe, the developer and implementer of this ministry at the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood, Kansas. Folks representing eight different churches from all over Arkansas and Texas participated and learned of ways we could help lighten the load of those in our congregations and communities. There were ten folks from our church who were a part of this training, four were new CCMs and six were existing CCMs renewing their skills. The new folks were Jim and Paula Phillips, Jan Walton, and Amy Gilmore. Those current CCMs who renewed and refreshed their skills were

Maryann Johnson, Kandi Mount, Judy Kaufinann, Pat Fox, Connie Knauss, and Dave Broers. All of these ten folks make up our CCM team. As Associate Pastor of Congregational Care, I am the team leader. The CCMs are here to be an extension of and to partner with our pastors in caring for our congregation. There are just not enough hours in the week for our pastors to get to all who need caring hands and caring hearts.

You can always identify the CCMs. Their name tag is distinguishable with the color blue, and with a visible image of caring hands. We hope to be a more visible presence in the congregation with these name tags. But also we hope to be a more visible presence by assisting our pastors in Holy Communion and other special services. We will be present for worship, especially on the first Sunday of each month, and will bring Holy Communion to the homes of those who are unable to



come to worship here in the building. Our ministry is to be the hands and feet of Jesus, to reach out to you, to listen when you are carrying a heavy load, to be healers for you and friends to you, to pray with you and for you. We invite you to look for us and to contact us. Please let us know how and when we can help you. Or maybe you have a friend who needs a CCM, but would never ask for one. Let us know how we can help them, as well. Remember, we are all on this journey together; we pray you will let us join you on your journey and help to lighten the burden you or others may be carrying.


GENEROSITY

Stewardship Corner

Four Principles of Biblical Stewardship (continued from last month)

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. C. S. Lewis, Mere Christianity

Bill Peel wrote an essay entitled Leadership Is Stewardship. His essay can help us build a framework to begin unpacking this biblical idea of stewardship.

- Principle number one we learned, was—The Principle of OWNERSHIP.
- Principle number two we learned, was—The Principle of RESPONSIBILITY.
- Principle number three we learned, was—The Principle of ACCOUNTABLILTY.
- Principle number four is—The Principle of REWARD.
- In Colossians 3:23-24, Paul writes:

Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is Lord Christ you are serving.

The Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the master's will with the master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life but fully in the next.

We all should long to hear the master say what he exclaims in Matthew 25:21

Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!

As Christians of the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important; it connects everything we do with what God is doing in the world.

We need to be faithful stewards of all God has given us within the opportunities presented through his providence to glorify him, serve the common good, and further his Kingdom.

Now that I've been with the Praise Team for over a year, and coming up to a year with our current leader, David Williams, I wanted to do something special to commemorate what we do. I organized the Praise Song Countdown, a contest where our top eight praise songs went head to head over a series of weeks until we arrived at the winning song: *How Great Is Your Love*. All along the way, there have been ties and very close votes. The only way we arrived at a clear winner was for me to ask someone who hadn't voted to cast the tie-breaking vote.

Going back to traditional worship, I'm always happy to think about Halloween music. It's the one time of year that I can play scary music in a minor key. I think most of you will love most of my postludes in this genre. I'm going to front-load the famous Bach Toccata and Fugue in D minor on the first Sunday of October, play some famous scary music on the piano in the middle, and finish the month on Halloween with the Fantasia and Toccata in D minor by Charles V. Stanford. He's an Irish/British composer from the turn of the 20th century whose works I champion.

My preludes will be on the theme of harvest and the earth, composed of hymn tunes that you likely know and with contemporary arrangements. If you're looking for sunshine and light to brighten your day, I think you'll find these to your liking!

This may be the last month of soloists performing at the offertory in lieu of the Chancel Choir. I've really enjoyed getting to know the half dozen or so people who routinely offer their time. I hope you will remember to thank them for giving their time. It could be an email, card, or phone call. Either Jan Walton or I can get you that contact information.

What's the (Hi)Story? Jill Hale, FUMC Historian

Additional information about our beautiful Casavant organ. After the September newsletter went out, I received an email from our church organist, Broc Hite. He was letting me know he actually read the article abut the Casavant organ and had some additional information as follows:

"I would estimate closer to 1500 pipes instead of 2000. When I looked at the specs, I counted 4 pedal ranks (32 pipes each) and the rest would be 22 manual ranks (61 pipes each). There probably are some mixture ranks like the Zimbel and the Mixture that don't have pipes for every single note, but let's say they do. I get 1470, which was closer to my guess of 1500 than I thought!

"Just to recall, last year we discovered that the Mixture IV was double-counted; it's shared between great and pedal, so the rank count is 26, not 30.

"And, as of the last memory upgrade, we have 99 levels of solid-state memory, up from 63 in an earlier update."

Now, I realize this all pretty technical and didn't make much sense to me since I don't play the organ. However, this is important historically for our church, so I wanted to set the record straight. It gives me an even great appreciation of the organ and how difficult it must be to play it and make that beautiful music we are blessed to hear every Sunday and on other special occasions. Thanks, Broc! Thank you, also, to all of the fine musicians who provide organ music when Broc is not available. So again, Happy 50th birthday to our beautiful Casavant organ! Take time to listen and treasure every note.

The next time you are in the sanctuary, please take some time to look at the other stained-glass windows. We have already discussed the "dove" window. However, next month, we will start reviewing stories regarding the other windows. Please start now sending me your memories so they can be included. 
